### FROM OUR RECTOR

#### PASTORAL STAFF

Dear Parishioners,

This coming Monday, August 25, we celebrate the Feast of St. Louis, the King. Masses will be at 7:00 am, 8:00 am, and 12:05 pm. Because St. Louis is the Archdiocesan and Cathedral's Patron, we will celebrate these Masses with greater solemnity. A Plenary Indulgence, under the usual conditions of sacramental Confession, Eucharistic Communion, and prayers offered for the intentions of the Holy Father, is granted to the faithful who visit the Cathedral Basilica on the Solemnity of St. Louis the King. Confession need not occur on the feast day but anytime a week before the feast or after. I encourage you to take the time to join in this celebration, and I offer this reflection on the life of St. Louis.

St. Louis IX, King of France, was the son of Louis VIII, King of France. He was born at the Castle of Poissy in the diocese of Chartres on the 25th of April 1215. His mother was Blanche, daughter of Alfonso, King of Castile. King Louis VIII, his father, died when Louis was only 12 years old, and on the first Sunday of Advent 1226, the coronation ceremony took place in the historic Cathedral of Rheims.

In the year 1234, Louis IX married Margaret, the oldest daughter of the Count of Provence. Two years afterward, Louis took the reins of government in his hands. His only aim was to be a faithful servant of God and a loving father to his people. He attended Mass every day and spent an hour in prayer and meditation every day. Even in the night, he often rose from his bed to visit a chapel which he had built in honor of the blessed Virgin Mary. In addition, he built magnificent churches in honor of the Mother of God, bearing testimony to St. Louis' great love and devotion to her. The holy King was also remarkable in his charity.

In July of 1270, he and his army embarked for Sardinia, where a council was held. There was a fearful heat; malignant fevers and other epidemics broke out among the soldiers of St. Louis. The King's son died, and on the same day the King himself was seized with the same disorder. Aware of his critical condition, he called his son and successor, Philip, to his deathbed, gave him instructions, and asked for the last sacraments. So after the King quoted the words of the psalmist: "Lord, I will enter into Thine house; I will adore in Thy holy temple and will give glory to Thy name." St. Louis gave his soul into the hands of God on the 25th of August 1270.

The heroic virtue of St. Louis shone brighter in his afflictions than it could ever have done in his triumphs.

St. Louis King of France, pray for us.

# On the Feast of St. Louis, We Can Ask How We Ought to Respond to God's Love

God's judgement always includes the offer of His mercy; we need to be willing to receive it

Dear brothers and sisters in Christ,

We celebrate the feast of St. Louis, King of France, on Aug. 25.

Providentially, we're reading from 1st Thessalonians as we celebrate our patronal feast. One of the themes of St. Paul in this letter is the relationship between "is" and "ought": It is the case that we are loved by God, therefore we ought to live Christian lives as a response to that love.

St. Louis lived the relationship between "is" and "ought" seamlessly, in both private and public life — that's what made him a saint! Of course, to imitate his example is not simply to do the same things he did: we're not 13th-century French royalty, after all! Our secondary patrons — Sts. Vincent de Paul and Rose Philippine Duchesne — did very different things in their lives. But what made them like St. Louis, and what made them saints, was that they forged a close bond between the "is" of God's love for them and the "ought" of their actions for others. A fitting way to celebrate the feast of St. Louis is to ask how we can do the same.

One of the reasons we need to ask that question is that the Gospel readings this week speak a hard truth: there is a judgment.

So often, people imagine a Jesus who is all cuddles and affirmation. But we hear Jesus this week pronounce His seven "woes" to the Pharisees in Matthew 23. That's Jesus, too. And we hear Him tell parables in Mathew 24 and 25 where people end up thrown "into the darkness outside, where there will be wailing and grinding of teeth." That's Jesus, too.

# SERVE THE LORD WITH GLADNESS



Let's reflect on Jesus' judgment more deeply. We all need mercy and Jesus' judgment always contains the offer of mercy. But the unrepentant can't receive mercy. Note: that's not a failure on God's part. It's not that God fails to offer mercy; it's that the unrepentant can't receive it as mercy. When a cup is turned upside down, it can't be filled — not because the coffee isn't being poured. When a student thinks he already knows everything, he can't be taught — not because the teacher isn't offering. When an athlete thinks she has no improvement to make, she can't be coached — not because the coach isn't advising. It's similar with God's mercy and the unrepentant.

The fact that there is a judgment isn't just a threat; it corresponds to a desire of our hearts. We don't want God to treat sin and injustice as though they weren't real or didn't matter. Even our movies show this: we want someone to set things right. A generation of movie-goers that was raised on "The Avengers" epic should smile when St. Paul says: "For the Lord is an avenger." (1 Thessalonians 4:6)

We want someone to set things right — and we can be assured that the Lord will do so! But that means there will be a judgment.

What matters most, then, is that we become people who are repentant and therefore willing to receive mercy, and therefore able to receive mercy. Then we won't fear God's judgment, but welcome it.

# OCIA

Have you ever thought about becoming Catholic?

Do you know someone who might be interested in the Catholic faith?

Are you Catholic, but have not received First Communion or Confirmation?

The Order of Christian Initiation for Adults (or OCIA) enables those who are interested in the Catholic faith to "see what it is all about".

Most often, people come because they are invited.

For Catholic parishioners: Pause and consider moments of grace you have experienced in your life – whether in prayer, in the sacraments, in moments of community and family life – these are gifts given by the Lord. Consider: Is there anyone you know whom the Lord may want to invite receive these same gifts?

OCIA is for persons who have never been baptized, were baptized in another Christian tradition, or were baptized Catholic but have never celebrated Confirmation or received First Communion. It is also open to anyone who is interested in learning more about what Catholics believe and why we believe it. You are welcome if you have been Catholic all your life, if you have a passing interest in the Catholic faith, or if you are anywhere in between!



# Save a Life: Donate Blood

- Every 2 seconds someone in the U.S. needs blood and or platelets.
- Approximately 29,000 units of red blood cells are needed every day in the U. S.
- Nearly 16 million blood components are transfused each year in the U.S.
- Sickle cell disease affects 90,000 to 100,000 people in the U.S. About 1,000 babies are born with the disease each year. Sickle cell patients can require blood transfusions throughout their lives.
- The average red blood cell transfusion is approximately 3 units.
- A single car accident victim can require as many as 100 units of blood.
- Blood and platelets cannot be manufactured; they can only come from volunteer donors.
- The blood type most often requested by hospitals is type O.
- One donation can help save more than one life
