FROM OUR RECTOR

Dear Parishioners,

This Sunday's Gospel opens by recalling the nights and days leading up to Jesus' Passion. It is likely that His encounter with the adulterous woman took place within this context. Confronted by scribes and Pharisees armed with stones, ready to condemn the woman, Jesus bent down and began to "write with His finger on the ground." While we do not know what He wrote, we can imagine the Pharisees' growing frustration as they pressed Him to affirm the woman's death sentence.

Instead of answering immediately, Jesus raised His head and spoke words that resonated deeply with everyone present: **"Let anyone among you who is without sin be the first to throw a stone at her."** Then, He bent down again to write on the ground. Rather than invoking the law, Jesus sought to make them recognize their own sins. His intention was not merely to save a life but to expose the human tendency to accuse others in order to justify oneself—an impulse that remains deeply ingrained in all of us today.

We can all see ourselves in that woman. How many times have we, too, betrayed Jesus' love in pursuit of other affections—perhaps even the love of self, which so easily leads us to forget the Gospel, our brothers and sisters, and the poor?

The adulterous woman reminds us of the immense gift of standing before Jesus. Through her, we rediscover how deeply the Lord loves us.

As we prepare to celebrate the week of Jesus' Passion, death, and resurrection, let us keep our eyes fixed on Him. Let us allow ourselves to be seen and challenged by His gaze. In doing so, we will come to realize that it is Jesus who longs for our love and our companionship.

As we enter into Holy Week, I would like to remind everyone of our liturgies during Holy Week. Mass of the Lord's Supper will be at 7:30 p.m. on Thursday evening. It marks the end of Lent and the beginning of the sacred "Triduum," of Holy Week. These days are the three holiest days in the Catholic Church. On Good Friday, we will gather at 3:00 p.m. During this time, the entire Church fixes her gaze on the Cross at Calvary. Each member of the Church tries to understand at what cost Christ has won our redemption. The Easter Vigil will begin at 8:00 p.m. in the front of our church with the lighting and blessing of the Easter Fire.

ARCHBISHOP'S COLUMN

Crying Out to God When We Face Trials Deepens Our Relationship with Him

Scriptural stories of trial foreshadow the passion of Jesus during Holy Week

Dear brothers and sisters in Christ,

It's the week before Holy Week. Our readings feature trials, people's responses to trials and how God gets the last word in those trials.

We hear about Susanna, who's falsely accused of adultery. We hear about Israel, tried by hunger in the desert. We hear about Shadrach, Meshach and Abednego being threatened with the fiery furnace. We hear about the plots against Jeremiah. And finally, we witness mounting tension against Jesus, culminating in the plot to kill Him.

The episodes of trial from ancient Israel are chosen for this week because they foreshadow Jesus' experience of Holy Week. Psalm 18 captures the theme well: "The breakers of death surged round about me, the destroying floods overwhelmed me; the cords of the nether world enmeshed me, the snares of death overtook me."

If the ancient episodes are foreshadow Jesus, however, they do so with a twist! The story of Susanna's trial is a perfect example. It ends by saying: "Thus was innocent blood spared that day." The story of Jesus' trial, by contrast, would have to say: "Thus was innocent blood shed that day."

Looking at people's response to their trials, it's not all stories of faithfulness and trust! Yes, when Susanna faces her trial, she cries out to God. But when Israel faces their trial, they complain against God and Moses. We're familiar with both responses from our own experience! If the episodes about crying out mark a path for us, then the episode about complaining provides a warning. Psalm 102 captures the theme and walks us down the right road: "O Lord, hear my prayer, and let my cry come to you."

Finally, we hear how God gets the last word in His people's trials. And here again the ancient episodes foreshadow Jesus' experience with a twist. God saves Susanna from death; God saves the Israelites from death; God saves Shadrach, Meshach and Abednego from death. By contrast, the Father does not save Jesus from death. Rather He rescues Him — and saves us — through death. Those are two different kinds of witness to how God gets the last word.

We all face our own trials in life. When we do, it's good to know that we're walking the same path as our ancestors in faith.

In our response to those trials we know how easy it is to fall into a pattern of complaining. It's nice to know that there's a different way to go. We don't have to deny that trials are hard! But if we pivot on the hardship into crying out, rather than complaining, we'll deepen our relationship with God.

