FROM OUR RECTOR

Dear Parishioners,

This past Wednesday, we celebrated the Feast of St. Joseph, the Husband of Mary. It is essential to take time to reflect on his life and consider what it can teach us about our faith journey. Just as Our Lady experienced both joys and sorrows, St. Joseph closely participated in the lives of Jesus and Mary in the work of redemption.

Consider how the angel of the Lord appeared to St. Joseph to announce that he would be the guardian of the Redeemer. He was given the honor of naming the Christ Child. He was the first—after Our Lady—to see God in the flesh in the cave of Bethlehem. It was St. Joseph’s privilege to name Jesus at His circumcision. He also accompanied Mary to the temple in Jerusalem, experiencing a joy beyond imagination.

Yet St. Joseph also endured many sorrows in his chosen role. He heard the priest Simeon’s prophecy that Christ would suffer and that his wife’s heart would be pierced. He protected the Child from the bloodthirsty Herod, who sought to destroy Jesus in His infancy, as the Holy Family fled to Egypt. He sorrowfully searched for the adolescent Christ when He was lost for three days before finding Him in the temple.

St. Joseph understands both the joys and sufferings that come with being a disciple of Jesus Christ. No man was closer to Jesus than St. Joseph. Our Lord is a sign of contradiction, the cause of both the rise and the fall of many. As disciples of Christ, we, too, will experience both joys and sorrows. Take great confidence in St. Joseph, and pray to him that he may accompany, console, and inspire us on the road that leads to eternal life.

ARCHBISHOP'S COLUMN

Mary's Quick, Total & Steadfast Response is a Guide for Us

We are too often like ancient Israel, whose response to God's plan was hesitant & partial

Dear brothers and sisters in Christ,

Quick. Total. Steadfast.

We celebrate the feast of the Annunciation on March 25. These three words — quick, total, steadfast — are a good description of Mary's response to God's proposal and a rubric for our growth in the Christian life.

Quick

When Gabriel speaks to Mary, the weight of all history comes to a point, and the eternal fate of all humanity hangs in the balance. There is, to be sure, a brief pause to clear up a point rooted in modesty and honest puzzlement. But if you read the account of St. Luke out loud, it takes about 35 seconds for Mary to be all in. When God makes a proposal to us, how long does our reply take?

Total

The Annunciation asks Mary to give her body and soul to God. It also asks for her hopes and plans — basically for her whole life to be given over. Mary, at this moment, is a perfect example of the "Shema," the first and greatest commandment: You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, and soul, and mind, and strength. Measured by that standard, how do we do in responding to God's proposal?

Steadfast

Mary never wavered, even when she wondered. She never took back her "all in." From the Annunciation to the cross to the Dormition (Assumption), she kept going deeper. How about us?

When we look at the history of ancient Israel, we can gauge their faith by this same rubric. Their response to God is not quick; it's long, slow, and hesitant. Their

response to God is not total; they're half in, half out. Their response to God is not steadfast; they're three steps forward and two steps back. The prophet Hosea describes them perfectly in one of our readings for this week: "Your piety is like the morning cloud, like the dew that early passes away." That's not a quick, total, steadfast faith!

But let's keep in mind the old adage: Whenever you point a finger at someone, there are three fingers pointing right back at you! When we look at the faith of ancient Israel, we're actually holding up a mirror to our own experience of faith. We're slow, too. Even when we're quick, we're not all in. Even when we have our "all in" moments, we're not steadfast.

Where Israel needed repentance, Mary was perfect. Where Mary was perfect, she shows us the path of spiritual growth. If the long-range goal is for us to be like Mary in our response to God, the immediate goal is simply to get quicker, deeper and steadier. How can we do that?

If we study people's encounters with Jesus in the Gospels — seeing ourselves in them, and them in us — we can learn how to grow. When we see how their slowness is like ours, it holds up a mirror for us. When we see how our "all in" could be more like theirs, it holds out a possibility for us.

"If today you hear His voice, harden not your hearts." This was the call to ancient Israel precisely because they had, so often, responded to God's call with refusal and reluctance. Against that background, Mary shows us how to respond.

