FROM OUR RECTOR

PASTORAL STAFF

Dear Parishioners,

This Sunday, the Church invites us to meditate on a pivotal moment in our faith: the Ascension of our Lord into heaven. After completing His mission on earth, Jesus returns to the Father in glory. But this is not a farewell. It is, in fact, the beginning of a new chapter in the life of the Church—and in our own spiritual lives.

Since Christmas, we have followed the life of Jesus from Bethlehem to Calvary. We have seen Him born in poverty, adored by shepherds and Magi, and we have walked with Him through Galilee and Judea as He preached the Kingdom, healed the sick, and welcomed sinners with mercy. We witnessed the sorrow of His Passion and death—and then rejoiced at the empty tomb on Easter morning. The Resurrection filled us with joy and strengthened our faith.

Now, as He ascends into heaven, the apostles stand gazing upward—perplexed, perhaps even saddened. Their Master is departing. But Jesus does not abandon them, nor does He abandon us. Before ascending, He promises to send the Holy Spirit, the Advocate, who will guide, sanctify, and strengthen us. This Spirit is the living presence of God in our souls, assuring us that we are not orphans but beloved children of the Father. As St. Paul writes, "You did not receive a spirit of slavery to fall back into fear, but a spirit of adoption, through which we cry out, 'Abba! Father!" (Romans 8:15).

This is the mystery of the Blessed Trinity at work within us. Through the grace of the Holy Spirit, God dwells in the deepest part of our being. He is always present to us—especially when we respond to His call in prayer and in the Eucharist. In these sacred encounters, we are drawn into communion with Christ.

To help us remember this mystery, the Church gives us two great feasts: Holy Thursday and Corpus Christi. Both celebrate the Eucharist—the living bread come down from heaven—which we are invited to receive and adore each day. These celebrations remind us that Jesus remains with us in a real and powerful way.

As we celebrate the Ascension today, let us renew our desire to stay close to the Lord. May we turn our hearts to Him in prayer, listen carefully to His Word, and open our souls to the quiet, transformative work of the Holy Spirit. Christ has gone to prepare a place for us—and He calls us to follow.

ARCHBISHOP'S COLUMN

We are Never Alone, God is with us Always

On Pentecost, we can identify areas in our lives in which we feel alone, and ask to feel the Holy Spirit's presence more deeply

Dear brothers and sisters in Christ,

This week we sit between Ascension and Pentecost. St. Cyril of Jerusalem says that the departure of Jesus at the Ascension was to our advantage: through that departure Jesus came to dwell inside us, forever, through the Holy Spirit. This indwelling has important implications metaphysically, psychologically and spiritually: It means we are never alone.

Think about it: Jesus was never alone in His mission. That's why we hear Him say this week: "But I am not alone, because the Father is with me." (John 16) That's one of the reasons we see Him constantly taking time away for prayer. It's not because He wasn't already with the Father. He was. But, as a human being, He needed time and space to foster the conversation, to sharpen His awareness of being with and relying on the Father at all times.

So let's fill in some blanks. When Jesus says to the Father, "as you sent me into the world" we can fill in: never alone, but always with you. Then, when He says of His disciples, "so I sent them into the world" we can fill in: never alone, but always with us. That means we, too, need time and space to foster the conversation with God, to sharpen our awareness of Jesus dwelling in us always and to rely on the Holy Spirit more deeply.

Because of the descent of the Holy Spirit — not only a long time ago in history but also upon each of us in baptism, and not only once in baptism but also as a constant indwelling presence — we are never alone. That leads to an important question to ask this week as we prepare for Pentecost: What's an area of your life where you act or feel as though you are alone —

where self-reliance is your rule — and you'd like to let the Holy Spirit in? That's a great place, this week, to pray for a personal Pentecost. "Come, Holy Spirit. Come into this part of my life. Help me to know your presence more deeply. Help me to rely on you constantly, knowing that I am never alone."

St. Cyril of Jerusalem also says the Holy Spirit falls upon us the way water falls upon plants: AS the water remains itself but produces various effects, so the Holy Spirit remains always itself but produces various effects in us. St. Basil the Great says something very similar, though he compares the Holy Spirit to the sunshine: remaining one in itself, both sunshine and the Holy Spirit produce manifold works.

This can be a great consolation to us. It also addresses one of the world's great confusions about unity and diversity. When we rely only on ourselves diversity becomes division and unity becomes uniformity. The more we rely on the Holy Spirit, the less we become cookie-cutter images of one another — the Spirit makes diversity flourish. At the same time, the more we rely on the Holy Spirit, the more united we become even in our differences. Holy Spirit inspired diversity is always diversity in the one Body. Only God can blend unity and diversity in such a marvelous way. Come, Holy Spirit!

Eucharistic Exposition

The Blessed Sacrament, the very presence of Christ's body and blood in the Eucharist, is reserved in the tabernacle of the Blessed Sacrament Chapel to the east of the main sanctuary. At all hours the Cathedral is open, people may be found praying there before the Lord "face to face." Each Saturday afternoon, beginning at 3:30 pm, the Eucharist is displayed for prayer and adoration in public exposition in the Blessed Sacrament Chapel for holy hour. Following this holy hour, the Evening Prayer of the Church with Benediction is celebrated.

Additionally, the Blessed Sacrament is displayed for public adoration and prayer on the First Friday of the month. First Friday Adoration begins at approximately 8:30 am, following the completion of the 8:00 am Mass, and concludes with Benediction at 11:45 am Our next First Friday Adoration will be held Friday, June 6.
