FROM OUR RECTOR

Dear Parishioners,

After the Easter Season, which reaches its climax in the celebration of Pentecost, the Church invites us to reflect on three great Solemnities of the Lord:

- •Today, we celebrate Trinity Sunday,
- •Next Sunday we mark Corpus Christi
- •And the Friday after that, we honor the Sacred Heart of Jesus.

Each of these feasts offers a unique perspective on the mystery of our Christian faith. Trinity Sunday points us to the mystery of the Triune God; Corpus Christi highlights the gift of the Eucharist; and the Feast of the Sacred Heart draws us into the divine and human heart of Christ. Together, they form a kind of summary of salvation history—from the Incarnation, through Christ's death and Resurrection, to His Ascension and the sending of the Holy Spirit.

**Today**, we focus on the **Most Holy Trinity**, as Jesus revealed it to us. He taught us that God is love—not as a solitary being, but as a communion of Persons: Father, Son, and Holy Spirit, united in one divine essence.

- •God the Father is the Creator and source of all mercy,
- •The **Son** is eternal Wisdom made flesh, who died and rose for us,
- •The **Holy Spirit** is the life-giving breath who moves all things toward their fulfillment in God.

These three divine Persons are one God because each is Love. The Father is Love, the Son is Love, the Spirit is Love. God is not isolated or distant—He is the very source of life, endlessly giving and sharing Himself.

We can glimpse this reality in creation itself. The whole universe bears the imprint of the Trinity, because all that exists is marked by connection, interaction, and love. All things come from love, are sustained by love, and are drawn toward love—though this is lived out with different levels of awareness and freedom. (Benedict XVI, Angelus June 7, 2009)

St. Paul affirms this in Athens when he proclaims: **"In Him we live and move and have our being"** (Acts 17:28). And the clearest sign that we are made in the image of the Trinity is this: **only love can truly make us happy**, because we are made for relationship. We live to love and to be loved. Just as DNA carries the essential code of life, we could say that our very nature bears a "profound mark" of the Trinity.

# Let's Take the Next Step Toward **Organic Growth in Our Discipleship**

God is always inviting us to something deeper, not just more

Dear brothers and sisters in Christ,

There's a paradox of Christian life. St. Paul lays out his experience of this paradox very clearly in Second Corinthians: "We are treated as deceivers and yet are truthful ... as dying and behold we live ... as poor yet enriching many, as having nothing and yet possessing all things" (2 Corinthians 6: 8-10).

What's foundational, however, is not St. Paul's experience. What's foundational is that Jesus is at the root of the paradox: "For you know the gracious act of our Lord Jesus Christ, that for your sake He became poor although He was rich, so that by His poverty you might become rich" (2 Corinthians 8: 9).

St. Paul invites the Corinthians — and he invites us - into the paradox of discipleship. I think it's an excellent place to begin an examination of conscience on the topic of political power: What is one critique I would make of my own political party based on the paradox of discipleship? If we don't have a place where we would begin, that might be a sign that our identity is political more than it is Christian!

The Gospel readings this week open up the question of organic (as opposed to linear) growth.

Linear growth is when something simply gets bigger. We have some land; we acquire more land. We have some money; we get more money.

Organic growth is when a seed grows into a plant. When an apple seed grows, it doesn't just become a bigger seed! It grows roots and becomes a sapling; it develops a trunk, then leaves and flowers; finally, it bears apples. Organic growth is continuous, but still surprising. And the growth of the kingdom of God is often more like organic than linear growth.

Consider Jesus' approach to the law in this week's readings. "You have heard that it was said 'An eye for an eye' but I tell you: Turn the other cheek." The point of "an eye for an eye" was not to exact revenge, but to rein in vengeance. "Turn the other cheek" is the

next step in reining in vengeance. As a case of organic growth it's both continuous and surprising.

"You have heard that it was said 'love your neighbor and hate your enemy,' but I say to you: Love your enemy, and pray for those who persecute you." The point of "love your neighbor" was to expand the boundaries of love. The next step in expanding the boundaries of love is organic: continuous, but surprising.

God's saving actions all through salvation history show this kind of organic growth. But that raises an important question for each of us: What's the next step — in terms of organic growth — in my life of discipleship?

When we shift from giving money to giving more money, we're engaged in a linear growth of discipleship. And that's good! But the next organic step might be personal involvement with a charity.

When we shift from listening to podcasts to listening to more podcasts, we're engaged in a linear growth of our discipleship. And that's good! But the next organic step might be to become a small group leader in our parish.

God is always inviting us to something deeper, not just more — all through salvation history and in our own lives. As summer gathers momentum, and we watch our gardens and farms grow, what next organic step might God be asking us to take?

# Missionary Discipleship -The Indwelling of the Blessed Trinity

We all know that we can see evidence that the Blessed Trinity is present in many ways in our world. For instance, the Trinity is present in each person, in nature, and in all things. However, did you know that Scripture tells us that when we love God and are in a state of grace the Most Holy Trinity actually dwells within our souls? John 14:23 states, "Jesus said, If anyone loves me, he will keep my word. My Father will love him, and we will come to him and make our home with him."

Many of the saints wrote about this truth in their works including St. Thomas Aquinas, St. Teresa of Avila, St. John of the Cross, etc. Today's solemnity of the Most Holy Trinity reminds us of the Love, Joy, and Peace shared by the Father, Son, and Holy Spirit. This one God in three distinct persons is a communion of life and love. When we are in communion with the Most Holy Trinity, we can participate in that communion and we can experience God's life and love.

This week is a great opportunity for us to examine our consciences and celebrate the Sacrament of Reconciliation if needed. It is also a wonderful opportunity to pray in front of the Blessed Sacrament and ask Jesus to open our hearts and minds so that we can be aware of the Love, Joy, and Peace of the Most Blessed Trinity within our souls.
