FROM OUR RECTOR

Dear Parishioners,

Many thanks to the young adults of our parish who are members of Anima Christi and staffed our Coffee and Donuts this past weekend. It was a beautiful day as parishioners, visitors, and friends gathered outside to share fellowship.

Over the next few weeks, you will begin to see some supplemental lighting added to the Cathedral Basilica in the upper gallery. The supplemental lighting is in preparation for upgrading the Cathedral interior lighting when we remove the apparatus that provides light through the main dome to the basilica's central nave in this first phase. We had hoped that this would have been completed by Christmas, but with supply chain challenges, the delivery of our new fixtures has been greatly delayed. The supplemental lighting will be used to provide more light during this time of transition.

I hope that over the past week, you have been able to make a visit to the All Saints Chapel to visit the devotional area we have set up for the All Souls Novena. Every time I make a visit, it strikes me how important it is to remember our family members and friends who have left this world. The Saints who have gone before are models for us as they have faced life's challenges and walked with God. This is what we hope and pray for as we lift up our family and friends to God. They have blessed us with their lives, and we now bless them with our prayers.

Today's gospel passage also opens with certain cosmic images that are apocalyptic in character: "the sun will be darkened, and the moon will not give its light, and the stars will be falling from heaven, and the powers in the heavens will be shaken . . .then they will see the Son of man coming in clouds with great power and glory." The "Son of man" is Jesus himself who links the present and the future. The ancient words of the prophets have a fulfillment in the Person of the Messiah: he remains the firm and enduring point in the midst of the world's upheavals.

As the Gospel continues, its words confirm this. Jesus says: "heaven and earth will pass away, but my words will not pass away." Everything passes away, the Lord reminds us, but the word of God does not change and before God, each one of us is responsible for his or her own behavior. We are judged on this basis.

There is no lack of natural disasters nor, unfortunately, of war and violence in our world today. Today we also need a permanent foundation for our life and our hope, especially because of the relativism in which we are immersed. May the Virgin Mary help us to accept this in the Person of Christ and in His word.

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ARCHBISHOP'S COLUMN

When religious freedom is threatened, we know fidelity triumphs in the end

Remaining steadfast in faith and trusting in the Father is the way of Jesus

Dear brothers and sisters in Christ.

The readings this week look back to a time of persecution for Israel, when the Greek King Antiochus basically decided to do away with religious freedom. Scrolls of the law were burned. People were forced to violate the kosher laws, violate the Sabbath laws, and sacrifice to pagan idols. Circumcision — the key physical sign of the covenant — was outlawed. In every conceivable way, the practice of the faith was outlawed with gusto. Those who refused to comply were put to death.

Perhaps what hurt most of all, though, was not the external persecution but the internal cooperation: many people within Israel cooperated with the persecution!

Here's the first lesson we might draw from the readings for our own day: attacks on religious freedom are nothing new. In fact, they are a perennial reality for God's people. So we ought not be surprised when those attacks rear their heads again today in various ways. For example: when a secular agenda on marriage, gender or abortion is pursued with zeal these days, and faithful Catholic individuals and institutions get targeted for persecution because they won't bow to that agenda. As in ancient Israel, perhaps what hurts most of all is when people within the Church cooperate with that persecution! But, really, none of that should surprise us. It only means the history of God's people lives on in our times.

The second lesson we can draw from the readings this week comes from the response of the faithful.

This week we hear about Eleazar. We hear about the seven brothers and their mother. We hear about Mattathias. Every episode follows the same pattern: faced with a choice, they were faithful to God's law, and were persecuted for their faithfulness.

Sometimes we ask ourselves: "Why be such a stickler over a small point of the law — why not compromise?" But for these faithful figures, it was a matter of considering their conscience before God, and the lesson they would be teaching others, especially the young. To give up your faith for worldly gain is a bad trade.

The final reading of the week recounts the death of King Antiochus. And there, really, is the key. The pattern unfolds the same way every time: in the end, fidelity to God's law wins and violation of God's law loses.

In conjunction with these lessons from the history of Israel, we also hear all week long how Jesus is journeying toward Jerusalem. What awaits Him there is what has always awaited God's people: external persecution with internal cooperation. But, even knowing that, He is steadfast in faith, trusting that He is ultimately in the hands of His Father, and that fidelity triumphs in the end.

Our temptation, when religious freedom is threatened, is to compromise our faith or to lash out in anger. Neither is the way of Jesus. Our call is to stand firm, take up the Cross, and let God win the victory — through our suffering — again.

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

On Sunday, November 21st, our diocese will take up the national collection for the Catholic Campaign for Human Development (CCHD), which is the domestic anti-poverty program of the U.S. Catholic Bishops. CCHD works to carry out the mission of Jesus Christ "... to bring good news to the poor ... release to captives ... sight to the blind, and let the oppressed go free." (Luke 4:18)

Your support for this collection brings real change: not a hand *out*, but a hand *up*. CCHD is unique because it empowers families and communities to chart their *own* paths to economic independence, local power, and justice for the marginalized in our community—organizing essential workers to earn fair wages; enabling small farmers to grow their food sustainably for area restaurants; and bringing justice and dignity to those unfairly punished or on death row. In the Kingdom, God calls us not only to exhibit mercy and charity, but also to promote justice, which is the aim of CCHD.

In addition to making an impact nationally, those living in poverty in our own archdiocese are empowered through the 25% share of our collection that stays here. For the past five years, eleven projects from

the St. Louis Archdiocese have received a total of \$514,000 in national awards. Recent local grantees of CCHD funds include:

Missourians for Alternatives for the Death Penalty, which worked to develop policies that end capital prosecutions and address historic wrongs in convictions; provided education outreach; and empowered exonerees to become advocates for criminal justice reform.

Inter-Faith Committee on Latin America, which equipped Latin community leaders to advocate locally and federally for policies supporting human rights and social justice.

A Red Circle, which empowered low-income residents to grow and distribute fresh produce, explore careers in food and entrepreneurship, and better understand food justice and racial equity.

Your support for this collection helps people in our community—especially now, as the health and financial well-being of our most vulnerable citizens have been further harmed by COVID. Please prayerfully consider how you are able to help CCHD this year. If you would like more information about the collection and the people it supports, visit *cchdstl.org*.

Eucharistic Exposition

The Blessed Sacrament, the very presence of Christ's body and blood in the Eucharist, is reserved in the tabernacle of the Blessed Sacrament Chapel to the east of the main sanctuary. At all hours the Cathedral is open, people may be found praying there before the Lord "face to face." Each Saturday afternoon, beginning at 3:30 p.m., the Eucharist is displayed for prayer and adoration in public exposition in the Blessed Sacrament Chapel for a holy hour. Following this holy hour, the Evening Prayer of the Church with Benediction is celebrated.

Additionally, the Blessed Sacrament is displayed for public adoration and prayer on the First Friday of the month. First Friday Adoration begins at approximately 8:30 a.m., following the completion of the 8:00 a.m. Mass, and concludes with Benediction at 11:45 a.m. Our next First Friday Adoration will be held Friday, December 3.


Cathedral Inspired Christmas Cards
