Here at the Cathedral parish we currently have about 30 men and women who are preparing to enter fully into the Catholic Church at Easter. This is a great response and speaks volumes to the spirit of welcome at the Cathedral and the work of Christ speaking to their hearts.

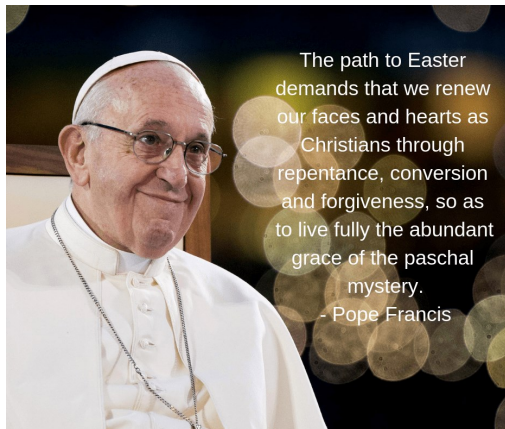
Once a month, the men and women of the Cathedral are invited to come spend some time in prayer and fellowship. On the first Saturday of the month the Women of the Cathedral meet and on the last Tuesday of the month the Men of the Cathedral meet. If you have not been, I highly recommend you take part in one of the upcoming meetings. You can find more details in the bulletin in the week prior to upcoming meetings.

This past Wednesday, we entered into the Season of Lent. I would like to take this opportunity to share with you a few thoughts from our Holy Father Francis I.

“Lent is a new beginning, a path leading to the certain goal of Easter, Christ’s victory over death. This season urgently calls us to conversion. Christians are asked to return to God ‘with all their hearts’ (Joel 2:12), to refuse to settle for mediocrity, and to grow in friendship with the Lord. Jesus is the faithful friend who never abandons us. Even when we sin, he patiently awaits our return; by that patient expectation, he shows us his readiness to forgive.”

Lent is a favorable season for deepening our spiritual life through the means of sanctification offered us by the Church: fasting, prayer, and almsgiving. At the basis of everything is the word of God, which during this season we are invited to hear and ponder more deeply.

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ARCHBISHOP'S COLUMN

God's holiness is standard for our action

However, God doesn't wait until we are holy to love us; He loves us so we become holy

Dear brothers and sisters in Christ,

The readings for the first full week of Lent are organized around themes that are helpful for the Lenten journey.

One of the most important of those themes is indicated by the fact that the opening and closing lines for the week converge on the same point. In the opening line, from Leviticus 19:2, God tells the Israelites: "Be holy, for I, the Lord, your God, am holy." It's a powerful charge: God's holiness is to be the standard for Israel's holiness! In the closing line, from Matthew 5:48, Jesus says: "So be perfect, just as your heavenly Father is perfect." Jesus picks up and reinforces the point: God's holiness is the standard for our action.

The theme of perfection and holiness, however, is sometimes emphasized in the wrong way, as though God won't love us until we're perfectly holy. Thankfully, the rest of the readings this week give us a different understanding of how we should understand the call to holiness.

The prophet Ezekiel helps to make the point clear. On the one hand, he says: "If the wicked man turns away from all the sins he committed ... None of the crimes he committed shall be remembered against him." On the other hand, he says: "And if the virtuous man turns from the path of virtue to do evil ... None of his virtuous deeds shall be remembered."

People in ancient Israel had started to consider their relationship with God as a kind of ledger: God would pay out a reward for every good deed and exact a payment for every bad deed. Ezekiel was telling the people: Our relationship with God is not a ledger. It's about the heart. And the turning of the heart is the main thing that captures God's attention.

**SERVE THE LORD
WITH GLADNESS**

The repentance of Nineveh, which we hear about this week, is a perfect example. The people of Nineveh had plenty of bad deeds on the debit side of the ledger, and Jonah announced that payment was coming due. But then the whole city repented. God saw the turning of their hearts and forgave the debt.

This theme is taken up and perfected in the life of Jesus, who didn't hesitate to reach out to sinners. In fact, the whole Incarnation was a reaching out to sinners! Likewise, in His ministry, Jesus didn't wait until people were perfect to love them. He loved them first. And because He loved them, He reached out to them with the hope of turning their hearts. His reaching out was both an invitation and a promise: If you turn from sin, if you turn toward me, then you and I will walk the long road to perfection together, and my love will make it possible for you to get there.

There's no compromising this Scriptural truth: God's goal for us is perfection. But that has to be coupled with another Scriptural truth: God doesn't withhold His love until we're perfect. No, He grants His love so that we might become perfect.

Can we learn to hold both those truths together – both in our own hearts, and in how we share the Good News with others? If we can, we ourselves can have a Lent that is at once joyful and challenging, and our sharing of the Good News with others will be a powerful and intriguing invitation.

Week 1: Treasures of the Church (Located in the All Saint Chapel)

We begin our Lenten journey with this beautiful painting by George and Polly Capps of Gorette Fine Arts LLC, commissioned by the St. Lawrence Society of Catholic Charities of St. Louis. The painting honors the legacy and witness of St. Lawrence of Rome, a third-century deacon martyred during the reign of Emperor Valerian. The following is taken from the description on display what the painting was unveiled.

According to an early story, at the outset of the persecution imperial officials desired to confiscate the assets of the church. Lawrence, as the local ecclesiastical administrator, was summoned by the prefect and given three days to collect the church's "treasures" for transmittal. Lawrence quickly gave away the rich objects in the church's possession to the poor. When the appointed time arrived, he presented to the prefect, as the true "treasures of the church," a crowd of poor, crippled, blind, and sick. The officials were so incensed by Lawrence's effrontery that he was sentenced to death by grilling.

George and Polly Capps's monumental oil painting depicts the moment when the Roman officials realize that they have been thwarted by Lawrence's generosity. Cherubs bearing the palm frond of martyrdom and a gridiron foreshadow the fate that the saint will suffer on account of his actions in the scene.

As we enter once again into this holy season, we might use this painting to lead us into a prayerful reflection on two aspects of the life of St. Lawrence, namely, his love for the poor and his martyrdom. Along with prayer and fasting, almsgiving is meant to be one of the pillars of our Lenten journey. When we give away some of what we have, we not only exercise a spirit of detachment from earthly things which is conducive to our being more firmly attached to the things of the spirit, but we also have the opportunity to actively love our neighbor. St. Lawrence saw the poor and those in need as the true "treasures of the Church," because it is especially in them that Christians have the opportunity to give without expecting return, that is, to exercise the virtue of charity. Recall that it is of them that our Lord Jesus Himself says, "whatever you did for one of these least brothers and sisters of mine, you did for me (Matthew 25: 40)."

Perhaps the Lord is inviting you in this holy season to, through almsgiving, imitate more closely the example of St. Lawrence. If we want to be detached from our earthly things, it isn't enough simply to inwardly tell ourselves so: we actually have to physically give some of it away. We are, after all, both soul and body. How might you push yourself in some concrete way to engage in some kind of sacrificial giving; to share some of what you have with those in need?

The sacrificial giving of the deacon St. Lawrence; his love for God and love for neighbor ultimately resulted in his being put to death by the secular authority of the time. Nothing was more important to him than striving to love God and neighbor, not even his own life. During this season of Lent, we are invited to embrace a spirit of sacrifice and simplicity so that we might free ourselves from those things that most often threaten to distract us from the love of God and neighbor. What, specifically, in your own life might those distractions be? What are the things in your life that you are most tempted to idolize, and how might you use this season to intentionally put those things aside so as to more generously give your attention to what matters most?
