## FROM OUR RECTOR

Dear Parishioners,

Work began this week to repair a severe water leak in the All Souls Chapel. About two months ago, we began to see small pieces of tesserae fall from the wall in the back of the chapel. At that point, the staff began to investigate the culprit. Through work with a specialized roofing engineering firm and a roofing company that specialized in roofing tiles, the repair is underway. This repair is being completed under the supervision of the Archdiocese of Saint Louis.

If you have time, I invite you to take a look at the All Souls Chapel to see the damage. Also, if you see a piece of mosaic tile on the floor, please do not take it home. Bring to one of the priests or staff members. These will be necessary for the repair.

Earlier this week, if you are part of our FlockNote system, you should have received an email from me concerning some helpful information about the Coronavirus (Covid-19). One thing that I have noticed is a heightened anxiety among our parishioners. This new illness is undoubtedly frightening and needs attention, but surviving the outbreak of Covid-19 will require us to remain calm and not to succumb to panic or emotional reasoning. Knowing the facts and remembering what you've been taught about staying healthy will increase everyone's chances of staying well.

That being said, let us not forget the role of faith in all of this. Just as our Lenten penance is meant to deepen our relationship with God and our solidarity with all who suffer as the Lord did, we can allow the sacrifices and inconveniences in our daily lives caused by this virus to direct our prayers toward those who have died and their loved ones and our attention to those who are ill or facing financial hardship. The coronavirus poses a threat that knows no borders. As Catholics, neither does our love and concern for our neighbors.

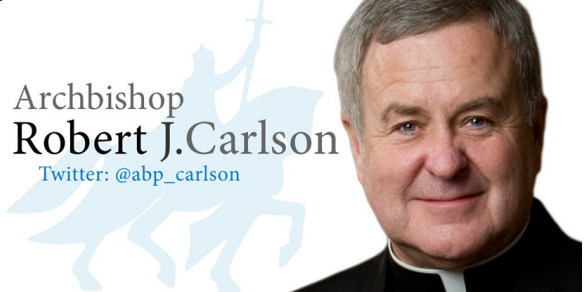


## ARCHBISHOP'S COLUMN

**BEFORE THE CROSS | Like St. Joseph, let our actions do most of the talking**

God deepened and fulfilled the role of the Old Testament patriarchs in Joseph

We celebrate the solemnity of St. Joseph on March 19. He stands as the last and also as the head of the patriarchs of Israel.

Joseph stands as the fulfillment of Abraham's role in salvation history. As Abraham received the initial promises of God, not through the law but through faith, so St. Joseph received God's final and definitive covenant — in Jesus — not through the law but through faith.

Joseph stands as the fulfillment of the Old Testament Joseph's role in salvation history. As the Old Testament Joseph received God's plan in dreams, so did St. Joseph. As the Old Testament Joseph was entrusted with the treasures of the king to be given out to save the people from famine, so St. Joseph was entrusted with the greatest treasures of the king — Jesus and Mary — to be given to the world for its eternal salvation.

St. Joseph stands as the fulfillment of King David's role in salvation history. God promised David that his son would sit on the throne of Israel, and that his throne would endure forever; St. Joseph received and fulfilled that promise because his adopted son, Jesus, is the eternal king of Israel.

Because he's the head of the patriarchs we turn to St. Joseph as a model. As a model, there are two things about him that I would like to hold up for our attention.

First: Joseph never speaks a word in the Gospels. He simply hears and obeys. He's a perfect example of what the apostle James says: "Demonstrate your faith to me without works, and I will demonstrate my faith to you from my works" (James 2:18).

That's a challenge to us! Yes, we must also proclaim our faith through words. But in a world that does a lot of talking — and we'll hear more of it as the election cycle continues — are we willing to follow St. Joseph, and let our actions do most of the talking?

Second: it's interesting that we hear nothing of the death of St. Joseph, or of his burial. He was, in the words of one author, "gentle and faithful but dispensable." Fittingly, he leaves behind no earthly trace of himself. Only Jesus and Mary remain.

That's a challenge to us! We all want to leave our mark on the world; we're concerned with our legacy. And, truthfully, that spurs us to some good works. But, in the end, is it really about us? Perhaps we would do better to follow St. Joseph's example: to be content to disappear, leaving only Jesus.

