FROM OUR RECTOR

Dear Parishioners,

At this year's Blue Mass, we gave thanks for the dedicated service of Brother John Fava, SJ—known affectionately by the officers as “Bro Jo.” For twenty-two years, Brother John has served as chaplain to the St. Louis Metropolitan Police Department, walking with the men and women who protect our city in moments of triumph and tragedy alike. His presence has been a steady source of strength, encouragement, and hope, whether through a word of support at roll call, a prayer at the scene of an accident, or simply a listening ear after a long shift.



What makes Brother John's ministry so memorable is the way he lived out his vocation in the spirit of St. Ignatius, bringing faith to the ordinary and often difficult places of life. His legacy is one of compassion, faithfulness, and friendship—touching not only the department but the wider St. Louis community. In recognition of his outstanding service, the Archdiocese of St. Louis is proud to honor him with the Order of St. Louis the King Award. On behalf of the Archdiocese and the Cathedral thank you, Brother John—“Bro Jo”—and ask God's blessing upon you as you continue to share your ministry of presence and prayer in new ways

This Sunday, September 14th, is the Feast of the Exaltation of the Cross. This feast commemorates the recovery of the Holy Cross of Calvary, found by St. Helena and preserved in Jerusalem. After the death and resurrection of Christ, both Jewish and Roman authorities in Jerusalem made efforts to obscure the Holy Sepulchre, Christ's tomb in the garden near the site of His crucifixion. The earth had been mounded up over the site, and pagan temples had been built on top of it. The Cross on which Christ died had been hidden (tradition said) by Jewish authorities somewhere in the vicinity.

The Feast of the Exaltation of the Cross reminds us of the centrality of the Cross in our daily lives, since we are invited to take up our cross each and every day and follow in the footsteps of the Lord. During our trials and temptations, our strength and protection is the Sign of the Cross. At Baptism we are sealed with the Sign of the Cross, signifying the fullness of redemption and recognizing that we belong to Christ. Let us look to the Cross frequently, and realize that, when we make the Sign of the Cross, we give our entire selves to God – mind, soul, heart, body, and will.

ARCHBISHOP'S COLUMN

Called to Bear, with Mary, the Sufferings of Others

There's a way to embrace suffering that brings grace to the world

Dear brothers and sisters in Christ,

We live at the confluence of the Mississippi and Missouri rivers. Few people know better than us the power of a river — the power both for good and for destruction.

In his book, “The Catholic Gentleman,” author Sam Guzman likens suffering to the power of a river: it can overwhelm us with destructive force, or it can be channeled and harnessed for good.

It seems like a torrent of suffering and sorrow has been unleashed on the world these days. How fortunate, then, that we observe the feast of Our Lady of Sorrows this week, on Sept. 15.

The death of Christ — the death of God made man! — unleashed a powerful river of sorrow that might have overwhelmed the world. But that river was channeled through the heart of Mary. Some say this is where she experienced the pains of birth most intensely, becoming the mother of the Church at the foot of the Cross. A great grief was channeled through her heart; then she became able to receive the grief of others and to be a source of consolation for them in the midst of their grief.

Mary turned her sorrow into an offering, rather than letting it become a source of bitterness. And because she did so, her sorrow lifted others.

There's an invitation that's particularly apt for these days of grief. We have always known as Christians that we're called to bear the dying of Jesus in our bodies (2 Corinthians 4:10). But there's something we know as Catholics that the world needs right now: that we are also called to bear, with Mary, the sufferings of others. There's the suffering in Ukraine and Gaza

and other war-torn places; the suffering of Annunciation school in Minneapolis and other places affected by gun violence; the suffering of physical and mental illness that touches so many of our families. Mary — Our Lady of Sorrows — teaches us that there's a way to bear these sorrows, to channel the river of hurt through our hearts in a way that brings graces rather than destruction to the world.

This is precisely where the movement known as “transhumanism” is both well motivated and ultimately mistaken. It seeks to address and alleviate the suffering of the world. Good! But it seeks to address suffering by offering a path to avoid it and by holding out the promise of living forever in this world. There's the tragedy: living forever in this world isn't a worthy goal for us. It isn't even possible: This world, after all, will itself come to an end.

Christianity also proposes to address and alleviate the suffering of the world. But Christianity seeks to address it by moving through suffering, not around it. And that movement through suffering is a path to live eternally in a heaven which never ends.

Jesus showed us another way to approach our own suffering. Mary showed us another way to bear the suffering of others. The world needs our witness, these days, to both of these skills.


Your Caution is Requested

Have you ever thought about becoming Catholic?

**Do you know someone who might be interested in the Catholic faith?
Are you Catholic, but have not received First Communion or Confirmation?**

The Order of Christian Initiation for Adults (or OCIA) enables those who are interested in the Catholic faith to “see what it is all about”.

Most often, people come because they are invited.

For Catholic parishioners: Pause and consider moments of grace you have experienced in your life – whether in prayer, in the sacraments, in moments of community and family life – these are gifts given by the Lord.

Consider: Is there anyone you know whom the Lord may want to invite receive these same gifts?

OCIA is for persons who have never been baptized, were baptized in another Christian tradition, or were baptized Catholic but have never celebrated Confirmation or received First Communion. It is also open to anyone who is interested in learning more about what Catholics believe and why we believe it. You are welcome if you have been Catholic all your life, if you have a passing interest in the Catholic faith, or if you are anywhere in between!

Save a Life: Donate Blood

- Every 2 seconds someone in the U.S. needs blood and or platelets.
- Approximately 29,000 units of red blood cells are needed every day in the U. S.
- Nearly 16 million blood components are transfused each year in the U.S.
- Sickle cell disease affects 90,000 to 100,000 people in the U.S. About 1,000 babies are born with the disease each year. Sickle cell patients can require blood transfusions throughout their lives.
- The average red blood cell transfusion is approximately 3 units.
- A single car accident victim can require as many as 100 units of blood.
- Blood and platelets cannot be manufactured; they can only come from volunteer donors.
- The blood type most often requested by hospitals is type O.
- One donation can help save more than one life

STEWARDSHIP ALIVE!

Mission Cooperation of Archdiocese

“When I was hungry or thirsty, when I was naked, when I was a stranger, you helped me.”

The weekend of September 20 and 21, Father Daniel Vogt, a Saint Charles native and a veteran missionary in Guatemala, will visit our parish, as part of the Missionary Cooperation of the Archdiocese of Saint Louis, to speak about the Casa de Migrante Beatos Tulio Maruzzo y Luis Obdulio Arroyo, located in the Apostolic Vicariate of Izabal in northeastern Guatemala.

The Casa was established to attend to the passing of migrants on foot from Central and South America on their way to the USA or more recently, deported or defeated on their way to their countries of origin. Each day an average of 75 persons, 70% men, 20% women and 10% children, receive attention with food, water, showers and bathrooms, used clothes and shoes, first aid among other services. Depending on the need, the migrants can stay overnight at the Casa, and in emergency cases a bit longer.

This service is a direct work of the Church in Izabal and receives the support of all of the parishes; until recent months some economic support was received by international agencies. Now more than ever, the Casa needs your support so that we can continue treat the migrants with dignity. Your important donation in the special collection will be appreciated. May the Lord multiply your generosity.
