FROM OUR RECTOR

PASTORAL STAFF

Dear Parishioners,

Next Sunday, December 1, we begin the Season of Advent. The word "Advent" is from the Latin "Adventus," which means "coming." Advent is the beginning of a new liturgical year (in the Western churches) and encompasses the span of time from the fourth Sunday before Christmas until the Nativity of Our Lord is celebrated.

Like Lent, Advent is a preparatory season. It has significance because it is a season of looking forward and waiting for something greater — both for the annual celebration of the event of Christ's birth and for the time when Christ will come again.

Mark your calendar for Saturday, December 7, when we will welcome Archbishop Rozanski to the Cathedral for a Advent afternoon of recollection. It will begin at 1:00 pm and include a reflection by the Archbishop, time for prayer, Sacrament of Penance, and Eucharistic Adoration.

Abraham Lincoln declared November 26, 1863—the last Thursday in November—a Day of Thanksgiving. The Battle of Gettysburg, in early July of 1863, had cost some 50,000 American casualties, and the sacrifice moved President Lincoln: "... When I went to Gettysburg and saw the graves of thousands of our soldiers, I then and there consecrated myself to Christ."

During that time of internal strife in the United States, and at this turning point in his own spiritual life, President Lincoln called for prayer and thanksgiving for the nation, saying in part, ". . . It is announced in the Holy Scriptures and proven by all history, that those nations are blessed whose God is the Lord . . . It has seemed to me fit and proper that . . . God's blessings should be solemnly, reverently, and gratefully acknowledged, as with one heart and one voice, by the whole American people."

"Everything a baptized person does every day should be directly or indirectly related to the Corporal and Spiritual Works of Mercy." - Servant of God, Dorothy Day

When Jesus commands us to love our neighbor, He is commanding us to more than having a warm feeling about them. Christian love is no mere feeling or sentiment: it's a choice. It's a choice to pursue and work for the good of another person. In order to give us a clear idea of what that choice looks like, the Church offers The Corporal and Spiritual Works of Mercy which are based in the explicit teaching of Jesus Himself. They can serve almost like an examination of conscience by which to assess our day. Jesus Himself says, "Truly I tell you, whatever you did for one of these least brothers or sisters of mine, you did for me." For helpful recommendations as to how to incorporate the Works of Mercy into your day, visit USCCB.org and type "Works of Mercy" into the search bar.

Spiritual Works of Mercy

- <u>counsel the doubtful</u>, we all have doubts in our faith journey, remember He is the Way, the Truth and the Life, He is always there to turn to
- instruct the ignorant, learn about our faith and be open to conversations with others
- <u>admonish the sinner</u>, do not judge, but help them correct their mistakes to walk closer to Christ
- <u>comfort the sorrowful</u>, listen to those dealing with grief, you don't have to have the answer, just listening is comforting
- <u>forgiving injuries</u>, forgiveness is hard, we are not like God with limitless mercy and compassion, let Him help guide your forgiveness
- <u>bearing wrongs patiently</u>, do not be bitter about people wronging you, turn it over to Him and show your compassion
- pray for the living and the dead, the most powerful way to support each other is prayer

Corporal Works of Mercy

- feed the hungry, so much of our food goes to waste, consider how your own food habits can benefit others who do not have those same resources.
- give drink to the thirsty, many don't have access to clean water, a basic necessity, consider supporting efforts to this essential resource
- shelter the homeless, there are so many circumstances that can lead to this, find a shelter or a resource to a shelter to help donate time or funds helping those challenged
- visit the sick, those who are sick are often forgot or avoided, these people still have much to offer, take time to visit and comfort them
- <u>visit the imprisoned</u>, this doesn't have to mean visiting those incarcerated, this can be someone imprisoned by depression, anxiety or fear, or limitations of old age
- <u>bury the dead</u>, funerals give time to show support and grieve, doing this shows how we respect life which gives comfort to those mourning
- give alms to the poor, donating money to organizations who provide support to those in the most need, research to find places whose donations go to the people over profit
