FROM OUR RECTOR

PASTORAL STAFF

Dear Parishioners,

This Sunday at the 10 am Mass, we celebrate the Annual White Mass. At this Mass we welcome doctors, nurses and other health-care professionals. White Masses (so named for the white coats of the physicians) were traditionally celebrated on the Feast of Saint Luke (the patron Saint of physicians) in hospitals, chapels, parish churches, cathedrals, and everywhere that the physicians routinely gathered with their chaplains. White Masses honor all those who work in health care – from nurses and physicians to dietary staff and lab workers.

The prophet Isaiah this Sunday speaks of a banquet that is already prepared; the Lord has set it. Yes, life, peace, and fraternity have already been prepared. It is the Lord who gives them to us. These are not so far from us that we give up hope of having them, nor as they are so high and unreachable, we may fall in despair. What the prophet promises is within our reach. The real problem is our refusal to accept the invitation. We are often only concerned about our own affairs; thus, we do not respect the invitations the Lord sends to us, and we scorn the gifts offered to us.

So what happens to us? Our defense of personal interest at any cost, distances us from peace and fraternity. From this perspective, the parable of the banquet in our Gospel today is clear. Its protagonist is a king who has prepared a wedding banquet for his son and sends his servants to call those who have been invited. After listening to the servants, they all refuse the invitation. Everyone has a justifiable reason, something more than understandable to do: one in his field, another to his own business. But they all agree to refuse the invitation.

The king still does not give up; he insists and sends his servants to invite them again. This time, the invitation is accepted, and the hall fills with guests, "both good and bad."

The wedding garment in the parable symbolizes the wedding guest, whatever his past may have been, "putting on" Christ. Such a person, through Baptism, the sacrament by which one is given access to the wedding banquet of the Lord, has grown to be clothed in the spirit and teaching of Jesus. This is shown by the gradual transformation of that person's life through the influence of Jesus as experienced in the Christian community.

So let us pray that we may keep our wedding garments pure and spotless, that we become disciples who really hear and do the teaching of Jesus. Let us pray for a deeper faith and love and a better spirit of service and sense of responsibility to our community.

ARCHBISHOP'S COLUMN

Make your faith known

Jesus told us—and all Scripture tells us—that we should let our lives draw attention to God

Dear brothers and sisters in Christ,

"I am not ashamed of the Gospel."
We'll be reading from St. Paul's Letter to the
Romans for the next four weeks, and this is one of the
first things he says.

It strikes me that we're also not ashamed to be known as Cardinals fans, or Blues fans, or City fans and so on. We're fans. And we let people know. And, honestly, I think that's a good thing!

But the feast days, the Psalms and the readings this week all work together to raise an important follow-up question: Are we as ready to make our faith known?

We celebrate the feast of St. Ignatius of Antioch Oct. 17. The letters he wrote at the end of his life show that he wanted to be a visible witness to faith in Christ, and he was! We celebrate the feast of St. Luke the Evangelist Oct. 18. He wrote his Gospel to let people know what Jesus had done and the Acts of the Apostles to show how the Church — under the power of the Holy Spirit — was carrying forward Jesus' mission. We celebrate the feast of the North American Martyrs Oct. 19. These Jesuits made their faith evident by their missionary work among the Native Americans in the 1600s and by giving their lives for the faith. None of these saints was ashamed of the Gospel; they serve as examples of how to make our faith known.

Psalm 98 tells us: "The Lord has made known His salvation." Psalm 19 tells us: "The heavens declare the glory of God." Psalm 145 tells us: "Your friends make known, O Lord, the glorious splendor of your kingdom." God makes His love evident to us; we're called to make God's love evident to others.

In one Gospel reading this week, Jesus sends out His disciples to proclaim that the Kingdom is at hand and empowers them to perform miracles to support

their proclamation. He's telling them: make the Kingdom evident to the people you encounter. He says the same to us.

Everyone knows when we're Cardinals or Blues or City fans because we make it evident to them in some way. Why shouldn't we make our faith evident to others as well?

Let me be clear: I'm not saying it has to be evident in exactly the same way. It doesn't! How we do it has to be appropriate to the nature of the faith. It doesn't have to be flashy or showy; in fact, it can't! But why shouldn't it be just as deliberate and evident that we're Catholic?

When Jesus said we shouldn't blow a trumpet before us, recite lengthy prayers or even let our left hand know what our right hand is doing, He wasn't telling us to hide our faith. Those lines of Scripture have been misunderstood and misused to make us ashamed to show our faith. Jesus was criticizing those who use God to draw attention to themselves. That criticism still stands! But He also told us — and all Scripture tells us — that we should let our lives draw attention to God. That mandate still stands, too!

Let's think about good ways to make our faith known to the world.



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Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

On October 22, World Mission Sunday, we join Catholics worldwide to share in the Word and the Eucharist that the Lord may set our hearts aflame within us, filling us with enthusiasm to bring the Good News to all corners of the world.

Pope Francis chose this year's theme; "Hearts on fire, feet on the move." Inspired by the story of the disciples on the way to Emmaus, the Holy Father invites us to reflect on these threes images from the story: their hearts burned within them as they heard the Scriptures explained by Jesus, "their eyes were opened as they recognized him and, ultimately, their feet set out on the way." As missionary disciples, we must be illumined by Scripture and recognize Jesus in the Eucharist as the source and summit of the Church's mission so we too can set out with urgency to evangelize.

As we celebrate World Mission Sunday, we call to mind a missionary disciple whose heart burned with the Gospel, French laywoman Blessed Pauline Jaricot, foundress of the Pontifical Society for the Propagation of the Faith. When Pauline founded the Society in 1822, she recognized that all the baptized are called to participate in the missionary work of the Church through spiritual and material offerings. Pope Francis reiterates that the Pontifical Mission Societies are the "privileged means" of encouraging missionary cooperation, and it is for this reason that the World Mission Sunday collection is taken for the Society for the Propagation of the Faith.

Offerings from the World Mission Sunday collections assist the Holy Father in proclaiming the Gospel and celebrating the Sacraments in 1,100 mission dioceses and territories that are young and in need of resources. Financial aid support such essential work as the formation of seminarians and religious men and women, the training of catechists, the construction of schools ad orphanages, and the building of churches in remote and resource-limited areas.

Embodying this year's theme, I urge you to keep your hearts aflame and your feet moving this Word Mission Sunday so that everyone may come to recognize Jesus in the Word and Eucharist. Your prayers are invaluable, and your financial support provides life-giving aid to our brothers and sisters around the world.

Preparedness in Divine Invitation

The parable describes the Kingdom of Heaven as a wedding banquet thrown by a king. This theme visualizes the divine realm as a celebratory and communal event.

Initially invited guests refuse the call, illustrating how some might ignore or reject divine invitations. This reflects the theme of human indifference or hostility to divine outreach.

The king extends the invitation to everyone, both good and bad. This emphasizes God's inclusivity and the universal nature of the divine call.

A guest without a wedding robe faces consequences, suggesting that while the invitation is open, certain preparations or transformations are expected for full participation.

The overarching theme of todays Gospel is that there is a need for genuine faith and commitment to God. Just as attending a wedding requires the appropriate attire, embracing God's love requires genuine devotion and preparedness.
