

FROM OUR RECTOR

Dear Parishioners.

This week, the Cathedral Basilica of St. Louis said farewell to a long-time parishioner and dedicated member of our staff, Tom Fasl. Tom had a profound impact on the life of our parish and the preservation of the Cathedral.

Before officially joining the staff, Tom generously volunteered his time, helping launch our live-streaming efforts and assisting with landscaping projects. Later, as our Finance and Operations Manager, he worked tirelessly to



Tom will be deeply missed by many in our community. He is fondly remembered for his warm and friendly demeanor. I kindly ask pray for the repose Tom's soul and for his family as they grieve this great loss.

And as to summarize in a few words the entire Gospel, he tells them, "I give you a new commandment, that you love one another. Just as I have loved you, you also should love one another." In sum, the entire Gospel is summarized in loving one another with the same love of Jesus. The love that Jesus' disciples are called to live among them, is not any love, is not a feeling that starts from them or their measures, it does not spring from one's character or strength. The love the disciples are called to live is Jesus.

That love is spoken about elsewhere in the Gospel: "Having loved his own who were in the world, he loved them to the end." Jesus does not simply repeat what is written in Leviticus: "You shall love your neighbor as yourself" (19:18), but he specifies: "Love one another as I have loved you," that is, with a love that knows no limits and that goes as far as giving one's life for others.

An ancient Christian wise man, Tertullian, said, "It was the practice of love, more than anything else, that branded Christians in the eyes of pagans, "See how they love each other' they say, (while pagans hate each other), and see how they are ready to die for one another' (while they prefer to kill each other)."

ARCHBISHOP'S COLUMN

Scriptures, Our Own Experience Show That Growth Means Change

Just as the early Church learned to remain with God's plan as the community changed, we can do the same learn about Pope Leo XIV

Dear brothers and sisters in Christ,

"In a higher world it is otherwise, but here below to live is to change, and to be perfect is to have changed often."

Wise words from St. John Henry Newman! Let me apply them to four different cases.

First: Jesus. We hear Him say this week: "I am going away and I will come back to you." When Jesus says this, He is originally speaking about His death and resurrection. As we read it this week, however, we're also thinking about His ascension and ongoing sacramental presence. Jesus' presence to His disciples remains, but the form of that presence changes, and the disciples have to learn to remain with Him in the midst of continuity and change.

Second: the early Church and the Gentiles. This week's readings recount a great shift in the early Church: The Gentiles are coming to the faith. We hear about the debate that ensued: Do they have to be circumcised to belong to the People of God? We hear how the apostles gathered, at what has become known as the Jerusalem Conference, to settle the matter. The early Church had to learn to remain with God's plan, even as the shape of the community changed.

Third: each of us. It's graduation season! Think back to eighth grade graduation, or high school graduation, or college graduation. Graduates often wonder: "Will these have been the best years of our lives?" My answer is: I hope not! I hope we all continue to grow, to live ever deeper and broader lives of faith, hope, and love. On a metaphysical level we remain the same person; but on an experiential level we continue to grow and growth means change.

SERVE THE LORD WITH GLADNESS



Fourth and last: the pope. I was born under the reign of Pope Pius XII! I lived under the reign of Pope John XXIII, though my memories growing up are mostly of Pope Paul VI. I've been a bishop under Pope St. John Paul II, Pope Benedict XVI and Pope Francis—and now Pope Leo XIV. I've seen a lot of popes! And I want to say something as we receive the new Holy Father.

Think about John Paul II, Benedict XVI and Francis. Each of them was strong in really different ways.

Closer to home, you've known that same truth in the archbishops of St. Louis: We all have our strengths (and our weaknesses, too!).

It's possible to turn legitimate strengths into idols. It's also possible to turn honest limits into resentments. Neither allows a man to be himself, and neither draws the best from him as a leader.

As we welcome Pope Leo XIV and get to know him, let me encourage all of us to learn the lessons of history. As we discover his strengths — which will be different from previous popes — let's hold them with gratitude, not idolatry. And as we discover his limits, let's hold them — yes, with honesty, but also with generosity rather than resentment, the same way we'd want others to hold our limits.

Pope Leo XIV is a gift for the Church at this time. Let's make the most of that gift.

Pope Leo XIV

Pope Leo XIV's coat of arms offers a clear reflection of his Augustinian roots and the values he seeks to promote during his pontificate, particularly unity and communion within the Church.

The shield is divided diagonally into two sections. The upper half features a blue background with a white lily. The lower half of the shield has a light background and displays an image that recalls the Order of Saint Augustine: a closed book with a heart pierced by an arrow. This is a direct reference to the conversion experience of Saint Augustine himself, who described his personal encounter with God's Word using the phrase: "Vulnerasti cor meum verbo tuo" - "You have pierced my heart with your Word."

Pope Leo XIV has chosen a motto that reflects this Augustinian tradition: *In Illo uno unum*, which means "*In the One, we are one.*" The phrase is taken from Saint Augustine's *Exposition on Psalm 127*, where he explains that "although we Christians are many, in the one Christ we are one."





A Thought on The Sanctity Of Life

"Without a foundational, practical formation, it is difficult for our consciences to guide us well in concrete situations. As Catholics, we have the immense gift of the teaching authority of the Catholic Church and can turn to it for help forming our consciences. For example, learning about Christian moral principles, reading the *Catechism of the Catholic Church*, or researching what the Church says about a challenging teaching will help us grow in knowledge of the truth."

Stewardship Reflection

"I give you a new commandment: love one another. As I have loved you, so you also should love one another." (JOHN 13:34)

"As I have loved you," this is the hard part – Jesus's love is unconditional; our love usually comes with strings attached. It is easy to love someone when they love you back. But it takes mercy and compassion to love someone when you feel unappreciated, feel used or feel like your opinion doesn't matter. It takes courage and the grace of God to "love my neighbor" when they may be someone you don't like, someone you don't know, or someone that doesn't look like you.

Missionary Discipleship Love one another as I have loved you

How do we love others like Jesus loves us? To answer that question we have to ask ourselves: what are the qualities of Jesus' love? His love is free. We didn't have to earn it or work to receive it. Jesus just loves us with no strings attached. Jesus' love is total, because He sacrificed everything for us even His life. His love is **faithful**, because no matter what we do He will never stop loving us! Finally, Jesus' love is fruitful, because His love shines through us to others. Fruitful love begets more love. Another way for us to crosscheck whether we are loving as Jesus loves is by meditating on 1 Corinthians 13: 4-13. In this letter Paul describes the love that Jesus has for us and the kind of love we are called to have for others. This is the passage that says, "Love is patient, love is kind..." We can meditate on this by replacing the word "love" with the word "I" and ask ourselves if that is really true. For instance, we would say, "I am patient, I am kind..." and then be totally honest with ourselves to see if that is the truth. This week we can pray that Jesus will give us the strength and courage to love the way He does.

Why A Registered Parishioner

Due to the number of requests for baptisms and weddings, the Cathedral Parish adopted a policy years ago that generally requires parents to be registered parishioners of the parish before their infant may be baptized here, or for an engaged person to be a registered parishioner and practicing Catholic for a minimum of one year for preferred dates and for a more modest stipend. Non-parishioners must be registered in a Catholic parish somewhere and will need to secure their pastor's permission to be baptized or married outside of their proper parish before we can schedule any ceremony.
