**FROM OUR RECTOR**

Dear Parishioners,

We are now within the Easter Season and the Cathedral is a busy place mainly on the weekends as we host the Sacrament of Confirmation for the parishes of the Archdiocese. This is quite an undertaking, and I am so grateful to the many volunteers from the Cathedral parish who assist as ushers. There is truly no way we could welcome so many without their help. If you are interested in being a part of this ministry, please call the rectory. Your help would be greatly appreciated.

The Annual Catholic Appeal has one primary goal – proclaim the Gospel. Often it is seen as a collection or fundraising appeal. The Appeal does raise money but only so that the Catholic community has the resources to announce the Gospel. How? Principally by loving others, showing compassion and care for the hungry, the thirsty, the homeless, the imprisoned, the sick and dying, and the naked. Thank you for your generosity to the Annual Catholic Appeal.

The 4th Sunday of Easter is affectionately called Good Shepherd Sunday. Our gospel this week reports the second part of the passionate speech with which Jesus presents Himself as the "good shepherd." He also uses the image of the gate where the sheep he gathers, guides and defends even at the cost of his own life's cost to enter. He clarifies: "The hired hand, who is not the shepherd and does not own the sheep, sees the wolf coming and leaves the sheep and runs away-and the wolf snatches them and scatters them. The hired hand runs away because a hired hand does not care for the sheep."

In a time full of wolves who kidnap and destroy and of hired hands - among them the false prophets who deceive so many people in the world - together with the great mass of indifferent people, the Lord asks of us a new passion: to be with him "shepherds" of the crowds of our time. We come up with excuses, perhaps saying that we are only "sheep" ourselves.

The Gospel tells us that the shepherd is a sheep who has learned how to love, who has begun to have Jesus' same feelings. That is why Jesus says to the disciples: "I send you like lambs among wolves." And the lambs are softened sheep who have widened their hearts, who see beyond their own habits, their own closures and who, together with Jesus, also say: "I have other sheep that do not belong to this fold. I must bring them also, and they will listen to my voice. So there will be one flock, one shepherd."

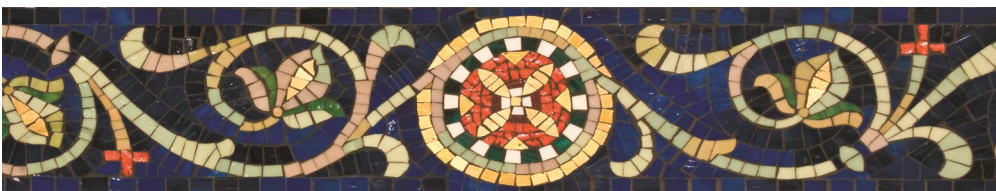

ARCHBISHOP'S COLUMN

When We Choose to Live in Jesus, All the Threads of our Life Come Together

Our hopes, dreams, joys, fears, frustrations and hurts all come together and are fulfilled in Jesus

Dear brothers and sisters in Christ,

As I write this, the conclave to elect a new pope has not yet begun — though, by the time you read this, we may have a new Holy Father. At least we can be united in prayer around that!

Meanwhile, here's something that can hold our attention no matter what's happening with the conclave: In this week's reading, we hear St. Paul give one of his first big speeches about salvation in Jesus (see Acts 13).

I think it's important to reflect on how he goes about proclaiming the Gospel. He provides a short account of the history of Israel — a kind of executive summary. Then he shows how the various threads of that history come together and are fulfilled in Jesus. That approach allows him to conclude by saying: "We ourselves are proclaiming this good news to you, that what God promised to our fathers He has brought to fulfillment for us, their children, by raising up Jesus."

We might call this the "fulfillment" method of evangelization. It's a model we might think about using ourselves! (It's not the only model, to be sure! But it's an important one.)

To use the fulfillment method, St. Paul had to know the history of ancient Israel. That allowed him to show how the hopes and dreams and joys and fears and frustrations of ancient Israel came together in Jesus.

