## FROM OUR RECTOR

Dear Parishioners,

In response to the most recent natural disaster, Hurricane Ian, the Archbishop has asked for a special collection to be taken up this weekend. The funds collected will be part of the Bishops Emergency Fund and will be used to support the efforts of Catholic Charities USA and/or Catholic Relief Services. You will find envelopes in the pews for this collection.

Prayer, and specifically prayer of petition, is the theme of today's Mass. There are many kinds of prayer: praise, thanksgiving, intercession and petition. There is mental and vocal prayer. There is meditation and contemplation. We can pray privately on our own or in the company of others. There is private prayer and the public prayer and worship of the Church, which we call liturgy. Each one has its time and place.

In today's Gospel Jesus speaks about prayer of petition, asking God for what we need – as opposed to just what we want or would like to have.

The Gospel is a parable about a judge and a poor widow who is seeking justice. The point is that if even a totally corrupt person who cares neither for God nor man can be made to yield to the pestering of a totally defenceless and resourceless (no money to bribe) widow, how much more will a loving and caring God take care of his children? The lesson, then, is to keep on asking.

Does that mean we can keep asking for just anything? If I pray to win the mega lotto is it a prayer that we could seriously expect God to honor. And, if I had won, would that have been an answer to a prayer or simply good luck?

The widow, on the other hand, asked for something which God would certainly want for her – justice. Jesus elsewhere compares God to a decent, caring parent. Would such a parent give a child a stone when he asked for bread? Would a parent give a scorpion to a child who asked for an egg? If even worldly parents will give their children what they need, says Jesus, how much more will a loving God see to the needs of his children?

On that occasion, Jesus concluded his teaching by saying that God will always give good things to those who ask him. Luke's version says that God will give the Holy Spirit to those who ask.

What are these "good" things? How do we ask for the Holy Spirit? Surely it means asking for those things which will bring us closer to God; what helps us to know, love and serve him better; what helps us reach a deeper understanding of his teaching. It means, above all asking to know what his will is for us and the strength to carry it out. It is asking that his will become our will so that there is a complete harmonization of the two. I want to do what God wants me to do. His will and mine are one. And I end up doing what I want! Isn't that wonderful!

## ARCHBISHOP'S COLUMN

## When we open our hearts to God, He transforms our desires

God is preparing to give us something great, but to receive it, we need to open our desires to Him in prayer.

Dear brothers and sisters in Christ,

Queen Esther lived in a time of grave peril for the Jewish people — and let's be clear: That is not our situation! Still, we can draw inspiration from her story. This is a time of great transition in the Archdiocese of St. Louis. It's probably not a time any of us would have chosen for ourselves. But, like Queen Esther, God has chosen this time for us! Like her, we need to move forward with faith, boldness and creativity.

St. Augustine wrote a letter to a woman named Proba on the nature of prayer. The Church includes selections from it in the Office of Readings this week. One of St. Augustine's main points concerns the relationship between desire and prayer. He says that the purpose of opening our desires to God in prayer is not so that God can be informed about what we want. God already knows what we want! Instead, St. Augustine writes, "He wants us rather to exercise our desire through our prayer, so that we may be able to receive what He is preparing to give us." What God wants for us is even more than we can imagine. When we open our hearts to God, God starts to work and transform our desires.

I think that's an important lesson as we engage in the listening sessions of All Things New. I believe God is preparing to give us something great! But in order to receive it, we need to open our desires to Him in prayer.

We celebrate the feast of St. Luke this week (Oct. 18). He was a companion of St. Paul — so he received something important from St. Paul. But Luke didn't simply stay in the background, content with what he had received. Rather, at a pivotal point in Church history, St. Luke had something powerful and beautiful to contribute to the Church's mission: the two-volume work of the Gospel of Luke and the Acts of the Apostles.

That's a lesson for us, too, I think. Like St. Luke, we have received much from others. Like St. Luke, we stand at a pivotal time in the history of the local Church. Like St. Luke, we need to open ourselves to the powerful and beautiful things God wants us to contribute to the Church's mission.

The week concludes with the feast of St. John Paul II (Oct. 22). I want to recall two things he said, from which I think we can draw inspiration.

First, in his inaugural homily as pope, he said: "Be not afraid! Open wide the doors to Christ!" That message has not gotten old!

Second, in his apostolic letter "Novo millennio ineunte," which was meant to launch us into the new millennium, he said: "Duc in altum — set out for deep waters!" Listen to his words, which I think speak directly to our moment:

"Duc in altum! [Set out for deep waters!] These words ring out for us today, and they invite us to remember the past with gratitude, to live the present with enthusiasm and to look forward to the future with confidence" ("Novo millennio ineunte," #1).

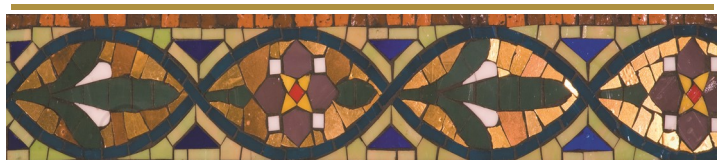

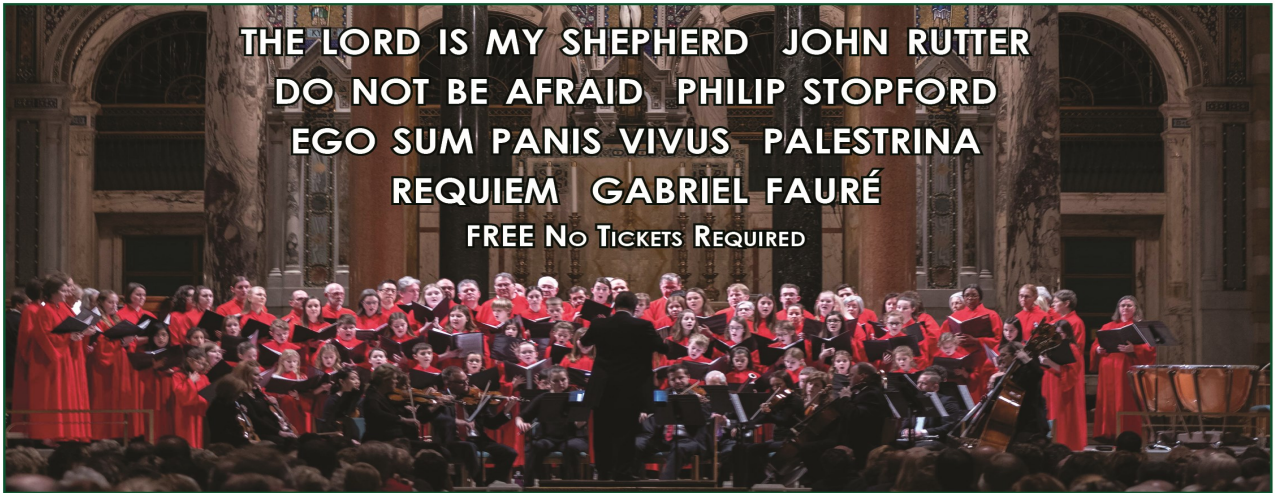

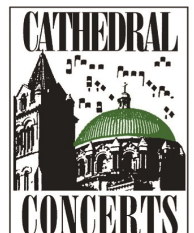
