

FROM OUR RECTOR

Dear Parishioners,

The month of November draws its special spiritual tone from the two days with which it opens: the Solemnity of All Saints and the Commemoration of all the Faithful Departed (All Souls). The mystery of the communion of saints illuminates this month directing our meditation to the earthly destiny of each one of us in light of Christ's Paschal Mystery.

We have a great response for our Cathedral Basilica All Souls Novena beginning on All Souls Day. We will remember these souls at a Mass each day of the Novena, beginning on All Souls Day, November 2. Also on November 4, the Archbishop will be here to celebrate a special Mass to remember the priests of the Archdiocese of St. Louis who died this year in addition to those we pray for during our Novena. There will be candles placed along the sanctuary that symbolize the lives of each priest who passed away in the last year.

It was in the middle of the 11th Century that St. Odilo, Abbot of Cluny (France), decreed that all Cluniac monasteries offer special prayers and sing the Office for the Dead on November 2, the day after the feast of All Saints. The custom spread from Cluny and was finally adopted throughout the Roman Church. Throughout the month of November, the Book of the Dead - another custom commemorating our deceased - will be located in the All Souls Chapel. Please feel free to inscribe the names of your loved ones in this book so that we may remember them.

As we pray for our deceased loved ones, it bears a calling to mind the teaching of purgatory. I truly like what Pope Benedict once said in one of his homilies: "Purgatory basically means that God can put the pieces back together again." Which leads us to ask the question what will it be like?

Saint Catherine of Genoa, a mystic known for her vision of purgatory, indicates that it will be a type of fire, though not like that used to describe the experience of hell. "Rust which is sin, covers souls, and … is burnt away by fire, the more it is consumed, the more the soul responds to God. … As the rust lessens and the soul is opened to the divine rays, happiness grows," she wrote.

Fire has a lot of effects: light, heat, warmth, and destruction. But when a precious metal is placed in its midst, it's purified and perfected. Purgatory is a letting go of habits, vices, and ways of thinking or knowing that prevented us from loving as we ought during our lifetime.

The poet Dante likened the soul's experience in purgatory to climbing a mountain, the summit being paradise. The climber might have to shed things that are bogging him down on the ascent. That process, of course, can be grueling, but with every step one moves closer to the goal. Msgr. Breier

ARCHBISHOP'S COLUMN

There is No Victory Without Sacrifice and the Cross

Whatever the outcome of the election, our call to discipleship remains the same

Dear brothers and sisters in Christ,

What's the most important thing on your calendar this coming week?

For many people, and certainly for the secular media, the national election seems like the most important thing this week.

But let me propose that, for Catholics, Mass on Sunday, Nov. 3, and Sunday, Nov. 10, are more important than the election on Tuesday, Nov. 5.

Am I saying the election isn't important? No, I'm not saying that at all! I'm only saying that our fidelity to the Lord's command (to honor the sabbath and keep it holy) and to the first precept of the Church (to attend Mass on Sunday and Holy Days) has greater importance.

This lesson — that fidelity to the Lord is the most important thing — is highlighted in the Book of Maccabees and in the Book of the Prophet Daniel, which the Church gives us in the Office of Readings in these early weeks of November.

But I propose that the feast we celebrate on Nov. 9 — the dedication of the Lateran Basilica, the pope's cathedral and therefore a symbol of Catholic unity also offers us a lesson more important than Nov. 5.

The first reading for the feast comes from Ezekiel 47: the vision of a river flowing out of the temple in heaven. The river waters the fruit trees that grow on its banks: "Every month they shall bear fresh fruit ... Their fruit shall serve for food and their leaves for medicine."

That vision is repeated in Revelation 22, the last chapter of the Bible. Two things become clear at that point: The river represents Christ, whose grace flows into the world as living water; and the trees represent the followers of Christ, who are meant to give spiritual food and healing to the world.

That's why the most important thing this week is Mass, where we receive Christ Himself and allow Him to be the river of living water flowing into us. Whatever the outcome of the election, our task will remain the same: to be trees of life, watered by Christ, offering our lives as fruit and medicine to the world.

The question for us is: What do we have to give up to make that possible and deeper?

Providentially, on Wednesday of this week — the day after the election — we'll hear from Jesus about the cost of discipleship: "Whoever does not carry his own cross and come after me cannot be my disciple" (Luke 14:27). We can't become trees of life without sacrifice.

We knew that when we watched the Olympics this past summer: There was no victory without sacrifice! We know that same lesson from the faith: There is no victory without the cross. We tend to forget that in everyday life. We need to remember it!

So, let's think carefully about this question: What's the most important thing on your calendar this week?



About the Instructor Fr. Peter Fonseca was ordained a priest for the Archdiocese of St. Louis in 2015. He holds a Master of Arts in Theology and a Master of Divinity from Kenrick-Glennon Seminary. Additionally, he holds a Master of Science in Bioethics from the University of Mary, where he was chosen by the faculty as the distinguished graduate student, and a certification in Catholic Healthcare Ethics from the National Catholic Bioethics Center.

Having previously served as a pastor, Fr. Fonseca is now assigned as the Director of Continuing Formation for Priests for the Archdiocese of St. Louis while pursuing doctoral studies in health care ethics at St. Louis University. While studying at SLU, he has taught in the undergraduate program and served as a research fellow for the Catholic Health Association. In addition to his canonical assignments, he serves as a consultor to various parties in the Archdiocese of St. Louis and the greater St. Louis area on bioethical issues. Fr. Fonseca has presented at various conferences and seminars across the country and has contributed to local television and national radio programs.