If we're going to use the model well, we have to know a person's story. And here's an evangelization tip: We don't get to know a person's story by telling them how much we know! We get to know it by asking good questions about their lives. Then, when we know more about their story, we can begin to show a person how their hopes, dreams, joys, fears, frustrations and hurts all come together and are fulfilled in Jesus and how their

lives can be more fulfilled by following Him.

In John 10, Jesus says: "I am the gate. Whoever enters through me will be saved." And in John 14, Jesus says: "No one comes to the Father except through me." The "through me" is important. It shows that there's just no way around the Jesus question!

Jesus says: "The Father and I are one." Jesus is in the Father and the Father is in Him by nature — that's the basic truth concerning Christian thinking about God. Jesus also says: "Remain in my love ... I have told you this so that my joy might be in you." Jesus is in us and we are in Him by grace — that's the basic truth concerning Christian thinking about salvation.

Someone might ask: So what? Well, here's an important difference: Jesus can't help but remain in the Father — it's automatic. We, on the other hand, can choose to remain in Jesus or not.

When we choose to live apart from Jesus, the threads of our life — our hopes and fears, our joys and frustrations — fall apart. Most of us know what that's like! When we choose to live in Jesus all those threads come together. That doesn't make life easy! But it makes life fulfilling.

Whether we're celebrating or awaiting the election of a new pope, we can learn something from St. Paul's approach to evangelization. Let's talk about how our own histories are fulfilled in Christ, and let's help other people see how their lives can be fulfilled in Christ.

Missionary Discipleship - Relationship

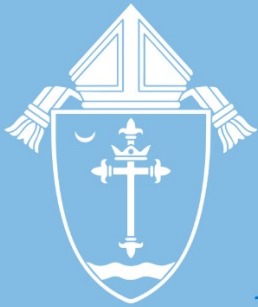
In the Gospel Jesus said, “My sheep hear my voice; I know them, and they follow me.” It is apparent from Jesus’ words throughout His public ministry that He wants us to follow Him. However, it is difficult to follow someone that we don’t really know. God made each of us because He wants us to love Him and be in relationship with Him. How can we grow in relationship and how can our love for God grow? We know from experience that the best way to get to know someone and grow in relationship with them is for us to communicate with them. With Jesus the best way to do that is through prayer and study. We have to be committed about taking time every day for mental prayer (conversation with Jesus) and we have to be committed about finding time to work on our spiritual growth through study. Scripture is essential and *Lectio Divina* is a great way to get started praying with Scripture. We all know that the things we really want to do we make time to do. We struggle with finding time to do those things that take a little work. This week let us ask Jesus to help us to get to know Him better and ask Him to help us to open our heart and mind so that we can listen as well as talk during our prayer time.

Why A Registered Parishioner

Due to the number of requests for baptisms and weddings, the Cathedral Parish adopted a policy years ago that generally requires parents to be registered parishioners of the parish before their infant may be baptized here, or for an engaged person to be a registered parishioner and practicing Catholic for a minimum of one year for preferred dates and for a more modest stipend. Non-parishioners must be registered in a Catholic parish somewhere and will need to secure their pastor's permission to be baptized or married outside of their proper parish before we can schedule any ceremony. 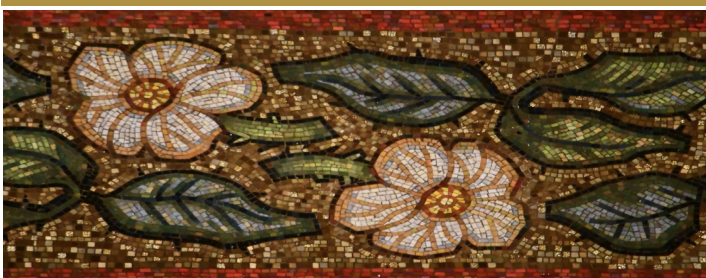
