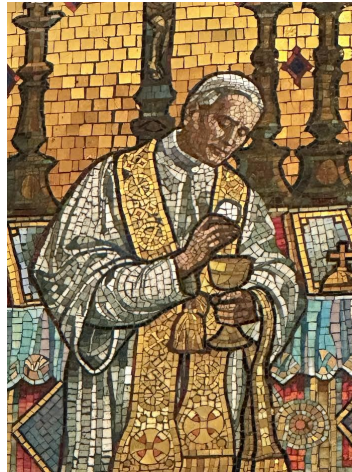

FROM OUR RECTOR

Dear Parishioners,

On this Sunday of Easter, the Gospel according to Gospel of Luke brings us back to that first Easter day. Remarkably, the evangelist has Jesus spend much of that day walking with just two disciples on the road to Emmaus. One of them is named, but the other remains anonymous—as if to suggest that the unnamed disciple is each of us.



These two disciples are leaving Jerusalem with heavy hearts. They are sad, discouraged, and resigned. The one in whom they had placed all their hopes—Jesus of Nazareth—has been crucified. As they say with deep disappointment: *“We had hoped...”* Those words echo not only their sorrow, but the quiet resignation that can so often take hold in our own lives.

How familiar this sounds. How many today look at the world and feel that same discouragement? Faced with the persistence of war, the suffering of so many, the isolation of the elderly, and the many choices in our world that seem to lead not to life but to loss. It is easy to feel that nothing can really change. Like those disciples, we can begin to walk away—quietly, perhaps even unconsciously—from hope itself. Yet it is precisely into this sadness that the Gospel of Easter breaks in.

Then it is necessary to sit at table with the Lord, to share the banquet with him, so that his humble presence in the Sacrament of his Body and Blood may restore to us the gaze of faith. That we may see everything and everyone with God’s eyes, in the light of his love. The Eucharist is the maximum expression of the gift which Jesus makes of himself and is a constant invitation to live our lives all that the Eucharist is, as a gift to God and to others.

Each Divine Mercy Sunday, I remember a woman in the hospital I visited a number of years ago who was advanced in age. She related her life story to me and shared that she had no family left at all. Her friends, she said, became her adopted family. What I found so impactful was what she then related to me. She wakes up each morning and says: "Thank you, God for this day." Which is followed by: "God, I trust in You." For her, it is that simple and I walked away that day inspired by her faith.

ARCHBISHOP'S COLUMN

The Church's Teaching on Transubstantiation Can Transform Our Work in the World

We face the same choice of those who heard Jesus talk about His flesh being the Bread of Life

Dear brothers and sisters in Christ,

There's no way around it: We're reading the "Bread of Life" discourse from John 6 this week, and Jesus insistently draws our attention to His Body and Blood in the Eucharist.

What Jesus says in John 6 matches the accounts of the Last Supper in Matthew 26, Mark 14 and Luke 22. Jesus says of the bread, "this is my Body," and He says of the wine, "this is my Blood." St. Paul recounts this same thing in 1 Corinthians 11. This is the teaching handed on to him by the earliest believers.

Jesus had the opportunity to qualify what He said about His flesh being the Bread of Life. He could have said: "I was just speaking metaphorically." He didn't. Instead, He doubled down on the literal meaning, shifting from a general term for "eating" (which might have been interpreted symbolically) to a graphic term — more like "chewing" or "gnawing" — which left no doubt about his point.

That, fundamentally, is why we talk about the "Real Presence" of Christ in the Eucharist: because He said it and clearly meant it. And it was shocking to those who first heard it. The common response is captured well in John 6:66: "After this many of His disciples drew back and no longer walked with Him." We face the same choice.

The Church developed her teaching on the Real Presence of Christ in the Eucharist even more precisely in the doctrine of transubstantiation (see Catechism of the Catholic Church 1373-1376). In simple terms, this means that the outward appearance

(in technical language, the "species") remains what it was — bread and wine — while the inward reality (in technical language, the "substance") really becomes the Body and Blood of Christ. These terms translate, into precise philosophical language, what Jesus said: this is my Body, this is my Blood, and unless you eat my Flesh and drink my Blood, you have no life in you.

Though not exactly the same, this teaching is related to the pledge of transformation that Jesus makes to us. Our outward reality can remain the same, even while the inner reality of our lives is radically transformed by faith in Jesus. We see this every time a person is baptized: They look the same before and after, but — in their deepest reality — they have become something different. St. Paul echoes this when he says: "I live now, no longer I, but Christ lives in me" (Galatians 2:20).

Again, though not exactly the same, this teaching is related to how as Christians we're called to interact with the world. Being a Christian doesn't mean we have to leave our secular occupation. In that sense, the "outward reality" can remain the same. But the deepest reality is that, whatever work we do, we're working to transform the world, drawing it more and more closely to the kingdom of God.

The Church's teaching on transubstantiation, then, is not some abstract doctrine with little practical import. It's grounded in Jesus' own words. It has deep implications for our identity. And it can transform our work in the world.

Why A Registered Parishioner

Due to the number of requests for baptisms and weddings, the Cathedral Parish adopted a policy years ago that generally requires parents to be registered parishioners of the parish before their infant may be baptized here, or for an engaged person to be a registered parishioner and practicing Catholic for a minimum of one year for preferred dates and for a more modest stipend. Non-parishioners must be registered in a Catholic parish somewhere and will need to secure their pastor's permission to be baptized or married outside of their proper parish before we can schedule any ceremony. 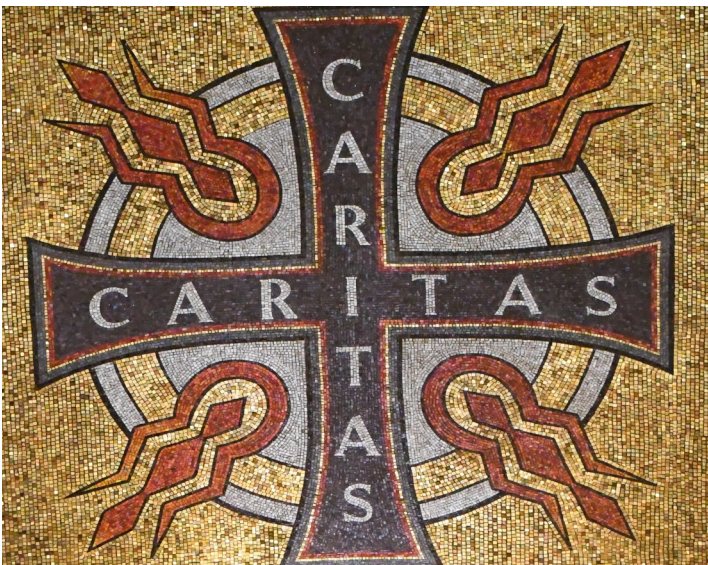
