FROM OUR RECTOR

Dear Parishioners,

This past week, I have seen some definite progress in returning to some normalcy that was seen prior to the start of the pandemic. The Mary Ryder Home is located on Olive Street, just a bit north of the Basilica, and serves vulnerable senior women. Prior to the pandemic, a group of parish volunteers brought the Catholic residents communion on Sundays. I am pleased to announce we are resuming this ministry. In addition, we are hoping to resume communion to the homebound as well.

The Ministry of Care of the Cathedral Basilica Parish is a group of volunteers who bring Holy Communion to nursing homes and the homebound. This ministry manifests the support and concern of the parish community for its members who are not able to be present at Mass. As nursing homes open for volunteers and the homebound feel more comfortable having guests in their homes, you might consider assisting in this ministry. If so, please call the rectory, and we will connect you with the facilitator of the ministry.

In this time of Easter, the Liturgy often makes us meditate on Jesus' speech to the disciples at the Last Supper as reported by John. It is the longest of the Gospel speeches. And, in this time, the Church, in order to keep alive in us the power of the mystery of Easter, breaks it and proposes it again. Jesus continues the allegory of the vine and the branches and thus indicates to the disciples the quality of the relationship they must have with him: "I am the vine and you are the branches." And he adds: "No one has greater love than this, to lay down one's life for one's friends."

This is the type of love with which Jesus loves us. And he repeats to us that he does it first, even without our merit. His love is free. John himself reminds us of this in his First Letter: "In this is love, not that we loved God but that he loved us and sent his Son to be the atoning sacrifice for our sins" (1 Jn 4:10).

This is the love in which we are called. In order to make us understand it well, Jesus reduces it to one: "This is my commandment, that you love one another as I have loved you." Love among the disciples is the only commandment. This is the love with which the Father loves the Son and the Son loves the disciples. As his disciples, it is our only commandment.

Jesus is our example of embodying the Father's reconciling love

Readings this week prompt reflection on how we treat those

Dear brothers and sisters in Christ,

we consider to be enemies

We hear some of the "we" passages from the Acts of the Apostles this week. Typically, the Acts of the Apostles describes what "they" did — mainly Peter and Paul. But in a few instances it talks about what "we" did. Perhaps the author joined Paul on some of his journeys?

I'll leave that question to the biblical scholars! But pondering the shift from "they" to "we" makes me think of something that doesn't require a biblical scholar to sort out. How do we treat those we consider to be our enemies — whether personal, cultural or political? Do we treat them as "they" or as "we?"

Think of how God treated humanity when we conducted ourselves as enemies of God. The Father sent His Son to reconcile us, to bring us back, because from God's perspective we never stopped being "His people." In a beautiful passage at the start of the book of the Prophet Isaiah, God says: "Come now, let us set things right, says the LORD. Though your sins be like scarlet, they may become white as snow; though they be crimson red, they may become white as wool" (Isaiah 1:18). Notice the use of "us" language in the midst of naming our sinfulness. This is a revelation of the character of God. He doesn't treat us as enemies even when we conduct ourselves like enemies.

Think of how Jesus treated humanity when we were lost in sin. He took on our flesh. He paid the price for our sins on the Cross. He offered to make us one flesh with Him in the Eucharist. He sent the Holy Spirit so we could share His nature. It doesn't make any sense from the perspective of fallen humanity — that's not how we treat those who oppose us! But it makes perfect sense from a divine perspective. This is how the Father acts, and Jesus is the eternal image of the Father's love. Therefore, when He comes in the flesh, Jesus perfectly embodies the Father's reconciling love.

Think of St. Damien de Veuster who served the leper colony of Moloka'i, and whose feast day we celebrate this week (May 10). The leper colony was a physical threat to his health and life. But, like Jesus, that didn't stop him from entering into their life, treating the leper colony as "us" rather than "them."

That's the God in whose image and likeness we're made. That's the Jesus who calls us to follow Him. That's a saint who shows us the way. Looking around at how we treat our enemies today, we're not doing a very good job living up to our nature and following our call!

