FROM OUR RECTOR

Dear Parishioners,

This week we welcome Deacon Logan Hepp, who is a student at Kenrick-Glennon Seminary and from the Archdiocese of Omaha. Deacon Logan will be serving at the Cathedral Basilica Parish on weekends for the academic year. Join me this weekend in welcoming our new transitional deacon to the parish. Here is a little about Deacon Hepp.



I was born in Omaha on an unseasonably cool August morning on the feast day of St. John Vianney. Eighteen days later, on the Feast of the Coronation of Mary, I was baptized. My family lived in Kansas City, Missouri, for seven years before we headed back to God's Country: Nebraska. I have been a parishioner of St. Stephen the Martyr since 2002. I graduated from Millard West High School and earned a bachelor's degree in Physics from the University of Nebraska-Lincoln.

When I was 11, my brother helped me give my life to Jesus Christ. By the time I got to high school, though, I was living for myself. While in college in Lincoln, I got involved with the Fellowship of Catholic University Students (FOCUS). I was struggling with my faith, as many young Catholics do, but the students at the Newman Center and the FOCUS missionaries were instrumental in keeping me in the Church. I attended FOCUS's SEEK2013 conference and had a radical encounter with our risen Lord Jesus, and I ratified my 11-year-old self's "Yes." My life turned 180 degrees, and I have not looked back.

My discernment of the priesthood has been an interesting journey. When I was very little, I wanted to be a hobo who rode the trains and preached the Gospel. That "dream" was relegated to the back burner, though. When I was older, I remember seeing one of the associate pastors at my parish, and I thought, "Maybe I could be like him," but nothing more came of the thought. When I started serving at my parish, a deacon called me "Father Logan" when he saw me. I did not like that, though, because I wanted to get married and have kids. After the conference in college, my mind and heart turned toward the priesthood again. Still, that prospect scared me, and I let myself get distracted. While working as a FOCUS missionary in southwest Kentucky in 2014-15, I let my guard down enough to hear the Lord's gentle, emphatic invitation to enter the seminary. The idea of pursuing a vocation to the priesthood was exciting and mildly terrifying, but as I have continued to dive into this mystery with God for the past seven years, I am so consoled and excited for the future. I have no doubt that the Lord's plans for me are GOOD!

ARCHBISHOP'S COLUMN

We Can Let Gospel Considerations Shape Our Political Conversations

The blueprint reversals, featured in the readings this week, has to be a feature in the life of disciples

Dear brothers and sisters in Christ,

We celebrate the feast of the Triumph of the Cross this week on Sept. 14. The very title of the day emphasizes the greatest reversal in salvation history!

We're also reading from the Gospel of Luke, and we just happen to read the "Sermon on the Plain" this week from Luke 6. In the Sermon on the Plain, St. Luke gives us Jesus' blueprint of reversal for the world. Blessed are the poor, the hungry, the weeping and those persecuted for the Gospel; they will be exalted, each in a way that corresponds perfectly to their lowliness. Woe to the rich, those filled, the laughing and those whom the world commends; they will be brought low, each in a way perfectly suited to their worldly exaltation.

It's important to recognize this reversal as a feature of Jesus' teaching and life. It's important to realize that this reversal has to be a feature of the life of every disciple. And it's helpful to know that one of the great characteristics of the Gospel of Luke is how it spells out the blueprint of reversal over and over.

I want to suggest that it might be helpful to bring this blueprint of reversal to our political considerations this fall. We might ask every candidate: "How will you care for the vulnerable?" When candidates vocally support abortion, we can ask: "How does that care for the vulnerable?" When candidates vocally oppose immigration, we can ask: "How does that care for the vulnerable?" Of course these are just two issues among many. Still, they're prominent issues. And they provide good examples of how we can let Gospel considerations shape our political conversations on all issues and candidates.

There are two other themes in the Gospel of Luke we encounter this week that are important in themselves and that can help shape our approach to political conversations this fall.

The first is prayer. At every pivotal moment in the Gospel of Luke, Jesus steps away for a time of prayer before He acts. This week we hear how He spent the night in prayer before choosing His apostles. What does that have to do with political conversations? We'll be voting on a constitutional amendment on abortion this November — a direct attack on vulnerable mothers and children. Learning from the Gospel of Luke, let's turn to prayer and trust in the power of prayer as we face this pivotal moment in our state.

The second is this simple but profound comment of Luke regarding Jesus: "Everyone in the crowd sought to touch Him because power came forth from Him and healed them all." As St. Leo the Great said, "what was visible in our Savior has passed over into His mysteries." St. Leo's point applies first and foremost to the sacraments: In them, power continues to come forth from the body of Christ. But it also applies to what happens when the Church works together: Power continues to come forth from the Mystical Body of Christ, not only for the healing of individuals, but also for the healing of cultures.

Let's bank on that as we pray, work and vote for political leaders and a society that more accurately mirrors the great blueprint of reversal that we see in Jesus and the Gospel of Luke.





About the Instructor Fr. Peter Fonseca was ordained a priest for the Archdiocese of St. Louis in 2015. He holds a Master of Arts in Theology and a Master of Divinity from Kenrick-Glennon Seminary. Additionally, he holds a Master of Science in Bioethics from the University of Mary, where he was chosen by the faculty as the distinguished graduate student, and a certification in Catholic Healthcare Ethics from the National Catholic Bioethics Center.

Having previously served as a pastor, Fr. Fonseca is now assigned as the Director of Continuing Formation for Priests for the Archdiocese of St. Louis while pursuing doctoral studies in health care ethics at St. Louis University. While studying at SLU, he has taught in the undergraduate program and served as a research fellow for the Catholic Health Association. In addition to his canonical assignments, he serves as a consultor to various parties in the Archdiocese of St. Louis and the greater St. Louis area on bioethical issues. Fr. Fonseca has presented at various conferences and seminars across the country and has contributed to local television and national radio programs.
