

#### FROM OUR RECTOR

Dear Parishioners,

This week, we lost two of our long-time parishioners. Paul Raidt, husband of the late Lynette Raidt who passed away this past October. Paul and Lynette were very involved in the life of the parish until their health began to decline. Paul died this past week under the care of the Mother of Good Counsel Home. His funeral will be held at the Cathedral Basilica on Friday, July 25, at 10:00 a.m.



We also mourn the loss of Suzanne Jeffery, a driving force behind the formation of the Women of the Cathedral group, which continues to meet monthly. Suzanne lost her husband four years ago, and after a long battle with cancer, God graciously welcomed her home this past Tuesday. Please keep the souls of Paul and Suzanne in your prayers, as well as their families and friends who mourn their passing.

I love the words of Jesus to the man in our Gospel who desired eternal life. They form a question, "And who is my neighbor?" which then occasions Jesus to tell the man a parable that is one of the more famous parables, the Good Samaritan.

It is one that is familiar to us and contains four individuals that each have a differing response to the person in need. A Jewish priest, a man of deep religious convictions who served in the Temple at Jerusalem. A Levite, also a religious person with connections to the Temple. A Samaritan, a traveler who is apparently on business. Samaritans were regarded by devout Jews as outsiders, heretics and people not to be seen in the company. Lastly, an unknown man, beaten up by robbers on the roadside was presumably a Jew but not necessarily. All that matters is that he is a human being in great need of help.

In such a situation, the response that is expected/demanded by the Gospel is clear. Forget about your status in society. Forget about what people might say about you. Forget about your personal fears and desires that turn you in on yourself.

The Gospel also tells us to forget about the moral condition of the person to be helped. It is totally irrelevant how the man got into the situation. Maybe he was stupid to be traveling alone with money on a notoriously dangerous road. Think of the person today that you have dismissed leaving him or her on the roadside.

For Jesus, none of this counts. In the story, the need of the injured man, a complete stranger, has a higher priority than the needs of the other three. What they fail to realize is that a child of God and their brother is lying there on the road and in need. "As often as you do it to one of these the least of my brothers and sisters you did it to ME" says Jesus.

This parable touches all our lives deeply. In honestly answering the question, "Who is my neighbor?", I can learn a great deal about the kind of person I am, the kind of neighbor I am.

#### **ARCHBISHOP'S COLUMN**

## Natural Family Planning Trains Us in the Connection Between Body & Soul

NFP teaches couples how to make generosity & sacrifice the heart of their marriage

Dear brothers and sisters in Christ,

"It's not what he said, it's how he said it."

Anyone who's ever heard an apology (or a nonapology!) knows the importance of how we say something. Anyone who's ever watched an anxious or gracious host knows the importance of how we do things.

And that's a good introduction to Natural Family Planning (NFP) Awareness Week, which the Church observes from July 20-26. How we hold our sexuality has become a major problem in the world; NFP can play a key role in getting us back on track.

In terms of the details of how NFP works, I'll leave things to the professionals, whom you can contact through the archdiocesan Office of Natural Family Planning. But let me say a few things about the role that NFP can play in shaping culture. It's clear that something's wrong in the world today — many things, in fact! The relationship between soul and body, the relationship between women and men, and the way we interact with our desires are persistent "hot spots" in history and prominent themes in our difficulties today. One of the powerful things about NFP is that it gives us tools to address all of those "hot spots."

NFP is a practical expression of the Theology of the Body, which tells us that the soul and the body are intimately linked. Tears and hugs show us that traffic moves in both directions between the soul and the body! NFP is a school of training in the connection in the midst of a culture that tries to divide the soul and the body.

NFP requires husbands and wives to communicate

about the intimate details of their life and to share in the project of putting their priorities into action together. Every marriage is supposed to do that! But culture assumes that this will happen and is surprised when it doesn't. NFP trains and helps couples to do it on a daily basis.

It doesn't take any training to be aware of our immediate desires. However, where the culture encourages people to simply follow their desires, NFP requires that we weigh our immediate desires against our long-term goals. Think of how many things in the world would be different of everyone learned and followed that kind of discipline!

Friends, virtue is not the easier path; it's the better path. We know that when it comes to so many other areas of our lives: exercise is not easier than sitting on the couch, and cooking fresh meals is not easier than fast food. Similarly, what NFP offers is not to make marriage easier, but to make marriage better.

NFP teaches couples how to make generosity and sacrifice the heart of their marriage. By doing that it helps couples follow Jesus more closely. The more closely spouses follow the generosity and sacrifice of Jesus, the more convincing they can be in inviting others — starting with their children, but extending beyond them, too — to do the same.

That's a lesson we could all heed.

## From the Gospel

Luke 10:29-37

"And who is my neighbor?" Jesus replied, "A man fell victim to robbers as he went down from Jerusalem to Jericho. They stripped and beat him and went off leaving him half-dead.

A priest happened to be going down that road, but when he saw him, he passed by on the opposite side.

Likewise a Levite came to the place, and when he saw him, he passed by on the opposite side.

But a Samaritan traveler who came upon him was moved with compassion at the sight. He approached the victim, poured oil and wine over his wounds and bandaged them. Then he lifted him up on his own animal, took him to an inn, and cared for him. The next day he took out two silver coins and gave them to the innkeeper with the instruction, 'Take care of him. If you spend more than what I have given you, I shall repay you on my way back.' Which of these three, in your opinion, was neighbor to the robbers' victim?" He answered, "The one who treated him with mercy." Jesus said to him, "Go and do likewise."

#### Reflection

This parable is one of the most well-known parables in the bible. The clear message is that regardless of what culture or religion we're from, we should be willing to help people in need, even if they're different from us. It's a story about what obedience to God looks like and what the ultimate goal of our religious lives is. The parable also states that even though some people are different from us, by their religion, culture, beliefs, nationality, behavior, and etc., they are still our neighbors so we should love them the way we love ourselves. We should help each other even though we are not the same. Our neighbors are the ones who help us through anything, they will be the ones pulling you up when you are down, the ones making you feel good about yourself. What have we done so far?



Our community and region has been very good about being neighborly since the May 16 tornado. We have really gone to great lengths to help out people in our community. We are coming up on the two month anniversary of the tornado and there is still a lot of work to be done and people are still coming to assist, people are still donating in all kinds of ways.

Before the storm, we have always had a strong sense of community in St. Louis, but it has become stronger and we are taking care of our neighbors and treating them with mercy.

## Stewardship Reflection

*"Jesus said to him, 'Go and do likewise.'" LUKE* 10:37

This was Jesus' command at the end of the Good Samaritan story. Did you know that the Samaritans and Jews despised each other? The moral of the story is to love our neighbor. That means loving someone you may not know, or someone that looks different than you, or someone that has different beliefs than you, or someone that you don't like. All without expecting anything in return.

It is only natural when you are invited to a party – whether it is birthday, anniversary, homecoming or any other celebration – to think about the gift that you will bring. Even when the invitation says, "No gifts, please," most of us still show up with a bottle of wine or a box of candy or some other token of our affection. ## **Catholic Charities**


