FROM OUR RECTOR

Dear Parishioners,

This coming week, we will embark on a major project for the Cathedral Basilica. Approximately two years ago, we closed the Cathedral Gift Shop with the anticipation of creating men's and women's restrooms on the main floor of the Basilica. I am so excited that we are able to begin the construction phase of the project now.

It will entail the creation of two family restrooms, men's and women's restrooms, on the main floor of the Cathedral. These restrooms will be accessible to all without the use of stairs. Additionally, we will be rehabbing the lower-level restrooms.

While this is all quite positive, the negative impact is that all of our restrooms will be closed at the same time. Temporary trailer restrooms will be placed on the school lot, which will not take up any of the current parking. These will remain in place for the duration of the project, which is to last about 5-6 months. One of the trailers will enable those with mobility issues to utilize the restroom as well.

I understand that this construction project will cause inconvenience to those who visit and attend our liturgies. I sincerely ask for your patience during this period, and I am confident that once the project is completed, the addition of restrooms on the main floor of the Basilica will be a welcome improvement for all. This project is fully funded through donors to the Cathedral Basilica.

This Sunday, June 2, we celebrate the Solemnity of Corpus Christi. Following the conclusion of the 12 noon Mass, we will have our traditional Corpus Christi Procession through the parish grounds. This will be a wonderful display of our faith in the Real Presence and a great way to demonstrate our faith in the wider Central West End Community and St. Louis. The Feast of the Body and Blood of the Lord and the procession with the Blessed Sacrament will remind us of our pilgrimage to Heaven, and is a prayerful edifying act of the entire church.

Mark your calendar for the Feast of the Sacred Heart of Jesus that will be celebrated on Friday, June 7. The beginnings can be traced to the Fathers of the Church, including Origen, St. Ambrose, St. Jerome, St. Augustine of Hippo, St. Hippolytus of Rome, and several more. St. Bernard of Clarivax gave the expression of this devotion to the Sacred Heart "form" in the 12th century with his famous prayer "O Sacred Head Surrounded." The feast reminds us of the burning love of God for each one of us symbolized in the heart of Jesus.

ARCHBISHOP'S COLUMN

Jesus' Body and Blood forms a bridge between heaven and earth

Like Jesus, we need to judge things by heaven's standards and rise above the world's false dichotomies

Dear brothers and sisters in Christ,

The feast of Corpus Christi — the Most Holy Body and Blood of Christ — celebrates how the Body of Jesus forms a bridge: a bridge from heaven to earth for the Son of God, and a bridge from earth to heaven for us.

In St. Catherine of Siena's book of Dialogues, God the Father explains to her how, after the fall of Adam and Eve, a great flood of sin separated humanity from heaven. But, desiring our salvation, the Father says: "And, so, wishing to remedy your great evils, I have given you the Bridge of my Son, in order that, passing across the Flood, you may not be drowned."

On June 8, I will ordain the new permanent deacons for the Archdiocese of St. Louis. Deacons, too, are meant to form a kind of bridge. As one author puts it: "The deacon stands at the altar and prepares the gifts with clean hands, but he stands also where the practical need is greatest, getting his hands very dirty ... By being visibly at home in both places, the deacon embodies the great message of Vatican II, namely that the whole world is taken up in what happens at the altar and that the sacrifice of the altar is celebrated for the sanctification of the whole world." Deacons are ordained for this kind of bridgebuilding between the mysteries of the faith and the world. But deacons are also meant to stand as a living witness: This kind of bridge-building is not theirs alone, but is an element of the identity of the entire Church!

On June 7, we celebrate the feast of the Sacred Heart of Jesus. As the home diocese of St. Rose Philippine Duchesne — a Religious of the Sacred Heart — this feast day ought to be special to us! The heart of Jesus calls out to the heart of every person in the world. But He asks us — with our lives — to

serve as bridges between His heart and the hearts of everyone.

In a series of "mic drop" moments that we read in the Gospel this week, He teaches us something important about how to do so. The "influencers" of Jesus' time are trying to back Him into a corner. "Should we pay the census tax to Caesar or not? A woman had been married to seven brothers; in the resurrection, whose wife will she be? Which is the greatest commandment?"

In every case, Jesus is offered a set of false alternatives: No matter which one He picks, He will cause trouble for Himself, and His questioners will cause trouble for Him. But in every case, because He judges by heavenly logic, Jesus rises above the false alternatives and escapes the trap.

There's a lesson for us in that! Today's cultural influencers try to back us into a corner as well. Like Jesus, we need to judge things by the standards of heaven and rise above the false dichotomies of worldly logic. When we do so, we aren't rejecting the world; we're building bridges to heavenly horizons. Let's try to do that more often.

Corpus Christi


On the night before giving His life on the cross, Jesus instituted the Eucharist, the gift of his Body and Blood, in the form of bread and wine, as the perpetual Passover sacrifice for his followers. This was done in the context of what is traditionally called the Last Supper. The Solemnity we celebrate this Sunday centers on the gift of the Body and Blood of the Lord, which we partake in at Holy Mass (the Eucharist) until the Lord comes again in glory at the end of the ages.

While the celebration of the Lord's Body and Blood has been taking place since the Last Supper and continues to be celebrated at every Holy Mass, the more formal feast of "Corpus Christi" has been observed since 1246, beginning in the diocese of Liege in Belgium. The feast entered the Roman Missal for use in the Latin Church later in the same century, incorporating many of the texts composed by the Dominican Saint Thomas Aquinas, who lived from 1225 to 1274. Aquinas' words became the hymns for the Mass and Divine Office (Liturgy of the Hours) of this great feast.

Firm belief in the Body and Blood of Christ and regular reception of the Blessed Sacrament or Holy Communion is fundamental to Catholic doctrine, spirituality and growth in holiness. This is our inheritance. Let us joyfully embrace the gift of "finest wheat" which God offers us regularly, even every day.

We should not come to Mass out of mere obligation, but because the Eucharistic celebration is an integral part of our life in Christ and our communion with others. The celebration and reception of the Eucharist should be our strength and joy, a commitment in faith and love that gives meaning to all our existence. We aren't Christians because we go to Mass, but we go to Mass because we are Christians, to celebrate God's unbounded love for us and to participate in the action that followers of Christ have engaged in since the Lord walked among his own.

The Mass, Holy Eucharist, is the sacrifice or offering of the new covenant in the Blood of Christ. It is likewise the offering of the faithful, God's people, united to Jesus in praise of the One God.



Blessed Sacrament Chapel

The Blessed Sacrament Chapel, to the right of the sanctuary, was designed by George D. Barnett. The mosaics were installed by Gorham Company. The Chapel was the gift of Richard C. Kerens. It was finished in March of 1917, but it was not used until Holy Thursday, April 5th of that year.

The mosaics of the Blessed Sacrament Chapel are the most Byzantine of any of the four side chapels. The dominant color is red—symbolic of the saving Blood of Christ. There is also a profusion and great variety of Venetian gold mosaic used throughout the Chapel, which should be examined closely.

The columns along the west side of the Chapel are of the red family marbles: four red Numidian, two of Levanto, two of Fiori de Pesco, and two of Benu marble. The capitals are fine examples of pure Byzantine design.
