## FROM OUR RECTOR

Dear Parishioners,

In a very short amount of time, our lives have changed drastically because of the outbreak of Coronavirus (Covid-19). It was just last week we were talking about “social distancing” at Mass, suspending the sign of peace and separate lines for Holy Communion. Things changed so quickly.

I would never have guessed that in my life-time, I would be celebrating Mass in the Cathedral Basilica at the Main Altar and not have a single person in the congregation. It breaks my heart. There are so many faithful Catholics that so much desire to receive Our Lord in the Holy Eucharist, and they are unable to do so. It breaks my heart.

The words of the Prophet Joel came to me in prayer this week: “return to me with your whole heart, with fasting weeping and mourning.” These words may sound familiar to you, and they are the words we heard on Ash Wednesday in our First Reading. I repeat them to you today because, in the midst of all the anxiety, stress, and unknown, the Lord is speaking to us. Return to me, return to me.

Even though you are unable to attend Mass, the Cathedral Basilica will remain open for private prayer and devotion. Confessions will be available Monday—Friday 12–1 pm, 3:30–5 pm on Saturday, and 9–12 on Sunday. Also, we will have the Blessed Sacrament exposed on Sunday from 9–12 at the main altar. We ask that during this time, everyone continues to remain at a safe distance from each other.

During a most recent Angelus, at the Vatican, our Holy Father, Pope Francis, addressed the faithful regarding the particular situation in which we find ourselves today.

“I am close to you in prayer to those who are suffering as a result of the current coronavirus epidemic, and to all those who are caring for them. I thought of them very much during the days I was on retreat. I join with my brother bishops in encouraging the faithful to live this difficult moment with the strength of faith, the certainty of hope and the fervour of charity. May the time of Lent help all of us to give an evangelical meaning also to this moment of trial and suffering.”

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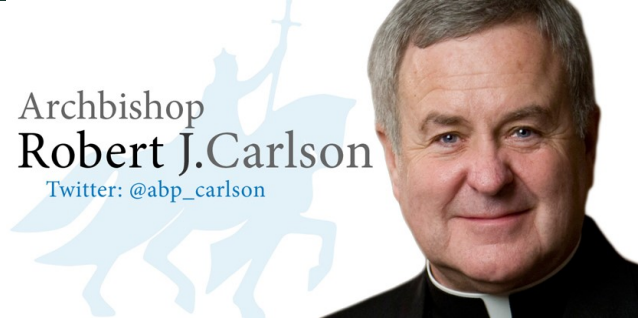

## BEFORE THE CROSS | How will we follow and serve Jesus?

When we encounter Jesus, He presses in at precisely the places we need to change

Lent turns a corner this week.

At the beginning of the week, the prophet Isaiah announces that God is “about to create a new heavens and a new earth.” Ezekiel describes his vision of the heavenly Temple, with the river of life flowing from its side bringing healing to the nations.

In perfect tandem, the Gospel readings show Jesus doing His second and third signs in the Gospel of John: healing the royal official’s son and healing a crippled man at the pool of Bethesda. These signs are perfect fulfillments of the readings from Isaiah and Ezekiel: Jesus Himself is the river of life, bringing healing.

At the end of the week, however, the book of Wisdom describes the wicked saying: “Let us beset the just one, because he is obnoxious to us ... With revilement and torture let us put him to the test ... Let us condemn him to a shameful death.” The prophet Jeremiah describes the people’s plot against him: “Let us destroy the tree in its vigor, let us cut him off from the land of the living.”

Again, in perfect tandem, the Gospel readings show that the Jewish leaders are trying to kill Jesus, and how a division occurs in the crowd because of Him.

What happened?

At the beginning of the week everything conspired to show God doing amazing things for his people. By the end of the week everything is falling apart and Holy Week begins to loom on the horizon.

What stands exactly in the middle of those things — the pivot point — is the feast of the Annunciation. God takes flesh in the womb of the Virgin Mary. It’s His greatest sign; it’s the means by which He will create the new heavens and the new earth. That’s precisely what the fickle, sinful heart of humanity can’t stand. We can’t stand it because when He comes, He presses in at precisely the places we need to change. It’s what the prophets did. It’s what Jesus did. Sinful hearts and habits don’t like it.

We like to think we’d do better. But perhaps we’re not that different from ancient Israel. The Body of Christ was physically present 2,000 years ago, and people found excuses not to believe in Him and not to serve Him. The Body of Christ is sacramentally present to us in the Eucharist today, and people find excuses not to believe in Him and not to serve Him. The Body of Christ is mystically present to us in the Church today, and people find excuses not to believe in Him and not to serve Him. The Body of Christ is present to us in the poor today, and people find excuses not to believe in Him and not to serve Him.

Like God’s people all through salvation history, we want to pick and choose how God is present to us and how we serve Him. But God isn’t satisfied with our picking and choosing. Today, as through all salvation history, He demands all.

Lent pivots this week on the Incarnation. So do our spiritual lives. When Jesus becomes present to us in the flesh, He asks: Will you follow me and serve me? The readings for the week show how sinful humanity has responded through all salvation history. Will we do better?

