FROM OUR RECTOR

Dear Parishioners,

Mark tells us about Jesus talking to James and John, the two sons of Zebedee. They are still on the way to Jerusalem, and Jesus, for the third time, confided in his disciples that he is destined to die at the end of his journey to the holy city. The two disciples are not touched at all by their Master's tragic words and come forward and ask Jesus to grant two seats next to him when he establishes his kingdom. Confronted with the two disciples' claim, Jesus answers, "You do not know what you are asking. Are you able to drink the cup that I drink, or be baptized with the baptism that I am baptized with?"

Jesus wants to explain to them what the Gospel demands through the two biblical symbols, the cup and baptism. Jesus interprets both images in relation to his death. The cup is the symbol of God's wrath, as Isaiah writes: "Rouse yourself, rouse yourself! Stand up, O Jerusalem, you who have drunk at the hand of the Lord the cup of his wrath, who have drunk to the dregs the bowl of staggering" (Is 51:17). Jesus' metaphor means he has accepted God's judgement for the evil of the world, even at the cost of death. Likewise, the symbol of baptism, "All your waves and your billows have gone over" (Ps 42:7). With these two images, Jesus shows that he is not seeking a successful career of power.

The power and authority the Gospel is telling us about is the power of love. Jesus explains it not only by words declaring: "whoever wishes to become great among you must be your servant," but also by means of his life. He remarks about himself, "For the Son of Man came not to be served but to serve, and to give his life a ransom for many." This is what should be for all his disciples.

This past Sunday, we welcomed the Archbishop to the Cathedral once again for the annual celebration of the White Mass. This Mass intends to honor doctors, nurses, and anyone involved in the healthcare profession, allowing all of us the opportunity to express our gratitude and support. Traditionally, this Mass is celebrated near or on the Feast of St. Luke, the patron saint of physicians.

ARCHBISHOP'S COLUMN

In What Ways Do We Show That We Belong to Christ?

St. Paul's Letter to the Ephesians reflects his new sense of belonging to Christ

Dear brothers and sisters in Christ,

The question "Who are we" is greatly influenced by another question: "Whose are we?"

In many ways, we identify with the sports teams we root for, or the cars we drive, or the brands we wear or the political party we follow.

But we're reading from St. Paul's letter to the Ephesians this week, and he uses very clear and rich language to talk about his changed sense of whose he is, and to encourage the Ephesians to reflect more deeply on whose they are. Here are three key elements of his message.

First, St. Paul points out: "You were once dead in your transgressions and sins ... following the age of this world, following the ruler of the power of the air." In short, the Ephesians once belonged to a culture of death. But God, he says, "brought us to life with Christ ... raised us up with Him, and seated us with Him in the heavens in Christ Jesus." St. Paul — and the Ephesians — now belong to Christ and the culture of life that He's creating.

Second, St. Paul uses rich trinitarian language to describe this new belonging. For example, he says: "[Christ] came and preached peace to you who were far off ... for through Him we both have access in one Spirit to the Father." And then he says: "I kneel before the Father ... that He may grant you in accord with the riches of His glory to be strengthened with power through his Spirit ... and that Christ may dwell in your hearts through faith." We don't often think about belonging to the trinity. We should! Belonging to a divine community has implications for building human community.

Third, St. Paul speaks about our becoming "one new person" and "one Body" in Christ. We become one with Christ in faith the way husband and wife become one with each other in marriage. That's a pretty deep sense of new belonging!

In light of these three points from St. Paul, I ask the following questions: 1) Whose are you? 2) How does that sense of belonging shape your everyday actions? 3) We readily wear the colors of our sports teams or put up yard signs declaring our political allegiance. In what ways do we show that we belong to Christ?

This week we celebrate the feast of St. John Paul II (Oct. 22). His papal motto was "Totus Tuus" — totally yours. It referred to his deep consecration to Mary. Here was a man with a keen sense of whose he was! That sense of belonging was an important part of his ability to shape the culture of his time. If we cultivate our own sense of belonging to Christ, it might deepen our capacity to shape the culture of our time, too!

This week in the Office of Readings, we read the story of Queen Esther. She knew who she belonged to — the people of God! And at a pivotal time for her people, she turned to God with prayer and fasting. Perhaps, at a pivotal time for our nation, we might do the same.

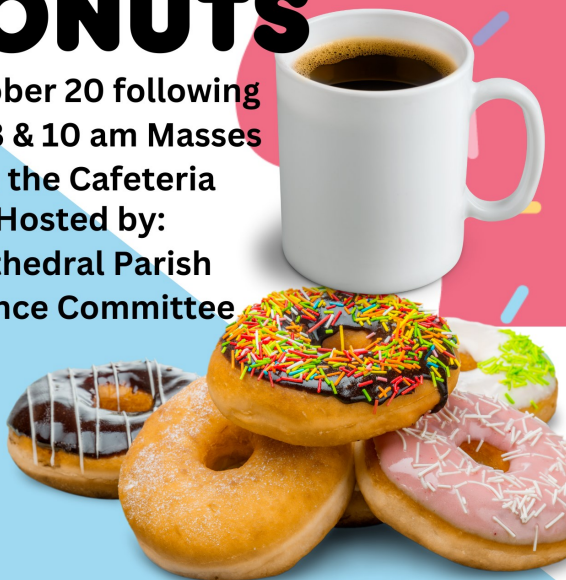

About the Instructor Fr. Peter Fonseca was ordained a priest for the Archdiocese of St. Louis in 2015. He holds a Master of Arts in Theology and a Master of Divinity from Kenrick-Glennon Seminary. Additionally, he holds a Master of Science in Bioethics from the University of Mary, where he was chosen by the faculty as the distinguished graduate student, and a certification in Catholic Healthcare Ethics from the National Catholic Bioethics Center.

Having previously served as a pastor, Fr. Fonseca is now assigned as the Director of Continuing Formation for Priests for the Archdiocese of St. Louis while pursuing doctoral studies in health care ethics at St. Louis University. While studying at SLU, he has taught in the undergraduate program and served as a research fellow for the Catholic Health Association. In addition to his canonical assignments, he serves as a consultor to various parties in the Archdiocese of St. Louis and the greater St. Louis area on bioethical issues. Fr. Fonseca has presented at various conferences and seminars across the country and has contributed to local television and national radio programs.