Does that means we're supposed to pretend everything is OK when people oppose us or, more importantly, oppose the Gospel and the teachings of the Church? Of course not! What we're supposed to do is harder and costs more. We're supposed to love them, to be willing to pay the price for their sins in our lives — to treat others the way God has treated us.

"What if they don't repent?" God's love for us does not depend on our repentance. The offer comes first; our decision comes after. The question is, can we imitate that love toward those who conduct themselves as our enemies?

Fallen humanity struggles to imitate God's love. But we were made for it, and we're called to it. As we begin to prepare for Pentecost, let's pray for this gift, and open ourselves to receive it.

Ascension Sunday

The Rectory Office continues to receive a number of inquiries regarding the transfer of the Solemnity of **Ascension** to the Seventh Sunday of Easter. The transfer of Ascension was implemented in 1999 in a majority of provinces in the U.S., including Missouri. **Accordingly, the Feast of the Ascension of the Lord will be observed next Sunday, May 16; and Thursday, May 13, is NOT a holy day of obligation for Mass attendance.**

The First Real Novena

The days between Ascension Thursday and Pentecost Sunday form the original novena in the life of the Church. The Scriptures state: "the apostles and the Lord's own Mother with them" (Acts 1:14) waited in prayer and vigil for the promised gift of the Holy Spirit. In the liturgical calendar of the Church the days between Ascension and Pentecost are a time of special prayer for the gifts of the Spirit. The Gospel begins with the description of the Holy Spirit overshadowing Mary and so she conceives Christ Himself within her very flesh. Jesus begins His public ministry when at His baptism the Holy Spirit descends upon Him. On the first Easter Jesus breathes on His apostles, empowering them to do what only God can do: forgive sin. And the descent of the Holy Spirit upon the Apostles at Pentecost inaugurates the Church and our God-given mission: everyone has a personal vocation from God. All are encouraged to attend daily Mass from the traditional date of the feast of the Ascension (May 13, 2021) until the feast of Pentecost (May 23, 2021).

May is Mary's Month

In a longstanding tradition of the Church, May has been a time for attention to our devotion to Mary, our Blessed Mother. Because of Jesus' words from the Cross, "Son, behold your Mother," we know that it is His intention that we learn faith from the mind, heart, and hands of Mary. You are encouraged to look at the example, intercession, and encouragement Mary offers us in living for Christ. Especially this month, praying the rosary is a particularly appropriate daily devotion.

Requiescat in Pace

Please pray for the repose of the soul of long-time parishioner **John Tinsley**, who passed away on Saturday, April 24, following a lengthy battle with ALS. John was a parishioner and friend of the Cathedral for many years, serving the parish as an usher on Sundays and volunteering at fish frys, festivals, and other parish events. After retiring, John was hired to serve as head sacristan for the Cathedral and was later ordained an acolyte of the church in 2013.

A private graveside service was held at Jefferson Barracks this past Wednesday, May 5.

Mother's Day Blessing

"God the Father, through His Son, the Virgin Mary's child, has brought joy to all Christian mothers as they see the hope of eternal life shine on their children. May He bless the mother of this child. She now thanks God for the gift of her child. May she be one with him/her thanking God forever in Heaven, in Jesus Christ our Lord."

With these words, the Church blesses the mother of the newly baptized infant at the conclusion of the liturgy of Baptism. We repeat those same sentiments in prayer today as we bless the mothers in our midst. We commend you to the care and solicitude of the Lord's own mother and remind you that what you are helps us all to understand "holy Mother Church." We appreciate your ancient and ever new role in the life of the world.

Infant Baptism

According to the mind of the Church, parents are obliged to see that infants are baptized within the first weeks after birth. As soon as possible after the birth, or even before it, parents should request the sacrament for their child and are to be properly instructed in preparation for it. Godparents are also encouraged to attend baptismal preparation before the child is born. 