Quick. Total. Steadfast. There's our plan for growth!

Archbishop's Lenten Afternoon of Recollection

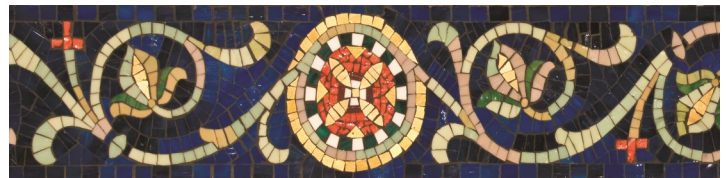

Sacred art is meant to assist in the raising of the mind & heart to God. As Pope Benedict XVI wrote, "Images of beauty in which the mystery of the invisible God becomes visible, are an essential part of Christian worship...The image of Christ & the images of the saints are not photographs. Their whole point is to lead us beyond what can be apprehended at the merely material level, to awake new sense in us, & teach us a new kind of seeing, which perceives the Invisible in the visible." (*The Spirit of the Liturgy*).

To assist in our Lenten journey, a different piece of sacred art will be displayed each week in the All Saints chapel of the Cathedral Basilica. Please feel free to visit & pray with these images along with the reflections provided in the bulletin as we journey toward the celebration of our Lord's Resurrection.



which Jesus, the Lamb of God, freed the world from sin.

John also here imitates a gesture of blessing that Jesus is often depicted making. In this gesture, the three raised fingers of John represent the three Persons of the Blessed Trinity, while the touching of his two other fingers represent the coming together of the human and divine natures of Jesus in the Incarnation. In this way, John is represented as the forerunner of the two most fundamental Mysteries of the Christian faith.

As the life and teaching of John demonstrate, one of the most important ways in which to prepare ourselves for the coming of Jesus and the saving work He wishes to accomplish is repentance. We very much turn our minds to our own need for repentance during this Lenten season. When we acknowledge our sins, we acknowledge our need for a Savior. Jesus Himself says that those who are healthy do not need a physician, but the sick do (Luke 5:31-32). Jesus is the Divine Physician who wishes to heal us and to make us healthy, but He never forces His healing upon us, just as He never forces His love upon us. Repentance is the way in which we invite Him in. We acknowledge the sins we have committed and for which we need to be forgiven, but it is also important for us to identify and acknowledge the underlying dispositions, sentiments, and possibly vices that help lead us into sin. These, too, Jesus wishes to heal. In taking away our sins, He wishes to make us strong to go forth and not succumb to them again.

What is an area of your life and your heart which is in need of the healing work of the Divine Physician? Invite that Lord into that place regularly over the course of this Lenten season. As John the Baptist recognized, Jesus is the Lamb of God who takes away the sins of the world. He invites us to repent: to look at and acknowledge our sins to ourselves and to Him. But He asks us to do so only so that He can take them away.

Lenten Sacred Art Series

Week 3: St. John the Baptist and Our Lord Jesus Christ by Maggie Jackson

(located in the All Saints chapel)

This week we feature two icons completed by Cathedral Basilica parishioner, Maggie Jackson. John the Baptist stands as the great transition figure between the Old and New Testaments. Through the centuries of Israel's history, God had raised up several prophets to communicate various messages and revelations to his people. Many of them spoke about the long-awaited Messiah figure whom God had promised would come in the fullness of time to establish a new and everlasting covenant between Himself and humanity. John stands at the end of this long line of prophecy. No longer is the Messiah someone whose coming is foretold as taking place in a distant future. John, instead, points to Jesus Christ before baptizing Him and says, "Behold, the Lamb of God, who takes away the sins of the world!" (John 1:29).

John further recognizes that the water baptism which he had been offering in the desert - a baptism wherein individuals were invited to publicly repent of their sins and ask God's forgiveness - Jesus would institute a new baptism. The Baptism instituted by Jesus not only gives recipients the opportunity to repent of their sins, but is actually effective for the taking away of sins. For this reason, very often in iconography and other Christian art, John is depicted as pointing at Jesus. In this image, his staff which represents the austere lifestyle which John embraced in the desert, is mounted with a cross: the instrument by
