FROM OUR RECTOR

Dear Parishioners,

This week, we celebrated the funeral for one of our long-time parishioners, Rosemary Shaughnessy, the wife of Joe Shaughnessy. Rosemary was born in Springfield, IL, in 1935 and met the love of her life in the fall of 1956. Rosemary was a quiet source of strength to her husband and seven children. Joe and Rosemary were strong supportors of the parish and loved being able to call the Cathedral their parish home. Please pray for the repose of her soul and for the family that is mourning this great loss.



We read in our Gospel this week: "I am the true vine, and my Father is the vine grower. He takes away every branch in me that does not bear fruit, and every one that does he prunes so that it bears more fruit." There is no stage in life that does not require change and corrections, that is, pruning. These cuts, at times very painful, purify our lives and make the sap of the Lord's love run more freshly.

Perhaps some of your branches have begun to grow in the wrong direction. Or maybe your flesh has "sprouted" a branch that, if left unpruned, would drain the strength out of your spirit and your spiritual life. It's an unholy branch that would eventually destroy your effectiveness, causing you to have no beautiful blooms and no fruit.

You don't have to be doing something wrong to be pruned. It's actually when you are doing things right that pruning takes place. So look, you are pruned if you do and pruned if you don't. You might as well deal with it and let God produce His fruit in you. But there is one sure thing: It's better to be cut back than to be cut off.

ARCHBISHOP'S COLUMN

Saints exemplify Christ's dwelling in us God seeks to be present in us in new ways

Dear brothers and sisters in Christ,

There have been some great lineups in sports history. This week, the Church gives us a great lineup of saints: St. Catherine of Siena (April 29), St. Pius V (April 30), St. Joseph the Worker (May 1), St. Athanasius (May 2) and Sts. Philip and James (May 3).

Those saints matter because the Gospel readings this week focus on the truth of "indwelling."

Jesus is giving His farewell discourse in the Gospel of John. First, He speaks of the indwelling of the Father and the Son: "Believe me, that I am in the Father and the Father is in me" (John 14:11). Then, He speaks of the Father and the Son together dwelling in us: "Whoever loves me will keep my word, and my Father will love him, and we will come to him and make our dwelling with him" (John 14:23). Finally, He speaks of our dwelling in Him and His dwelling in us: "I am the vine, you are the branches. Whoever remains in me and I in him will bear much fruit" (John 15:5).

By the way, it's interesting that "I am the vine" is the seventh of the "I am" statements in the Gospel of John. That means this statement — with its theme of indwelling — serves as a kind of capstone statement about Jesus' identity and our relation with Him.

St. Thomas Aquinas had something important to say about this theme. He noted that God is already present everywhere. But that raises a question: How can He "come to dwell" somewhere if He's already there? St. Thomas answered that God doesn't come to be present where He wasn't before, but that God comes to be present in a new way. So, for example, in baptism, the Holy Spirit comes to dwell in a new way in the baptized. In the Eucharist, Christ comes to dwell in a new way in those who receive.

In this sense, Mary is the exemplar of all Christians. God was already present in her in one sense. But, in the Incarnation, God came to dwell in her in a new ARCHBISHOP MITCHELL ROZANSKI

and deeper way. That's the pattern for every one of us: God wants to dwell in us spiritually as He came to dwell in Mary physically. As we enter the month of May — the month of Mary — it's worth thinking about how we say "yes" to that indwelling.

Blessed Isaac of Stella has a beautiful reflection on this theme, too, and the Church gives us that reflection in the Office of Readings this week. Without getting into all the complexities of his thought (which is rich, and worth reading!), suffice it to say that he presents the indwelling of Christ and us in terms of the relationship between head and body: Christ is united with us, and we with Him, as deeply as the head and body are united. The body without the head — us without Christ dwelling in us — is like the branches without the vine: "apart from me, you can do nothing."

And that, in the end, is why the great lineup of saints this week matters. They're a living testimony to what happens when we let Christ dwell in us, and we dwell in Him: We can become saints on earth and ultimately citizens of heaven.



The Gospel of the Lord

Jesus said to his disciples: "I am the true vine, and my Father is the vine grower. He takes away every branch in me that does not bear fruit, and every one that does he prunes so that it bears more fruit. You are already pruned because of the word that I spoke to you. Remain in me, as I remain in you. Just as a branch cannot bear fruit on its own unless it remains on the vine, so neither can you unless you remain in me. I am the vine, you are the branches. Whoever remains in me and I in him will bear much fruit, because without me you can do nothing. Anyone who does not remain in me will be thrown out like a branch and wither; people will gather them and throw them into the fire and they will be burned. If you remain in me and my words remain in you, ask for whatever you want and it will be done for you. By this is my Father glorified, that you bear much fruit and become my disciples."

John 15:1-8

The True Vine

Today's reading from the Gospel of John is part of Jesus' discourse at the Last Supper. John tells the story of the Last Supper quite differently from the other three Evangelists. In John's Gospel account, the Last Supper opens with Jesus washing his disciple's feet. Afterward, Jesus provides the disciples with a series of instructions. Also, known as Jesus' farewell discourse, these chapters of John's Gospel highlight Jesus' instructions to his disciples to follow his example of love and service, about the gift they will receive when Jesus sends the Holy Spirit, and about the work they are to do in the world.

In today's Gospel reading, Jesus speaks about his relationship with his disciples. In his metaphor of the vine and branches, Jesus is referencing the Hebrew Scriptures. In the Hebrew Scriptures, Israel is the vineyard and Yahwe is the one who tends to the vineyard. The overarching theme of John's Gospel is to show Jesus as to be the fulfillment of God's promises to Israel. In this passage, Jesus teaches his disciples that his relationship with them will not end after his death; he will remain with them always. This ongoing unity serves as the basis for the disciples to continue the work that Jesus began. Similarly, Jesus' presence with us today through the Holy Spirit enables us to continue the work of love and service to others.

Jesus also teaches the disciples about the importance of his words and that they will remain with them also. We come to know Jesus through the scriptures. Our commitment to being his disciples and continuing his work is strengthened through the living Word of God. We observe people everyday who act in ways that show their commitment to serve their neighbor. Christians and non-Christians feed the hungry, care for the sick, and give shelter to the homeless. These acts become acts of Christian discipleship when they are motivated by our relationship with Jesus. Regardless of the immediate or long-term results these actions have, Jesus promises that they will bear fruit and grow when we undertake them in his name.
