### FROM OUR RECTOR

Dear Parishioners,

We continue with the Bread of Life Discourse in John's Gospel this week. "Rabbi, when did you come here?" Jesus knew that people were looking for him only out of self-interest, but their request did not scandalize him; he came to save them, not to receive their consensus. There is an order of higher life, a dimension of existence that goes beyond worries about eating, clothing, and achieving a career. All these things are part of life, but they are not its heart.

Jesus says to the crowds who were seeking him because of the miracle of the multiplication of the loaves that there is a food that does not perish. This is what we need. We should do all we can in order to have it, but the crowds do not understand these words.

The people in the Gospel seem to perceive something, and they ask: "What sign are you going to give us, so that we may see it and believe in you?" Jesus explains to his listeners that the true bread is that which comes down from heaven, and more importantly, it is the bread that "gives life to the world."

The crowd only understood part of this and they said to Him: "Sir, give us this bread always." It is a spontaneous request and is a beautiful one. If only it were the request of every one of us.

And Jesus, as it happens in decisive moments, says clearly, "I am the bread of life. Whoever comes to me will never be hungry." Now we understand the full meaning of the manna in the desert and that of the bread multiplied for five thousand people. There is bread - which is Jesus himself - that is available to everyone; it comes from God and yet it is not far from us. We all can freely receive it. Let us go close to the "bread of life" and as the apostle Paul says, we will be "renewed in the spirit of our minds, and will clothe ourselves with the new self."

## ARCHBISHOP'S COLUMN

## This week, let's enthrone Jesus, both in our hearts and our homes

Similar to the Transfiguration, God's glory can shine through us as members of the body of Christ

Dear brothers and sisters in Christ,

This week we celebrate the feast of the Transfiguration, on Aug. 6.

The first reading, from Daniel, speaks of the enthronement of the Ancient One (which we can understand to be God the Father), and the enthronement of the Son of Man (which we can understand to be Jesus, the Son). Following up on that, Psalm 97 speaks again of the throne of God.

It makes me think of the Catholic tradition of the enthronement of the Sacred Heart of Jesus in the home. Let me suggest, to anyone who hasn't done this, that it's an excellent thing to do: To let Jesus be enthroned in our homes, and to make that not just an interior attitude but an external action as well (just as our love for friends and family is both internal and external). This would be a great way to take the feast of the Transfiguration seriously and put its readings into action in our own lives.

Here's another way to take the feast day seriously and put it into practice. In the second reading, St. Peter talks about his experience of the Transfiguration of Jesus. He says, first: "We had been eyewitnesses of His majesty." Then he says, with respect to the Father's declaring 'this is my beloved Son': "We ourselves heard this voice come from heaven."

This makes me think of the question of witness — in which we, ourselves, say what we have seen and heard. How have you seen God at work, either in your life or in the lives of those around you? And what have you heard — how has the Word of God spoken to you?

As Catholics, we've not been very good at 'giving our witness.' But we can — and should! — get better

at it. And it's not complicated! It simply means telling what we have seen and heard. It strikes me that this is another way we can honor of the feast of the Transfiguration. Like St. Peter, we can make 'telling what we have seen the Lord do' and 'sharing what we have heard the Lord say' the ruling power of our lives. That, too, is a kind of enthronement.

Friends, let's enthrone Jesus this week — both in our hearts and homes. If and when we do so, another transfiguration happens: His glory begins to shine through us. Just as glory once shone through Jesus' body on Mount Tabor long ago, so it can shine through us as members of His mystical body today. And that is a fitting way to celebrate the feast of the Transfiguration!

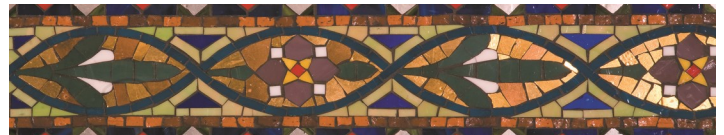

## Mission Appeal– Society of Our Mother of Peace

### Our History

Founded in 1966 by Fr. Placid Guste, SMP, (pictured on the right) the Society of Our Mother of Peace was born of an inner call to combine the eremitic and apostolic lives in a context of material simplicity, in such a manner that the apostolic call would be an expression of rather than a submerging of the contemplative spirit. The structural framework of the Society united with the spiritual orientation of St. John of the Cross, Mystic and Doctor of the Church, is specifically ordered to intensify the contemplative thrust of the Community.



The Society which has existed for over 50 years is made up of two separate Religious Communities (Public Associations of the Faithful): The Sons of Our Mother of Peace for Religious Priests and Brothers, and the Daughters of Our Mother of Peace for Religious Sisters. We function as an Ecclesial Family of Consecrated Life of Diocesan Right, which is composed of two branches, namely the Brothers and Priests of Our Mother of Peace and the Sisters of Our Mother of Peace. The Society is governed, at the highest level, by a body called the Central Chapter, which is represented equally by both the Religious Priests and Brothers and the Religious Sisters.

Today the Society is present in the U.S.A. in the Diocese of Springfield-Cape Girardeau and in the Archdiocese of St. Louis; in Nigeria, Africa in the Diocese of Awka and in the Diocese of Uromi; and in the Philippines in the Diocese of Antipolo.

### Touching Lives: What We Do

- We give conferences on the Spiritual Life.
- We serve as Retreat Masters to Communities and groups not too far from our Solitudes.
- We strive to deepen persons' interior life, making available the fullness of Faith to non-practicing Catholics, and to foster the return to the Church of non-practicing Catholics. We make available private retreats, providing individual hermitages and meals.
- We give spiritual direction to persons who long to reach authentic union with God.
- We take the Gospel of Jesus Christ to the poor.



Our work is to be seen as the expected expression or flowering in Christ of prayer, gratitude and zeal for God's glory, in accord with Jesus' own generous heart to save and sanctify His Brothers and Sisters for the glory of His Father.



The Society lives a way of life with time for prayer and evangelization. The Community is seeking our prayerful and financial assistance for their missions abroad ( for example, a restroom facility is needed near their new chapel in the Philippines and fencing around their monastery in Nigeria). God reward you for your kind consideration of their need!

About the Instructor Fr. Peter Fonseca was ordained a priest for the Archdiocese of St. Louis in 2015. He holds a Master of Arts in Theology and a Master of Divinity from Kenrick-Glennon Seminary. Additionally, he holds a Master of Science in Bioethics from the University of Mary, where he was chosen by the faculty as the distinguished graduate student, and a certification in Catholic Healthcare Ethics from the National Catholic Bioethics Center.

Having previously served as a pastor, Fr. Fonseca is now assigned as the Director of Continuing Formation for Priests for the Archdiocese of St. Louis while pursuing doctoral studies in health care ethics at St. Louis University. While studying at SLU, he has taught in the undergraduate program and served as a research fellow for the Catholic Health Association. In addition to his canonical assignments, he serves as a consultant to various parties in the Archdiocese of St. Louis and the greater St. Louis area on bioethical issues. Fr. Fonseca has presented at various conferences and seminars across the country and has contributed to local television and national radio programs.

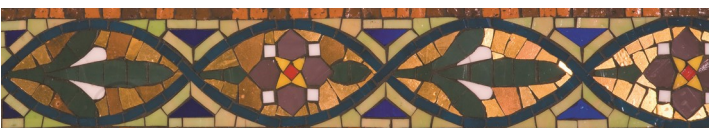
