FROM OUR RECTOR

Dear Parishioners,

Next Friday, May 28, I will celebrate my 27th anniversary of Ordination to the Priesthood. It is hard to believe that the years have passed and seemingly so quickly. There are so many happy memories to recall during these years, and so many people that I have encountered. Many of those wonderful memories have been at the Cathedral Basilica Parish. My deep gratitude to you all for welcoming me, and providing me with so many memories.

Fra Angelico, the famous Dominican artist, is buried in the Church of *Santa Maria Sopra Minerva* in Rome. On his tomb, the following phrase, a hallmark of the saintly painter's life, is inscribed: *Chi fa cose di Cristo, con Cristo deve stare sempre*, which is translated, "He who does the things of Christ must remain with Christ always." I recall these words because, in the celebration of Mass, no one is "doing the things of Christ" more than we priests. It follows that we must "remain with Christ always", particularly through prayer and adoration where he is present, body and blood, soul and divinity, in the Sacrament of the Altar. These words are inspiring and also very challenging to me.

I also call them to mind as the Archbishop will ordain six men to the Order of Priesthood on the 29th of May. The Ordination will be a joyful moment for the Archdiocese of St. Louis and all are welcome to attend. Make sure you arrive early to the Cathedral as we are expecting a larger than normal gathering.

The Spirit descends again on today's Christians so that they may witness to the love of God for all. In the Letter to the Galatians, the apostle Paul exhorts the believers to walk by the Spirit, whose fruits are a blessing for the world: "By contrast, the fruit of the Spirit is love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, generosity, faithfulness, gentleness, and self-control" (Gal 5:22). The entire world needs fruit like this. Pentecost is the beginning of the Church, but also the beginning of a new world.

In which legacy were you born?

Eve, Mary can live in all of us, in different ways

Dear brothers and sisters in Christ,

“One and all were born in her.”

This quote from Psalm 87 originally refers to Jerusalem. Psalm 87 was especially dear to exiles and pilgrims. It expressed their deepest sense of themselves, and their hope for their children: to identify Jerusalem — the place where God dwells — as their home.

In St. Louis people ask: “Where did you go to school?” In ancient Judaism they asked: “Where were you born?” If you couldn’t be born in Jerusalem physically, at least it could be your spiritual home.

This Psalm and this sentiment are used this week in conjunction with the feast of Mary, Mother of the Church. This feast, instituted just a few years ago, is celebrated the day after Pentecost. The readings for the day help us to focus on Eve as “the mother of all the living,” and then on Mary as the mother of all those living in Christ.

It’s worth reflecting on the legacy of those two mothers: how each of us was born in Eve and the legacy of sin, and how each of us can be born in Mary and the legacy of grace. The question is: which of those legacies do we want to claim?

The legacy of Eve lives in all of us. We can truly say: “One and all were born in her.” This legacy is receptive to the suggestions of the enemy of human nature, who encourages us to be like God but apart from God. Looking around our culture we see many habits that are rooted in this legacy; people “play God” in all sorts of ways. When we do that, we claim Eve as our mother: “I was born in her.”

The legacy of Mary can live in us, as well. This legacy, by contrast, is receptive to the Holy Spirit, through whom God’s very life comes to dwell in us. That’s the paradox of the enemy’s temptation. There’s a kernel of truth in it: we’re meant to be like God! But we’re meant to be like God with God, and through God’s power, not apart from God. What Eve reached out to take for herself Mary received as a gift.

Looking around, we see people whose habits are rooted in this legacy. Mary carried the love of God in her womb, and brought Him forth for our salvation. Some people carry the love of God and the truth of the Gospel in their hearts, and bring them forth in their words and deeds for the benefit of others. When we do that, we claim Mary as our mother: “I was born in her.”

Looking back on the week behind us, where would we say we were born: in the legacy of Eve, or in the legacy of Mary? Looking to the week ahead, where do we want to be born?

Mary, mother of the Church, pray for us!

We often refer to Pentecost as the birthday of the Church because it is the first moment when the Apostles formed a community of believers and, led by the Holy Spirit, began to invite others to become followers of Jesus Christ. How often we forget the power of the Sacrament of Confirmation that we have received. The Lord sends the gifts of the Holy Spirit into our hearts, giving us wisdom, knowledge, understanding, counsel, fortitude, piety, and fear of the Lord. These gifts are necessary for our salvation as they strengthen our virtues and facilitate our cooperation with the grace of God in our lives amid the trials we face daily. Saint John Paul II prayed daily for a greater outpouring of the gifts of the Holy Spirit.

The Pentecost Sacrament

The Sacrament of Penance and Reconciliation is not just a pre-Easter or Lenten preparation but a form of communion with the Risen Lord as the source of all mercy, life and Spirit. Through Pentecost and the Holy Trinity, we should come to the realization that Christ desires to breathe out his Spirit of holiness and life on us even now, since the gift of the Holy Spirit is the consequence of Christ's victory over sin and death.

To that end, confession is offered daily at 7:30 a.m., Monday through Friday, as well as on the weekend. A detailed schedule of all confession times can be found on the cover of this bulletin.

You Can Help Carry the Burden

Our Parish is blessed with significant demographic diversity. While many of us live comfortably, a significant number within our Parish boundaries are not nearly so fortunate. **The Poor Box**, located near the main aisle in the rear of the church, is the primary source of funding for the assistance provided by the Cathedral Chapter of the Society of St. Vincent de Paul. For the Poor

Infant Baptism

According to the mind of the Church, parents are obliged to see that infants are baptized within the first weeks after birth. If you are a **registered parishioner** who is or is about to become a parent, please contact the rectory at 314-373-8202 to schedule your infant's baptism and arrange for your own instruction in preparation for the sacrament.

Eucharistic Exposition

The Blessed Sacrament, the very presence of Christ's body and blood in the Eucharist, is reserved in the tabernacle of the Blessed Sacrament Chapel to the east of the main sanctuary. At all hours the Cathedral is open, people may be found praying there before the Lord "face to face." **Each Saturday afternoon, beginning at 3:30 p.m., the Eucharist is displayed for prayer and adoration in public exposition in the Blessed Sacrament Chapel for a holy hour.** Following this holy hour, the Evening Prayer of the Church with Benediction is celebrated.

Additionally, the Blessed Sacrament is displayed for public adoration and prayer on the First Friday of the month. First Friday Adoration begins at approximately 8:30 a.m., following the completion of the 8:00 a.m. Mass, and concludes with Benediction at 11:45 a.m. Our next First Friday Adoration will be held **Friday, June 4.**

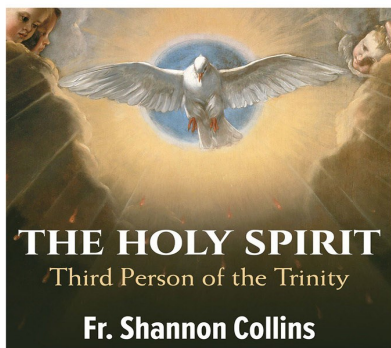