Just as the blind man could not see but obeyed the Lord, we too must continue to heed the voice of the Lord so that we may truly see with the eyes of faith. As the Pharisees shows us, it is often when we think we know it all or see everything already that the opposite is true. Jesus came that we may see. We pray that Jesus might open the eyes of our hearts and minds to see Him.

## PERPETUAL HELP DEVOTIONS

## Opening Hymn (Stand)

**Leader:** Let us kneel as we gather together to honor our Mother and our Perpetual Help. We recall how she helped others. Her whole life was a lesson in love.

**All:** Mother of Perpetual Help, today we face so many difficulties. Your picture tells us so much about you. It reminds us to reach out and help those in need. Help us understand that our lives belong to others as much as they belong to us. Mary, model of Christian love, we know we cannot heal every ill or solve every problem. But with God's grace, we intend to do what we can. May we be true witnesses to the world that love for one another really matters. May our daily actions proclaim how fully our lives are modeled after yours, Mother of Perpetual Help.

**Leader:** Mary, you were a woman of steadfast faith. Your faith in Jesus never wavered. Model of all believers, pray to the Holy Spirit for us. Help us not only to accept all your Son teaches us, but also to put that teaching into practice.

**All:** Mother of Perpetual Help, as a child Jesus ran to you for comfort and reassurance. You did not see him as only a frail child. Moved by the Holy Spirit you accepted Jesus as the Son of the Most High, the long-awaited Messiah. Following your example of faith, help us recognize Jesus in those we meet, especially the poor and the lonely, the sick and the elderly. Keep us always mindful, dear Mother, that whatever we do to the least of our brothers and sister, we do to your loving Son. **All:** May your mother intercede for us, Lord.

**Leader:** Grant peace and unity throughout the world, especially in our homes and families.

**All:** May your mother intercede for us, Lord.

**Leader:** Grant that young people respond generously to the call of the Holy Spirit in deepening their faith and choosing their vocation in life.

**All:** May your mother intercede for us, Lord.

**Leader:** Grant us continued health of mind and body, and help the sick, especially... to regain their health



according to your holy will.

**All:** May your mother intercede for us, Lord.

**Leader:** Grant eternal rest to all our deceased, especially... and to the souls of all the faithful departed.

**All:** May your mother intercede for us, Lord.

**Leader:** Let us pause now to silently present our own personal petitions to Our Mother of Perpetual Help.

**Leader:** Let us kneel as we continue our prayers:

**All:** Mary, humble handmaid of the Lord, we need your example today to discover God's will in our lives. You always gave God the first place in your life. Just as you pondered His Word in your heart, help each of us to seek his plan in all that we do.

Give us the conviction that nothing is more important than doing the will of our heavenly Father. May we spend each moment in loving and pleasing Him. Help us follow your example in proclaiming, I am the servant of the Lord. I will what God wills, when He wills it, as he wills it, because He wills it.

**Leader:** Mother of Perpetual help, your picture reminds us that we are to carry our cross as Jesus did. With courage, he endured injustice, abandonment and betrayal, pain and suffering, even a criminal's death.

**All:** Mary, we turn to you as our model in suffering and courage. You shared in your Son's suffering and death. Now you share in His Resurrection. We, too, share in the cross of Christ, and someday, like you, we will share fully in His Resurrection. Help us be patient in our suffering, and to trust in the loving care of our Father in heaven. May those suffering sickness in mind or body experience your Son's healing power. Help us follow his example, and through Him, with Him, and in Him, commend ourselves to the care of our heavenly Father.

**Leader:** Let us ask Mary to watch over all families.

**All:** Mother of Perpetual Help, bless our families with your tender, motherly love. May the sacrament of Marriage bring husbands and wives ever closer together that they may always be faithful, and love each other as Christ loves us. Help all mothers and fathers love and cherish the children God has en-

trusted to them. May they always be models of a truly Christian life. Help all children, that they may love and respect their parents. Inspire all people to value Christian marriage and family life. Give us a sense of responsibility that we may do our part in making our homes havens of love and peace. Mary, our model, help every family grow daily in genuine love for God and neighbor so that justice and peace may flourish everywhere in the human family.

(The following Act of Consecration is to be said the first week of the month.)

**Leader:** Let us renew our Act of Consecration.

**All:** United with the members of the Confraternity of Our Mother of Perpetual Help, here and throughout the world, we consecrate ourselves to your service. We promise to renew this dedication once a month and frequently to receive the sacraments. We beg you to obtain for us the grace to imitate your great servant, St. Alphonsus, in his love for you and your Son.

**Leader:** From the first moment of her existence, the Holy Spirit filled Mary with His love. By his power, she became the Virgin-Mother of God. Through the same Holy Spirit, she became the perfect wife, the perfect mother. Let us imitate her generosity, her openness to the Holy Spirit, and say,  
**All:** Come, Holy Spirit. Fill our hearts with your joy and your peace, with your power and your love, with your constant Presence within us.

**Leader:** Receive the Holy Spirit. May He be with you to strengthen you, above you to protect you, before you to lead you, behind you to encourage you, within you to possess you totally.
