FROM OUR RECTOR

Dear Parishioners,

On behalf of our entire parish, I want to express my deepest gratitude to all who participated in our Lenten Blood Drive. Thanks to your generosity, we had 51 donors and were able to collect 53 units of blood—an incredible gift that will make a significant difference in the lives of many people in need. Your selflessness and commitment to this cause are a beautiful reflection of the Lenten spirit. Your actions are a true testament to our shared mission of love, compassion, and service to others.

Last weekend, the Cathedral was bustling with activity as the Archbishop presided over the Rite of Election, with over 690 catechumens and candidates participating. On Sunday, the Basilica was filled with their sponsors and guests, a beautiful indication of the growth of the Church through its evangelizing efforts. The Rite of Election marks the moment when those preparing to join the Catholic Church at Easter are formally presented to the Archbishop.

On Ash Wednesday, we began our Lenten journey of penance, prayer and conversion in preparation for the Church's annual celebration of the saving mysteries of Christ's passion, death and resurrection. In these days the Church asks us to ponder with joy and gratitude God's immense love revealed in the paschal mystery and to live ever more fully the new life we have received in Baptism.

This journey of spiritual renewal in the footsteps of Christ also calls us to acknowledge and respond to the growing spiritual and material poverty in our midst. Specifically, it means consciously resisting the pressure of a culture which thinks it can do without God, where parents no longer teach their children to pray, where violence, poverty and social decay are taken for granted. May this Lent, then, be a time when, as individuals and communities, we heed the words of the Gospel, reflect on the mysteries of our faith, practice acts of penance and charity, and open our hearts ever more fully to God's grace and to the needs of our brothers and sisters.

Make plans during this Lenten Season to join your fellow parishioners for the Stations of the Cross on Fridays of Lent at 7:00 p.m. Also, perhaps God is calling you to spend time with him in private prayer in adoration of the Blessed Sacrament. This will take place on Saturdays beginning at 3:30 pm and will conclude with Evening Prayer and Benediction at 4:30 pm.

ARCHBISHOP'S COLUMN

Let's Pivot Our Emotions into a Deeper Relationship with God

Scriptures give us examples of people who experience emotions and turn inward, instead of turning toward God

Dear brothers and sisters in Christ,

The readings this week, like a fine wine, contain a rich emotional variety.

The prophet Daniel notes: "we have sinned ... we have rebelled ... we are shamefaced." Rather than shame turning them away from God, Daniel encourages Israel to let shame turn them toward God.

Isaiah sounds an urgent call to repentance. "Hear the Word of the Lord, princes of Sodom ... people of Gomorrah!" He's speaking to Israel, trying to shock them into a moment of clarity and repentance by calling them Sodom and Gomorrah!

Perhaps the emotional palate of the week finds its most outstanding examples on the feast of St. Joseph (March 19). There are two possible Gospel readings for the day. In the reading from Matthew, we hear Joseph's reaction to finding out that Mary is pregnant, and he knows it's not with his child. Imagine his surprise and sorrow! See his firm obedience to the law in his resolve to divorce Mary, but also his generosity in resolving to divorce her quietly. See his fear, when the angel tells him not to be afraid. And when, in obedience to the angel, he takes Mary into his home, imagine his quiet determination in the face of the slander and gossip that he and Mary would have endured together. There's a lot of emotion there!

In the reading from the Gospel of Luke we hear about the anxiety of Joseph and Mary as they search for the child Jesus. We hear about their astonishment at finding Him in the temple, teaching the teachers. We hear of their puzzlement at His proclamation about

needing to be in His Father's house. And note: None of these emotions, in themselves, is a sin!

The great question is: What do we do with the rich variety of emotions we experience? With a fine wine all we have to do is experience and appreciate the different tastes. But with our emotions, the key is whether we experience them and turn in on ourselves, or whether we experience them and pivot into deeper relationship with God.

The final Gospel reading for the week is the parable of the Prodigal Son (Luke 15). The younger son experiences misery and pivots back toward his father. The father, experiencing sadness, pivots toward his younger son. The older son experiences anger and pivots into isolation. The father, in the face of that anger, pivots toward his older son and invites him to move from isolation back into relation.