Finally, it's helpful to know that when we cry out, God has the last word. Sometimes He saves us from death. Sometimes He brings us through death to resurrection.

As we get ready to walk with Jesus into His passion, it's comforting to know that Jesus walks with us into the passions we endure in our lives. That doesn't make them easy! But it can fill our suffering with meaning.

"In my distress I called upon the Lord, and cried out to my God; from His temple He heard my voice, and my cry to Him reached His ears (Psalm 18)."

As Pope Benedict XVI wrote, "Images of beauty in which the mystery of the invisible God becomes visible, are an essential part of Christian worship...The image of Christ & the images of the saints are not photographs. Their whole point is to lead us beyond what can be apprehended at the merely material level, to awake new sense in us, & teach us a new kind of seeing, which perceives the Invisible in the visible." (*The Spirit of the Liturgy*).

To assist in our Lenten journey, a different piece of sacred art will be displayed each week in the All Saints chapel of the Cathedral Basilica. Lenten Sacred Art Series

Week 5: Conversion of St. Francis, by Evelyn Estegno

(located in the All Saints chapel)

This week's painting comes to us from local artist Evelyn Estegno, and she offers the following reflection on the conversion of St. Francis.

"St. Francis' conversion, as most conversions, was a gradual process that took place over several years. It was marked by a few strong experiences, the most significant of which, represented at the center of the painting, was the encounter with a leper. Before this crucial moment, the first turning point in his life was his capture and imprisonment following a battle with rival city Perugia in 1202. Upon being released, he returned to Assisi (referenced in the castle on the top left). No longer interested in the worldly amusements of his past nor in pursuing a military career (epitomized by the abandoned horse and body armor in the ground), he found himself more deeply drawn to solitary prayer.

Over the next two years, he began to lead a "life of penance." This included not only mortification and self-denial but also a new vision of reality: seeing the world from God's point of view: a creation filled with beauty, joy, and goodness, reflecting the goodness and love of God our Creator, who deserves highest praise, worship, and love in return.

The saint carried a deep fear and repugnance of lepers. One day as he was travelling on horseback near Assisi, he stumbled upon a leper. By God's grace, he was moved to lean into his fear, to walk up to the leper and kiss him. The leper reached out his

hand in need of money, so St. Francis gave him some money. When St. Francis went to mount his horse, he turned, and saw the leper was gone. He knew then it was Jesus whom he had encountered.

St. Francis writes in his Testament, "The Lord gave me, Brother Francis, thus to begin doing penance in this way: for when I was in sin, it seemed too bitter for me to see lepers. The Lord Himself led me among them and I showed mercy to them. And when I left them, what had seemed bitter to me was turned into sweetness of soul and body. And afterwards I delayed a little and left the world." What was repulsive at first became a source of joy.

I chose to depict Francis kissing the leper/ Jesus in disguise's foot instead of His face, to highlight the devotion and submission of the saint. Jesus as the leper looks directly at us, with one hand blessing the young convert, and with the other extended to us as an invitation to follow the saint's steps. The love that God gives us (as my religious paintings are all about God's love for us) is expressed in the opportunities He gives to love Him and our neighbor, through mercy and sacrifice. God asks a lot at times. He asks us to embrace an extremely heavy cross that only He can help us carry, but it's through the acceptance of this commandment, that we experience all the depth, meaning and sweetness of true love.

On the right side, the path becomes obscured by the uncertainty of the future. The path leads to la Portiuncola, where the Franciscan movement started. While praying in the ruined church of San Damiano, Jesus told Francis, "Francis, rebuild my church, which is falling into ruin." Francis took the request literally and began rebuilding the church, stealing cloth and a horse from his father to fund the project. Francis later realized that Jesus was asking him to rebuild the Christian Church, not just the church in San Damiano.

In the background behind Jesus, is the outline of mount La Verna, where the Saint received the stigmata toward the end of his life, when he was facing a great crisis.

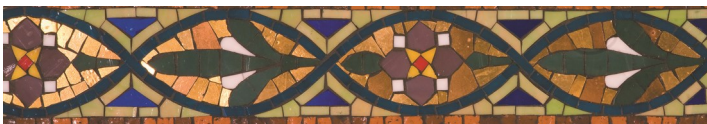
