

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# FROM OUR RECTOR

Dear Parishioners,

It was customary for a Jewish rabbi or teacher to provide his followers with a simple prayer they could use regularly. The disciples of Jesus made a similar request of their Rabbi, pointing out that John the Baptist had done the same for his own disciples. It would indeed be interesting to know what kind of prayer John taught, but that remains something forever hidden from us. One of the disciples said to Jesus, *"Lord, teach us to pray, just as John taught his disciples."* It is worth noting that the disciples were not simply asking for a prayer to recite, but rather to learn *how* to pray.

We all truly need to learn how to pray. Jesus gave His disciples not only the words of the Our Father, but also the faith in a God who is not an abstract idea but a Father who deeply loves His children: *"When you pray, say 'Father,' Abba."* We can appreciate how shocking this would have been in the Jewish religious culture, where calling God by name was forbidden.

Jesus, however, goes further than simply teaching a prayer. He makes two additional points. First, He tells a parable about a man who goes to his friend at midnight asking for bread. Second, He reminds His disciples that they are dealing with a loving and compassionate Father. Even human fathers do not give stones when asked for bread, or scorpions when asked for eggs. Jesus concludes: *"How much more will your Father in heaven give good things to those who ask Him!"* 

At first glance, this raises a question. If our Father cares for us so deeply, why must we ask so persistently? We continue to pray not because God needs to be reminded of our needs.

God does not need to be persuaded or to have his arm twisted to give us what we <u>need</u>. But he certainly does not always give us what we <u>want</u>, for our wants are often short-sighted and self-centred. The way we pray and what we ask for can be extremely revealing of where we are in our relationship with God, with people and with the world around us. Persevering prayer can help us become more aware of what we should really be asking for. It helps to purify our prayer, make clear our values and hopes, and lead us to ask for what is really in our very best interests. And those things we can be absolutely sure God wants us to have.

### **ARCHBISHOP'S COLUMN**

### Transfiguration Makes Visible Jesus' Divine Nature

This week, we can ask ourselves what we have to give up be more available to those transfigured moments

Dear brothers and sisters in Christ,

The theologian and spiritual writer Father Jean Corbon (the principal drafter of the Catechism of the Catholic Church's treatment of prayer) had an interesting thesis about the Transfiguration: He said that it was the literary and theological center of the Gospels.

Now, I don't think that's right! The passion, death and resurrection of Jesus are the literary and theological center of the Gospels.

But what Father Corbon meant was this: In the Transfiguration, the hidden truth about Jesus — His divine nature — shines forth in a way that becomes visible to others, and that same thing is happening, though in more subtle ways, through every chapter of every Gospel. Understood that way, he's got a point!

I mention Father Corbon's idea both because we celebrate the Transfiguration on Aug. 6 and because the Transfiguration can provide a pattern for our growth in discipleship.

According to the Church's theological tradition, Jesus doesn't change during the Transfiguration. Rather, what is always already true about Him — that He is divine, that He is in constant conversation with the law (represented by Moses) and the prophets (represented by Elijah) — becomes, for a moment, visible to His followers. He's not changed; they are. For a moment, the veil is removed and they have eyes to see what's actually been in front of them the whole time.

In some way, that's what we see in the terrific lineup of saints we celebrate these weeks: Ignatius of Loyola, founder of the Jesuits; Alphonsus Liguori, founder of the Redemptorists; John Vianney, patron of parish priests; Dominic Guzman, founder of the Dominicans;

### SERVE THE LORD WITH GLADNESS

Teresa Benedicta of the Cross, convert, Carmelite and martyr of the concentration camps. Think of each of them as a "transfiguration" of humanity. In their lives, the veil is lifted: We can see, for a moment, what human nature is capable of when the life of Christ becomes the deepest truth of our lives. That deep truth shines forth in them.

But it's not just the saints. I think we all have "transfiguration moments" in our own lives. We find ourselves peaceful and trusting in God even in the midst of trials, patient even when faced with difficult people or clear and gentle when correction needs to be offered. These are moments when the power of Jesus flows into our lives and through our lives to others. Then, for a moment, the veil is lifted for us, too. The deepest meaning of our lives — what our lives could be and were meant to be — shines forth. Contact with Jesus transfigures us.

Then we come back down the mountain and ordinary, fallen life resumes!

The transfigured life is offered to us by God. We have glimpses of it, both in ourselves and in others. What does it take to live that transfigured life more often, more easily and more deeply? What do we have to do (like pray more often), or what do we have to give up (like "doom-scrolling" on the internet) to make our lives more available to those transfigured moments? That's how the gift of God's grace and the discipline of discipleship come together.

Let's ponder that coming together of grace and discipline. Let's help each other live into the mystery of the Transfiguration more deeply.

# **Eucharistic Exposition**

JULY 27, 2025

The Blessed Sacrament, the very presence of Christ's body and blood in the Eucharist, is reserved in the tabernacle of the Blessed Sacrament Chapel to the east of the main sanctuary. At all hours the Cathedral is open, people may be found praying there before the Lord "face to face."

Each Saturday afternoon, beginning at 3:30 pm, the Eucharist is displayed for prayer and adoration in public exposition in the Blessed Sacrament Chapel for holy hour. Following this holy hour, the Evening Prayer of the Church with Benediction is celebrated.

Additionally, the Blessed Sacrament is displayed for public adoration and prayer on the First Friday of the month. First Friday Adoration begins at approximately 8:30 am, following the completion of the 8:00 am Mass, and concludes with Benediction at 11:45 am Our next First Friday Adoration will be held Friday, August 1.

This is one of the nine choirs of angels found in the sanctuary. The imagery of the nine choirs of angels with the symbols IC XC and the lily evokes a rich tapestry of Christian beliefs. It speaks to the heavenly hierarchy praising and serving God, Christ's divinity and triumph over sin and death, and the virtues of purity, hope, and new life found in faith. These mosaics were designed by George D Barnett.

# Liturgical Etiquette

External gestures of reverence can become a witness to the truths of our faith. The bow immediately before receiving Holy Communion should be done with the conscious recognition that it is the Lord Himself before Whom we bow. He is truly present in the Eucharist, in both the host and the cup, and in either of them. The extension of the hands must acknowledge our acceptance of a gift, not a grabbing for something owed us. The hands are completely empty, and both hands extended in the gesture of acceptance. The Lord should not be just another item among keys, papers, or assorted things. What is believed and held in our hearts ought to express itself outwardly.






Catholic Charities
