Dear Parishioners,

This Wednesday, March 5, we enter into the Season of Lent. But what does "entering Lent" mean? It means we enter a season of special commitment in the spiritual battle to oppose the evil present in the world, in each one of us and around us. It means looking evil in the face and being ready to fight its effect and especially its causes, even its primary cause which is Satan.

It means not off-loading the problem of evil onto others, onto society, or onto God, but rather recognizing one's own responsibility and assuming it with awareness. In this regard Jesus' invitation to each one of us Christians to take up our "cross" and follow him with humility and trust is particularly pressing. Although the "cross" may be heavy, it is not synonymous with misfortune or with disgrace. Thus, the "cross" is not to be avoided at any cost.

This provides for us the opportunity to follow Jesus and thereby acquire strength in the fight against sin and evil. Therefore, entering Lent means renewing the personal and community decision to face evil together with Christ. The way of the Cross is in fact the only way that leads to the victory of love over hatred, of sharing over selfishness, or peace over violence. Seen in this light, Lent is truly an opportunity for a strong spiritual commitment based upon Christ's grace.

Make plans during this Lenten Season to join your fellow parishioners for the Stations of the Cross on the Fridays of Lent at 7:00 pm. Perhaps God is calling you to attend daily Mass at 7:00 am, 8:00 am or 12:05 pm. Don't forget that even if you only have 5 minutes, stop by and pray with our Lord in the Blessed Sacrament Chapel.

To help you enter more fully into the Lenten Season, the Cathedral Parish is providing to its parishioners a the Lenten Companion, published by Magnificat. This book will be made available to you beginning this Sunday at the main entrance. If you cannot make it to the parish on, please call the parish office to reserve your copy.

# Whatever We Give Up for Lent, We'll Receive More Than We Give

Our Lenten discipline isn't just for our own sake, it's also for the sake of others

Dear brothers and sisters in Christ,

"You are lacking in one thing." So says Jesus to the rich young man in Mark 10, which we "just happen" to read two days before Ash Wednesday!

It's a great thing for us to consider as we enter Lent: What's one thing in our life that gets in the way of having a deeper relationship with the Lord? Maybe the focus of our Lenten discipline could be addressing one such thing, so that we might follow Him more completely.

We also "just happen" to have a pair of readings the day before Ash Wednesday on the benefit of giving something up. Sirach 35 tells us this: "For the Lord is one who always repays, and He will give back to you sevenfold." Then, on that very same day, we hear this from Jesus in Mark 10: "There is no one who has given up [anything] ... who will not receive a hundred times more." Whatever we may give up for Lent, we can be sure we'll receive more than we give!

After Lent starts, a series of readings from Isaiah and Luke give us some helpful instruction regarding our Lenten discipline. They focus our attention on the fact that what we do for Lent isn't just for our own sake, it's also for the sake of others.

That lesson matters in a special way in Missouri this year. We — as a people — enacted Amendment 3. That means we've set up a structure in our law that is false in itself and creates a dangerous principle. As the Catechism of the Catholic Church points out "The moment a positive law deprives a category of human beings of the protection which civil legislation ought to accord them, the state is denying the equality of all


before the law" (CCC 2273). That's our current situation. A positive law deprives the unborn of the protection they should have. That creates a spiritual atmosphere of inequality in our state. We can't be surprised, then, when the spiritual smog of inequality results in a kind of spiritual blindness and asthma among us. It means some people are going to have to work extra hard to clean up the smog — to provide a spiritual atmosphere that respects the equal dignity of all.

Why should some people have to work hard to make up for the sins of others? I know: It doesn't seem fair. But I also know this: That's the way of Jesus. He came into the world because of the sins of others; He took the sins of others upon Himself. Our way is to follow Him — not just for ourselves, but for the sake of others. It's not fair, but it's the way of faith.

So, are you struggling to think of a good Lenten discipline? Think of this: The Constitution of Missouri now denies the equality of all before the law. That weighs upon us all. What discipline of prayer, fasting or almsgiving can I take up during Lent that will help to create an atmosphere that upholds the dignity of all?



1,000 babies are born with the disease each year. Sickle cell patients can require blood transfusions throughout their lives.

- The average red blood cell transfusion is approximately 3 units.
- A single car accident victim can require as many as 100 units of blood.
- Blood and platelets cannot be manufactured; they can only come from volunteer donors.
- The blood type most often requested by hospitals is type O.
- One donation can help save more than one life

Wednesday, March 5 is Ash Wednesday and the beginning of Lent. We will have Masses at 7 am, 8 am, 12:05 pm and 5:30 pm. Ash Wednesday is a day of fasting & abstinence.

Beginning on Friday, March 7 & Fridays in Lent we will hold Stations of the Cross at 7 pm at the Cathedral. (April 4, Stations will be at 6 pm)



# **Eucharistic Exposition**

The Blessed Sacrament, the very presence of Christ's body and blood in the Eucharist, is reserved in the tabernacle of the Blessed Sacrament Chapel to the east of the main sanctuary. At all hours the Cathedral is open, people may be found praying there before the Lord "face to face." Each Saturday afternoon, beginning at 3:30 pm, the Eucharist is displayed for prayer and adoration in public exposition in the Blessed Sacrament Chapel for holy hour. Following this holy hour, the Evening Prayer of the Church with Benediction is celebrated.

Additionally, the Blessed Sacrament is displayed for public adoration and prayer on the First Friday of the month. First Friday Adoration begins at approximately 8:30 am, following the completion of the 8:00 am Mass, and concludes with Benediction at 11:45 am Our next First Friday Adoration will be held Friday, March 7th.
