### FROM OUR RECTOR

### PASTORAL STAFF

Dear Parishioners,

In the wake of the recent devastating storms and tornadoes that have impacted our region, many of our brothers and sisters are facing great hardship. The destruction has been significant, especially in Franklin, Jefferson, Perry, and St. Louis Counties, where more than 2,000 households have reported damage.

As a community of faith, we are called to respond with love, compassion, and action. Catholic Charities of the Archdiocese of St. Louis is working tirelessly alongside local emergency teams to provide much-needed relief, including case management, mental health counseling, and long-term recovery assistance.

To support these critical efforts, Archbishop Rozanski invites you to join in a **special collection at all Masses this weekend, March 29-30**. Your generosity will help families begin the difficult journey of rebuilding their lives. All funds collected will be directed to Catholic Charities, ensuring that aid reaches those who need it most.

This Sunday, known as Laetare Sunday (the Sunday of Gladness), invites us to pause for a moment from the solemnity of Lent. The traditional purple of penance gives way to the soft rose color, as if offering us a foretaste of the joy of Easter.

The joy encouraged by the Liturgy does not stem from the state of the world, which often gives little reason to rejoice. Yet, despite this, the Liturgy calls us to rejoice because Easter is near—the celebration of Christ's victory over sin and death.

Publicans and sinners gathered around Jesus, drawn by someone who could truly speak to their hearts and offer hope for a renewed future. Feeling condemned and without escape, they found in Him a reason to hope. In contrast, the Pharisees and scribes criticized Jesus, murmuring, "He receives sinners and eats with them." To them, His merciful approach was scandalous. But for those sinners, Jesus' presence was not a scandal—it was good news. It was the Gospel.

# Heaven is Greater than Our Greatest Joys

Let's do the work of developing images of heaven that are worth living & sacrificing for

Dear brothers and sisters in Christ,

How do you imagine heaven?

I ask for several reasons. First, because the Scripture readings this week look forward with hope — but they look forward with hope precisely in order to strengthen us for the rigors of the way of the cross. Second, because the readings this week speak of the resurrection and offer several images of heaven.

In his 2007 encyclical on hope ("Spe Salvi"), Pope Benedict XVI asked whether we imagine heaven in a way that makes us really want it.

First, he simply noted a question: "Do we really want this — to live eternally?"

He asked because he sensed a contradiction in human hearts. On the one hand, we certainly don't want to die! On the other hand, we don't really want to continue to live this life in an endless succession of days — which is, often, all we imagine heaven to be. Honestly, an endless succession of days becomes a spiritual prison at some point.

But he also offered an alternative way to imagine heaven. He said: "Eternity is not an unending succession of days on the calendar, but something more like a supreme moment of satisfaction ... It would be like plunging into the ocean of infinite love, a moment in which time — the before and after — no longer exists."

Have you ever had a moment like that — a moment of satisfaction where time stood still and you were content that it did so? Perhaps it was a moment of joy, a moment of being healed of sickness, a moment of peaceful conscience. Whatever it was, what if that was a foretaste of eternal life?

# SERVE THE LORD WITH GLADNESS



The Gospel shows that following Jesus is what unlocks access to eternal life. But that's only good news if people want eternal life. If people don't really want it, their reaction will be: "Meh."

Of course, no finite image will be adequate to the infinite joys of heaven. But we're creatures who are moved by images, and God made us that way. So this problem presents itself: How can we do a better job imagining heaven to increase our desire for eternal life?

St. Anselm had a famous theological axiom: God is that than which nothing greater can be thought. I propose we apply that same theological discipline to our imagination: Heaven is that than which no greater joy can be imagined.

Imagine your favorite thing. Heaven, by St. Anselm's discipline, has to be greater! A morning on the beach? Greater than that. An evening in the mountains? Greater than that. A fine glass of wine or a deep conversation with a friend? Greater than that.

We don't all need to have the same images of heaven. But we can all engage in the same discipline: Reminding ourselves that heaven is greater than our greatest joys. If we engage this discipline, then our imagination can help move our desire for eternal life, our desire can help move our belief in Jesus and our belief in Jesus will unlock access to eternal life.