The Gospels don't tell us what happened to St. Joseph. But I think St. Bernardine of Siena was right when he said: "Obviously, Christ does not now (in heaven) deny to Joseph that intimacy, reverence, and very high honor which He gave him on earth ... Rather we must say that in heaven Christ completes and perfects all that he gave at Nazareth."

God deepened and fulfilled the role of the patriarchs in Joseph. Surely He deepens and fulfills Joseph's earthly role in heaven. On earth, Joseph willingly adopted Jesus as his own and protected Him. Now, since we are members of the body of Christ, he willingly adopts us as his own and offers us his fatherly protection. With good confidence, then, we turn to St. Joseph as a protector and say: St. Joseph, pray for us!

## Archdiocesan Lenten Regulations

*For God so loved the world that he gave his only Son, so that everyone who believes in him might not perish but might have eternal life. For God did not send his Son into the world to condemn the world, but that the world might be saved through him.” (Jn 3:16-17)*

The Church has always helped us fulfill these words of Jesus by prescribing very definite penance for all Catholics. Universal Lenten directions are printed here in order that we may be reminded of what is expected of all Catholics for all the days of Lent.

1. **Abstinence from meat** (totally meatless days) is observed by all Catholics 14 years of age and older (no upper age limit) on Ash Wednesday and all Fridays of Lent.
2. **Fasting** is observed on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday by all Catholics between 18 and 59. Those who are bound by this eat only one full meal; two smaller meals are taken to maintain strength according to each one's needs.
3. **Fasting** on other weekdays of Lent is not obligatory but recommended most strongly; if fasting is not observed, some other form of **self-denial is obligatory**, not from Church direction but from Christ's command.
4. **Prayer** is especially necessary to maintain the perspective of penance and to keep the motivation spiritual. Some substantial time should be given to prayer each day.
5. **Almsgiving** or charity is necessary to maintain and intensify the movement of the soul away from self-centeredness. A substantial donation of monetary funds and/or time and/or personal effort should be given to those in need.

## Stations of the Cross

A privileged devotion most frequently prayed in a public service during Lent is the **Stations of the Cross**. For centuries pilgrimage to the holy places in Jerusalem and a walking the path of Christ's carrying the cross to Calvary has been an esteemed devotion and penitential practice. In similar fashion the faithful have prayed at home at fourteen "stations of the Cross" erected on the walls of their parish churches. Join us for this powerful devotional prayer **every Friday evening of Lent at 7:00 p.m.**

## Operation Rice Bowl

The effort known as **Operation Rice Bowl** has become a regular feature of Lent in Catholic homes throughout the United States. Families reduce substantially one meal eaten together to a very simple fare like soup and bread, then donate the money saved to the "rice bowl". At the end of Lent, all the "rice bowl" funds are collected through the parish and forwarded to the poor through **Catholic Relief Services**. "Rice bowls", instructions, and Lenten Calendars are available on the tables at each entrance.

## Lent and Confession

All Catholics associate Lent with the Sacrament of Penance, Reconciliation, and Confession. Sometimes we put off going to Confession until the last minute depriving ourselves of a much richer Lent; indeed, a much richer life. Everyone is urged to make their Lenten confession early, during the first weeks of Lent. In that way, the richness of God's mercy may develop the full root and stem in Lent to blossom into a hardy and brilliant Easter joy.



## Thirsting For God

Perhaps there is no better example for the universal human thirst for God than the Samaritan woman at the well. The Samaritan woman has been living a sinful life and has struggled to live the virtue of chastity. Her reaction is typical and resembles most individuals' reactions to the truth of Christianity today, namely, rejection and anger. Over time, though, she realizes that Jesus is genuinely seeking her salvation and He longs to satisfy the desires of her heart. Just as Jesus sought the eternal salvation of the Samaritan woman, he seeks us out as well. He continually reaches out to us and desires our eternal salvation. Paragraph 27 of the Catechism provides us with a beautiful summary of the Gospel today: "The desire for God is written in the human heart, because man is created by God and for God; and God never ceases to draw man to himself. Only in God will he find the truth and happiness he never stops searching for." Will we allow God to draw us to Him?

Lectio Divina is a reflective reading and meditation on specific Scripture passages. This centuries-old practice of prayer relies on the Holy Spirit to guide the heart to the deeper meaning that God wants to convey through his Word.
