FROM OUR RECTOR

Dear Parishioners,

I am pleased to share the Cathedral Basilica of St. Louis 2020-2021 Financial Report. It is hard to believe that I am in the middle of my third year at the parish. During my time here, I have enjoyed being your rector and witness to the many wonderful things that take place because of the generosity of parishioners.

The pandemic has challenged each one of us. I have great hopes for our parish as we see more and more people return to in-person Sunday Mass. I am very proud of our parish, and I look forward to meeting the challenges of the future.

We constantly seek to be responsible stewards of the financial resources that our parishioners commit to the work of our ministries and the care and maintenance of our parish facilities. The Cathedral receives funding from the Archdiocese for Archdiocesan Ceremonies and some preservation and maintenance expenses. Our primary source of funding comes from your offertory gifts. The funds we raise together as a community support our liturgical worship and pastoral costs, as well as our spiritual and sacramental ministries.

I would like to express my gratitude to our parish ministries because we cannot be a great parish without everyone working together. As we make our way through this fiscal year, I ask that we commit ourselves to be the disciples Christ calls us to be in our daily lives.

We continue to address two important projects for the preservation of the Cathedral Basilica: the roof and façade of the Cathedral. The study was completed in 2020, which discovered many areas that need to be addressed. Some of these areas will be addressed more urgently. Estimates have been compiled, and we are working closely with the Archdiocese as our regular offertory will be unable to cover this cost.

Thank you for your continued generosity to the Cathedral Basilica. As we continue to re-build the life of the parish and address long-term maintenance needs, your support is essential.

FINANCIAL TERMS EXPLAINED

Income

Offertory Collection: Unrestricted gifts from weekly envelopes, loose cash and on-line giving

Unrestricted Gifts: Bequests and Year End Gifts; other unrestricted gifts not received in the Offertory Collection

Restricted Donations: Gifts and bequests identified for a specific Parish or Archdiocesan purpose (e.g., Flowers, Landscaping, Catholic Education, Retired Priests and Religious Fund)

Program Fees: Fees associated with Parish programs or ministries (e.g., votive offerings, weddings) Investment Income: Interest paid on Parish deposits with the St. Louis Archdiocesan Fund and other depositor fund accounts

Grant Revenue: Grants from the Annual Catholic Appeal for operational expenses; Risk Management; and the Archbishop's Fund

Other Revenue: Rental income from Boland Hall, the Cathedral Convent and Cathedral Concerts

Expense

Personnel Expenses: Parish salaries, payroll taxes and benefits (e.g., health insurance, retirement, and disability insurance)

Supplies Purchased: Supplies used in parish liturgies and ministries (e.g., collection envelopes, missalettes, votive candles, cleaning and janitorial supplies)

Fees and Services: Costs associated with individual or professional services (e.g., wedding coordinators, cantors, music section leaders)

Occupancy: Building related services (e.g., security guards, IT service, repair and maintenance services, utilities)

Transfer Parishes/Diocese: Parish payments to the Archdiocese (e.g., Cathedraticum, insurance, St Louis Review, Shared Accounting, Payroll Service)

Other Non-Cash Transactions: Non-monetary transactions; depreciation, amortization & depletion

Capital Expenditures: Building component upgrades and replacements (e.g., HVAC systems, plumbing, lighting, IT equipment)

ARCHBISHOP'S COLUMN

To flourish, we must stop avoiding the darkness

Advent offers the option to foster the discipline of hope, even as the nights grow longer

SERVE THE LORD WITH GLADNESS



Dear brothers and sisters in Christ.

We're moving into the darkest time of the year, with the shortest days and the longest nights. I think there's a lesson for us if we're willing to step back and ask, how's our ability to wait in the darkness?

Perhaps Advent shows that we're not very good at it — at least, not spiritually. Our culture tends to skip over Advent. We can't dwell in the darkness with hope. So we try to avoid it and grasp for the light of Christmas.

Christmas isn't the problem — the grasping and avoiding is.

That's not meant as a finger-wagging accusation so much as an honest spiritual assessment. Americans aren't very good at waiting. After all, we invented fast food and microwaves! But darkness — physical, psychological and spiritual — are inevitable in human life. At some point, if we're going to flourish, we can't go on avoiding the darkness. We need to learn to dwell in it, for a time, and keep moving forward with patience and hope — even and especially when we don't see the light growing.

Advent is meant to be a training ground where we develop the discipline of hope. The world needs us to develop that discipline! We live in a world where hope in the midst of darkness is desperately needed.

Optimism is the belief that things will get better because that's how the world is. But let's be honest: The world often disappoints us, and is bound to disappoint us because it's fallen. Hope, on the other hand, holds that things will ultimately turn out all right because of who God is. And that's why "hope does not disappoint" (Romans 5:5): because it's rooted in God, not the world.

Abraham was given a promise by God that he would have descendants as numerous as the stars of the sky, they would have a land of their own, they would be a great nation, and through him all nations would be blessed. But, at the time of his death, Abraham had exactly two sons and a burial plot. It would be 2,000 years before all the elements of that promise were fulfilled. But Abraham had faith in God. That faith allowed him to foster the discipline of hope, to keep moving forward, knowing that the light would eventually come.

We hear powerful words of hope from the prophet Jeremiah this week. "Behold, the days are coming, says the Lord, when I will raise up a righteous shoot to David." But we have to realize: Jeremiah spoke those words at the start of the Babylonian Exile, when the darkness was just beginning. It would be 500 years before this prophecy was fulfilled. But Jeremiah had faith in God. That faith allowed him to invite all of God's people to foster the discipline of hope — to keep moving forward, knowing that the light would eventually come.

"I don't see that things are getting better." When we say those words we're naming a certain kind of darkness. How do we respond to the darkness? Do we try to withdraw, because it's hard? Do we rage against it, in a kind of despair?

Advent offers us another option: to foster the discipline of hope, even as the nights grow longer.

Let's foster that discipline in ourselves, so we can offer it to the world.