How do you imagine heaven? Let's do the work of developing images that are worth living for, worth sacrificing for and able to win others to desire eternal life.

### Lenten Sacred Art Series

Sacred art is meant to assist in the raising of the mind & heart to God. As Pope Benedict XVI wrote, "Images of beauty in which the mystery of the invisible God becomes visible, are an essential part of Christian worship...The image of Christ & the images of the saints are not photographs. Their whole point is to lead us beyond what can be apprehended at the merely material level, to awake new sense in us, & teach us a new kind of seeing, which perceives the Invisible in the visible." (*The Spirit of the Liturgy*).

To assist in our Lenten journey, a different piece of sacred art will be displayed each week in the All Saints chapel of the Cathedral Basilica. Please feel free to visit & pray with these images along with the reflections provided in the bulletin as we journey toward the celebration of our Lord's Resurrection.







Lenten Sacred Art Series Week 4: The Blessed Virgin Mary, Mother of Jesus by Various Artists (located in the All Saints chapel)

Our Lenten journey is just over halfway complete. This week we turn our attention to the Blessed Virgin Mary as she is depicted in multiple Renaissance-style paintings.

On March 25<sup>th</sup>, we celebrated the Solemnity of the Annunciation of the Lord: the day that the angel appeared to Mary and revealed to her that, according to the eternal wisdom of God the Father, she had been chosen to be the one through whom God the Son would make His dramatic entrance into human history. The Gospel for that day ends with Mary's *Fiat*: "Behold, I am the handmaid of the Lord. May it be done to me according to your word." The total handing over of Mary's will and life to the will of God is an important example for all of us. In every aspect of her life, she lived the words which her divine Son would teach His disciples when they asked Him how to pray: "Thy will be done, on earth as it is in heaven."

Mary's *Fiat* did not come to an end with the birth of Jesus, of course. Those who have been praying the Stations of the Cross throughout this Lenten season know well that she was there as her Son was tortured, mocked and spit upon, and that she remained at the foot of His Cross until He died. How painfully Simeon's prophecy that a sword of sorrow would pierce her heart was brought to fulfillment on the afternoon of Good Friday. Mary's "may it be done to me

according to your word" meant that she would accept her role not only as the Mother of the Redeemer, but that she would also be Our Lady of Sorrows as she agonized by the side of her only Son.

In addition to the example of her *Fiat*, Mary is also the foremost model of holiness and prayer in the life of the Church. As with all of the saints, Mary's holiness is a direct result of her nearness to Jesus. The unique level of intimacy which she enjoyed with Jesus in carrying Him in her womb for nine months and then raising Him during those quiet years at Nazareth resulted in a unique level of holiness in the life and person of the blessed Mother. It is true to say that she knew Jesus – God the Son – better than any other human being in history. Simply being with Him, looking upon Him, and listening to Him resulted in the profound sanctity of the Blessed Mother. So too will nearness to Jesus result in sanctity within each of us. Being with Jesus, looking upon Him, and receiving Him into our very bodies in the Holy Eucharist are all actions which we can carry out along with Mary and that, like her, can make us saints.

Just because Jesus has ascended to heaven does not mean that He is no longer available to us. Indeed, He has promised that He is with us always. In fact, Mary was referred to by the angel as "full of grace" even before Jesus was conceived in her womb. Mary's relationship with the God who would become man began well before He took flesh in her womb, and so can our relationship and "being with" Jesus continue well after He has ascended in the flesh to heaven. Perhaps during these final weeks of Lent, we might focus on simplifying our prayer. Instead of trying to find more and more things to say to Jesus, simply take time to quiet yourself, make an act of faith that He is really present with you, and take time to be with Him and even listen to Him. In the midst of all of the noise that is so characteristic of our hectic culture, this can be challenging, but Mary's example reminds us that this is how saints are made. May we take time to simply be with Jesus, and like Mary, ever say, "May it be done to me according to your word."
