FROM OUR RECTOR

Dear Parishioners,

Our Holy Father Pope Francis has spoken about the Eucharist and how it introduces us into real communion with Jesus and his mystery. “Now let us ask ourselves several questions that spring from the relationship between the Eucharist that we celebrate and our life, as a Church and as individual Christians. How do we experience the Eucharist? When we go to Sunday Mass, how do we live it? Is it only a moment of celebration, an established tradition, an opportunity to find oneself or to feel justified, or is it something more?”

“There are very specific signals for understanding how we are living this, how we experience the Eucharist; signals that tell us if we are living the Eucharist in a good way or not very well. The first indicator is our way of looking at or considering others. In the Eucharist, Christ is always renewing his gift of self, which he made on the Cross. His whole life is an act of total sharing of self out of love; thus, he loved to be with his disciples and with the people whom he had a chance to know. This meant for him sharing their aspirations, their problems, what stirred their soul and their life.

Now, when participating in Holy Mass, find ourselves with all sorts of men and women: young people, the elderly, children; poor and well-off; locals and strangers alike; people with their families and people who are alone...but the Eucharist which I celebrate, does it lead me to truly feel they are all like brothers and sisters? Does it increase my capacity to rejoice with those who are rejoicing and cry with those who are crying? Does it urge me to go out to the poor, the sick, the marginalized? Does it help me recognize in theirs the face of Jesus? We all go to Mass because we love Jesus and we want to share, through the Eucharist, in his passion and his resurrection. But do we love, as Jesus wishes, those brothers and sisters who are the most needy?”

The season of Lent will soon be upon us, and I take this opportunity to remind us all of the need to prepare for the season. “Lent is a solemn, reflective season of the liturgical year that is the preparation for the mysteries of Easter. It begins on Ash Wednesday and lasts 40 days until Easter (the 40 days do not include the Sundays of Lent). On Ash Wednesday, people come to Church to receive ashes on their forehead, a reminder that without God we are simply dust. The 40 days of Lent recall the 40 days that Jesus spent in the desert before beginning his public ministry. During Lent, Christians are called to renew themselves through fasting, prayer, and almsgiving” (Catechism of the Catholic Church).

God's Intention for Love

God restores order and brings healing to our fallen notion of love

Dear brothers and sisters in Christ,

The readings this week are timely. We hear the creation accounts from Genesis, showing how God brings order to the world. We hear a series of healing stories in which Jesus restores order when creation has fallen into different kinds of chaos. Then, on Valentine's Day, we hear the account of the fall of Adam and Eve. How fitting when we consider the chaos that has crept into modern culture's notion of love!

"Whatever you feel, you should act on it" is modern culture's notion of love. But that notion of love echoes the fall of humanity: it's wrong in itself and it leaves chaos in its wake — shame, confusion, people using each other and being used.

How does God offer to restore order and bring healing to our fallen notion of love? Here are some thoughts rooted in the Catholic tradition that give a better notion of love and help restore the order that God intends for love.

The philosophical tradition, best articulated by St. Thomas Aquinas, says that love means "to will the good of the other." In this definition, love is an act of the will, not a byproduct of feelings. Order is restored when love is built on the rock of a steady will rather than the shifting sand of feelings.

In "Theology of the Body," St. John Paul II articulated the role of the body in love. For example, he wrote: "Conjugal love involves a totality, in which all the elements of the person enter — appeal of the body and instinct, power of feeling and affectivity, aspiration of the spirit and of will. It aims at a deeply personal unity, the unity that, beyond union in one flesh, leads to forming one heart and soul."

He recognized the role of feelings and the body but placed them in the deeper context of the soul. Then, drawing that deeper account of the person toward Christ, he said: "[C]onjugal charity ... is the proper and specific way in which the spouses participate in

and are called to live the very charity of Christ who gave Himself on the Cross" (Familiaris Consortio, #13).

Order is restored to love when the body and soul are drawn together, and both are drawn to the Cross.

Pope Benedict XVI complemented the philosophical tradition with a theological point when he said: "'justice' means giving another what is their due, while 'love' means giving another what is mine" (Caritas in Veritate, #6).

Note how deeply connected to the Eucharist his definition of love is: In the Eucharist, Jesus gives us Himself. Order is restored when love is more about giving than taking.

Pope Francis, recognizing the fallen state of the world and building on the previous points, said this in his encyclical on the Sacred Heart: "In union with Christ, amid the ruins we have left in this world by our sins, we are called to build a new civilization of love" (Dilexit Nos, #182).

When we think that love means simply acting on our feelings, we recapitulate the fall and chaos ensues. But the God who is love has shown us what authentic love is and He wants to bring order to our chaotic world. The Catholic tradition holds a richer notion of love and offers it as a healing remedy to the world today.

Save a Life this Lent: Donate Blood

Please consider signing up to donate blood. Sunday, March 9 from 9am until 2pm.

- Every 2 seconds someone in the U.S. needs blood and or platelets.
- Approximately 29,000 units of red blood cells are needed every day in the U. S.
- Nearly 5,000 units of platelets and 6,500 units of plasma are needed daily in the U.S.
- Nearly 16 million blood components are transfused each year in the U.S.
- Sickle cell disease affects 90,000 to 100,000 people in the U.S. About 1,000 babies are born with the disease each year. Sickle cell patients can require blood transfusions throughout their lives.
- The average red blood cell transfusion is approximately 3 units.
- A single car accident victim can require as many as 100 units of blood.
- Blood and platelets cannot be manufactured; they can only come from volunteer donors.
- The blood type most often requested by hospitals is type O.
- One donation can help save more than one life

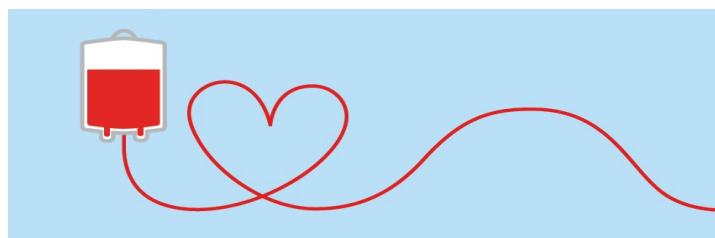