We see this pattern all through the Gospels. The woman at the well pivots toward Jesus, while Pilate pivots away. After betraying Jesus, Peter pivots back into relationship with Him, while Judas pivots away.

Every human emotion can be taken up into our relationship with God. God never turns away from us, no matter what we're feeling. The question is, in the face of the rich variety of emotions we experience, do we turn toward God or away from God?

That might be a good thing to work on during Lent: To pivot on every human emotion into a deeper relationship with God.

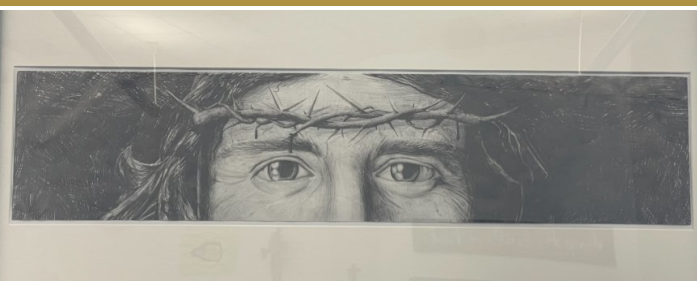

As Pope Benedict XVI wrote, “Images of beauty in which the mystery of the invisible God becomes visible, are an essential part of Christian worship...The image of Christ & the images of the saints are not photographs. Their whole point is to lead us beyond what can be apprehended at the merely material level, to awake new sense in us, & teach us a new kind of seeing, which perceives the Invisible in the visible.” (*The Spirit of the Liturgy*).

Lenten Sacred Art Series

Week 2: In Your Eyes, by Anne Papin

(located in the All Saints chapel)

“Jesus looked on him, and loved him (Mt. 10:21).”
 “When Jesus looked upon the crowds, His heart was moved with pity for them, for they were lost, like sheep without a shepherd (Mt. 9:36).” “But Jesus looked at them and said, “For men this is impossible, but for God all things are possible (Mt 19:26).” “God looked upon all He had made, and He found it very good (Gen. 1:31).”

This week’s featured piece of art, titled “In Your Eyes,” was completed by St. Dominic High School senior, Anne Papin. During this Lenten season we prepare our hearts to celebrate the events by which God Himself, in the Person of Jesus, redeemed and saved the world: His passion, death, and resurrection. In order to undergo death and resurrection, God Himself had to first become man. He had to take on our humble, mortal nature and all that it entails. “The

Word was made flesh,” we are told in the Prologue to John’s Gospel. As Christians, we profess that our Lord Jesus is both true God, and true man: fully divine and fully human. To look into the eyes of Jesus, therefore, is to look into the eyes of God.

Of course, Jesus has ascended to heaven in His humanity, so we do not have the opportunity to physically look into His eyes as did those who were alive during the time that He walked the earth. But in a real way, a spiritual corollary of looking upon and being looked upon by God is precisely what we are meant to do when we pray. “I am with you always, even until the end of the world,” are the final words uttered by Jesus in the Gospel of Matthew. While He may not stand before us with a body that we can physically see, or speak to us in a voice that we can audibly hear, He assures us that He is, nonetheless, with us always. In some sense this is the advantage to His having ascended to heaven. No longer do we have to seek Him out in the town or village in which He happens to be saying as did His first followers and disciples. Now, He assures us, He is with us everywhere. We can speak to Him everywhere. His eyes are upon us everywhere. In the Holy Eucharist, our eyes can look upon Him as He gives Himself to us under the appearances of bread and wine.

The simple notion of looking upon and being looked upon by Jesus – the Word made flesh, who looks with love and compassion upon the creatures He has come to save and whom He calls His friends – can be a powerful one. We can sometimes miss the point of prayer or diminish its fruitfulness by making it overcomplicated. Perhaps try making a simple act of faith that at this moment you are seen, and known, and loved by the God of the universe, who became man and died for you. What thoughts and feelings does this simple truth cause to well up within you? In this week’s image, we notice the crown of thorns piercing the Head of Jesus, just above the eyes with which He looks upon us. The crown of thorns represents for us Jesus’ victory over sin and death as well as the unimaginable depths of His love for us. It shows what lengths He is driven by that love. Are you able to accept that when the eyes of God look upon you, they see one whom the God the Father calls ‘son’ or ‘daughter’ and whom God the Son calls ‘friend?’
